HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10

amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas...

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding...

Under such terms and conditions as are now or may be hereinafter provided by law...

be provided by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) percent of the moneys available to it in any one year...

"Under such terms and conditions as are now or may hereinafter be permitted by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding thirty thousand (\$30,000.00) dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Texas War for Independence...

"(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2%) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollar valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section 17, of Article VIII (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purpose of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

"(e) Should the 53rd Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots the following: FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials for Texans who served in the Texas Revolution and in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

Summer Shade Benefits Livestock and Poultry

Hot weather bothers most animals. On the farm, it means less milk in the pail, fewer eggs in the nests, less meat on the livestock.

That's why agricultural engineers in ARS and cooperating State experiment stations, working together the last 8 years, have studied different methods of reducing the heat load on animals in warm climates.

An animal is constantly producing heat. Even the switch of a tail, beat of a heart, produces heat. So do other body functions, including growth and the making of milk and eggs.

Heat Absorbed But the animal has more and more difficulty getting rid of body generated heat with each increase in the natural air temperature.

A heat-distressed animal eats less and naturally produces less. Several ways of helping an animal maintain its heat balance have been tested and found helpful. These include cool drinking water (65F.), sprays, air-cooled shelters and several different types of shades.

At the California experiment station, agricultural engineers T. E. Bond and C. F. Kelly and livestock specialist N. R. Itter found artificial shades the most economical means of controlling radiation.

A shade, of course, does little to alter the air temperature, humidity, or the wind velocity under it—unless it happens to be closed on one or more sides. Main value of a shade is to shield the animal from the intense radiation of sun and sky.

A shade roofed with 4 to 6 inches of hay held between two layers of woven wire fencing has proven cooler than most other types. For one thing, the uneven character of the hay apparently acts as a black surface. Then too, the hay probably loses much of its heat in the passage of air over and through it.

Further work is underway on effective, practical types of shades.

Salt Is Needed In Hot Weather

There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse—chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Holle. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fatigue.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose. "Since milk contains more salt than water, drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Holle says.

### Old Settlers Meet At B. F. Simpson Home For Annual Northfield Birthday Dinner

OLD COWBOYS who have ceased to listen for the jingling of spurs or the sound of horse's feet, met Sunday in Northfield at the ranch home of Ben Simpson.

The occasion was the benevolent pioneer's 83rd birthday, an annual event, shared by his family, neighbors and friends. Mr. Simpson was born in Barton county, near Shelton, Missouri, August 10, 1871. He filed on 160 acres of land in the Northfield community in 1896. He lived in a dugout on Bitter Creek for seven years then built his present home more than half a century ago.

For nearly three score years he has made the county's most northeasterly community his home, and his life has become a symbol of the true pioneer West Texas spirit. Mr. Simpson's generosity has become a tradition; his humble creeds a benediction.

The combined ages of Mr. Simpson and seven of his Sunday visitors totaled more than 650 years. Among the old-time friends were B. T. Prewitt of Childress, J. M. Farrel of Memphis, Joe and Jim Meador, C. D. Bird, G. E. Hamilton and Jim Cooper, all of Matador.

Pattern of the celebration was the same as in former years. Cars and pick-ups loaded with victuals began arriving early, while the honoree was attending church the bull and presented to his community the modern Northfield Church of Christ building. Guests began arriving long before Mr. Simpson returned from church.

Neighboring women joined with the women folks of Mr. Simpson's family in preparing that vast quantity of food. A line formed on the right side of the long table in the kitchen. There was a moment of silence and George West of Childress spoke the grace.

West Texas returned to a fenceless empire of nomadic chuckwagons and hard-riding cowboys as the pioneers sat in the shade of the large veranda and relived the past. Shadows extended from the red hills on Pease River north of the Simpson home, when the last of the friends departed.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 8 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 16a to Article VIII to provide that in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, elections may be held to

provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes, providing for submission of this Amendment to the voters of Texas; and providing the time, means and manner thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 16a shall be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to read as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county having a population of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as determined by the last preceding census of the United States, the Commissioners Court may submit to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at an election the question of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to the list of authorized county officials. If a majority of such voters voting in such election shall approve of adding an Assessor-Collector of Taxes to such list then such official shall be elected at the next General Election for such Constitutional term of office as is provided for other Tax Assessor-Collectors in this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

"AGAINST THE Constitutional Amendment permitting elections in counties of less than ten thousand (10,000) inhabitants to provide for an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution. Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. July 29, August 5, 12, 1954

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10**

...an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Sections 1 and 2 of Article VI so as to confer the right to vote upon members of the regular establishment of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, or Air Force, or component thereof who are otherwise qualified electors, and so as to limit voting by persons in the military service of the United States at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

**RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 2a of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by the county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislature may make.

Section 2. Every person subject to the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or precinct in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, any voter who is subject to a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid tax before offering to vote at election in this State and hold receipt showing that said poll tax paid before the first day of any next preceding such election. If said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States, or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

## Mrs. Rose Turner Seeks Support In Polio Drive

Polio has become one of the most dreaded of diseases, striking swiftly and unexpectedly. Mrs. Rose (L. B.) Turner of Flo-mot has witnessed the painful ravages of the disease in her own family, leaving a small granddaughter crippled for life. Her compassion reaches beyond her family however, and embraces every hapless child or adult stricken with the malady.

The following letter to the editor was received this week from Mrs. Turner, acknowledged county leader in all fund-raising campaigns for worthy causes:

"Dear Mr. Meador: May I send a message to my people through the pages of your Tribune?

"Greetings My People. I am speaking to every man, woman, boy and girl in Motley County. I want you to know how very much I appreciate you. You have met the challenges of life so bravely. You have shared both joys and sorrows with your fellowman, regardless of his or her station in life.

"You, my people have been so generous in your assistance in every emergency that has confronted others; in Flood Disasters, Tornadoes, Red Cross drives and in the March of Dimes, the fight against Polio.

"Again an emergency has arisen and I'm sure you want to know about it and to share in meeting that emergency. It is Emergency March of Dimes of August 16th through August 31, 1954.

"May I tell you of this emergency? In January, \$55,000,000 was contributed to the March of Dimes. This is the largest amount ever raised in one drive, to fight polio. \$75,000,000 will be needed this year, to take care of the situation. Therefore this emergency drive is to raise \$20,000,000.

**Largest Number Of Patients**

"The first 23 weeks of 1954 has seen the largest number of new polio patients that has ever been recorded in the same length of time in history.

"What are we going to do, going to say, or feel in regard to these, our children and our neighbors? Can we deny them the care needed when it means life and death? Can we shut up our hearts of compassion when we can help them from being cripples for life or can help them live? Who knows? The next polio victim may be you or your child!

"I saw our baby stretch her arms, kick her feet in perfect health one morning. Then polio struck. One little leg has never kicked again. She never sat alone as your baby did, she's never run, hopped, skipped or jumped as normal children.

"We saw little Johnny, on his way to school for the first time, but he never got there. Polio had struck and oh, so severely! But wait; it is not all dark.

"Let me tell you the bright spots that You, my people have made. Through your contributions you have made hospitalization, nursing care, physical therapy, wheel chairs, crutches, braces, iron lungs and constant diligence possible in the fight against polio. You have shown us a way out, making possible the patients' desire to live. Our children walk again, altho they use crutches, braces, and special made shoes. Oh! My people, it is you who have done all this for our polio patients. Thank you for making possible a more normal life for them and making of them useful citizens.

**New Patients Need Care**

"We are again making the appeal for your help. We need: Vaccine to prevent paralysis, vaccine to prevent polio, iron lungs that lives may be spared, more research works and many other things. Won't you help with your dollars, dimes, and whatever you have so we may whip this polio before it strikes others?

"The new patients need care, the crippled need crutches, wheel chairs, braces and therapy children that are susceptible need vaccine to prevent polio—gamma globulin is needed for this. All of this costs in money or lives.

"Friends, don't see how little you can give—but see how much. The need is so urgent. The call is great and polio is real and deadly. The results rest in our hands. I know you will do your part. You, my people have never failed. We can not, must not, and will not fail this time.

"Our Master said, 'A cup of cold water given in His name will not lose its reward.'

"Let's give and give until polio is conquered.

"We have time, opportunity, and a challenge. GIVE NOW.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2

proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 4, by providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties if approved by the qualified property taxpayers voters at an election held for that purpose within such District, prescribing the powers of such District, providing for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of 1954, prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 4, which shall read as follows:

"Section 4. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in excess of 190,000 and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of any county owned hospital, or where the hospital system is jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the county-wide Hospital District of the title to any land, building or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebtedness theretofore issued by any county or city for the establishment of hospitals or hospital facilities; to levy a tax not to exceed seventy-five (75) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of all taxable property within such district, provided, however, that such district shall be approved at an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified, property taxpayers voters in such county shall vote therein; provided further, that such Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of the county, and thereafter such county and cities therein shall not levy any other tax for hospital purposes, and provided further that should such Hospital District construct, maintain and support a hospital or hospital system, that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anti-

icipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpayers voters of this State at the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT granting power to the Legislature to pass laws authorizing the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 190,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT granting power to the Legislature to authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in any county having a population in excess of 190,000 and in Galveston County, and to levy a hospital tax."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 5

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting the Legislature to fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State, providing that such salary shall not be fixed in an amount less than that provided in the Constitution on January 1, 1953; fixing the per diem of the members of the Legislature at \$25.00 per day for 120 days only; providing for the submission of this Resolution to a vote of the people; and directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamation.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."

Sec. 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall each hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified, receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that

may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, minutes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."

Sec. 6. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the legislature.

"In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances

prepared by the Comptroller for each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no member shall be entitled to mileage for any session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session."

Sec. 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election amendments favoring such proposals shall be printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE AMENDMENTS PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

And those voters opposing said proposed Amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE STATE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendments, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are needy persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; and providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month.

“(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty (\$20.00) Dollars per month.

“(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

“The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-Two Million (\$42,000,000.00) Dollars per year.

Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14**

Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, prohibiting the Legislature from ever lending the credit of the State, or granting any public money, or assuming or otherwise discharging any indebtedness of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public agency or political subdivision of the State, now authorized, or which may hereafter be authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads, or turnpikes within this State, and providing for the submission of the amendment to the voters of this State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section, to be known as Section 52-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52-b. The Legislature shall have no power or authority to in any manner lend the credit of the State or grant any public money, or assume any indebtedness, present or future, bonded or otherwise, of any individual, person, firm, partnership, association, corporation, public corporation, public agency, or political subdivision of the State, or anyone else, which is now or hereafter authorized to construct, maintain or operate toll roads and turnpikes within this State."

State.

Section 2. The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 2, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon, or in counties using voting machines such machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the Legislature from lending the credit of the State or granting public money, to or assuming any indebtedness, of any one authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes in this State;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the Legislature from lending the credit of the State or granting public money, to or assuming any indebtedness, of any one authorized to construct, maintain, or operate toll roads or turnpikes in this State."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

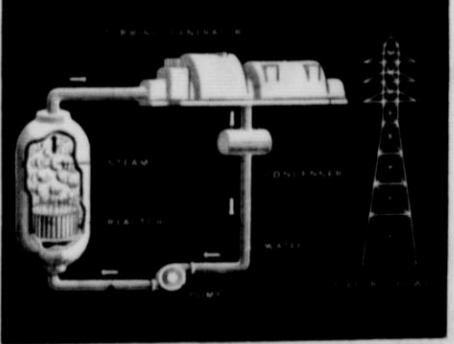

## Texas Democrats Escape After 20 Years As National Party "Political Captives"

**PUBLISHER'S NOTE**—Byron C. Utecht is a veteran news service political writer whose research and observations deserve the honest consideration of voters who may seek background information in the present strongly-contested race for governor.

AUSTIN, Aug. 9.—For the 20 years preceding the Eisenhower administration Texas and other Southern states were booted around by Democratic party bosses. History proves this. The party dictators in the North and East made this argument constantly: "We don't have to extend favors to Texas Democrats or those in other Southern states because they always vote solidly Democratic anyway, no matter what we do."

Formerly the Democratic party had the "two-thirds rule", under which a nominee for the presidency was required to obtain a two-thirds vote of all the convention delegates. Texas and other Southern states regarded this rule as of great benefit to them as it gave them power at national conventions. The party bosses were forced to respect the South and Texas.

But when Franklin D. Roosevelt was president he ordered abrogation of this rule in spite of Texas protests. The national convention meekly obeyed. Back in 1912 when the Democratic convention nominated Woodrow Wilson for president his victory was entirely due to the two-thirds rule, and the Texas delegation fought to the last ditch for his nomination. Had it not done

so Wilson would never have been nominated. This delegation has gone down in Texas history as "the Immortal Forty". No one questions that Wilson made a great president and was a great Democrat of the Jeffersonian type.

### Convention Obeyed Orders

Harry Truman discloses in his book, "Mr. President" that it was at Roosevelt's direction he became a candidate for vice-president, and the delegates were not consulted. Alben Barkley in his recent series in the Saturday Evening Post insists that Truman informed him he would support him, Barkley, for presidential nomination two years ago. But instead Truman ordered the convention to nominate Adlai Stevenson. The convention obeyed orders. The Texas delegation, headed by Governor Shivers, preferred Senator Richard B. Russell of Georgia. For 20 years there was hardly any use having Democratic national conventions as the delegates were political captives.

Truman when president not only vetoed the Texas tidelands bill but with his usual crudity denounced it by saying, "It is a steal in broad daylight." And Stevenson upheld Truman's blow at Texas. This bill, now the law, will mean \$500,000,000 to the Texas public schools, and besides, Texas owned these offshore properties under the annexation agreement. But that did not count with Truman or Stevenson.

When the battle was at its peak for this bill and the Texas schools Governor Shivers, Senator Price Daniel and Attorney General Shepperd went all-out in Texas' behalf and President Eisenhower signed the bill. But where was Ralph Yar-

borough during this hectic contest? He was far back of the lines and did not lift his voice or raise a finger. Yarborough supported the Truman-Stevenson label. He is still supporting it in his campaign for governor.

### No Recognition

Then, there is Stephen Mitchell, Democratic national committee chairman, who has lined up against Texas, refusing to recognize Wright Morrow as Texas national committeeman, although he was duly elected to that post. The Truman-Stevenson Mitchell crowd wants Yarborough elected governor.

Eisenhower has proved himself to be more of a Democrat than Stevenson or Truman. He not only has demonstrated he favors state rights, the tidelands bill for instance, but his administration has reduced the spending budget of Truman by \$10,000,000,000 and existing annual taxes by \$1,360,000,000. This is exactly what Democrats over the country have been asking for.

The Democratic party is not supposed to be owned by somebody. American Democracy is as sound as ever but the Democratic party needs a reeducation. We have one last chance to accomplish this.

#### STATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 6

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new section, numbered 63, providing for the Retirement System of the State, or as an appointive officer or employee of the State, for retirement benefits under either of said Systems.

#### RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a section, to be numbered 63, which shall read as follows:

Section 63. Qualified members of the Teacher Retirement System, the Employees Retirement System, or the Employees Retirement System shall be entitled to credit in the Retirement System for services, including prior service, earned or received by them as an appointive officer or employee of the State, or as a teacher, or person employed in the public schools, colleges, and universities, supported wholly or partly by the State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, and on which election all ballots shall have been thereon.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide a four year term of office for elective district, county and precinct offices, staggering the terms of such offices by having certain holders of such offices be elected in the November, 1954, general election, and providing for the necessary proclamation and election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 9 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 9. There shall be a Clerk for the District Court of each county, who shall be elected by the qualified voters for State and county officers, and who shall hold his office for four years, subject to removal by information or by indictment of a grand jury, and conviction of a petit jury. In case of vacancy, the Judge of the District Court shall have the power to appoint a Clerk, who shall hold until the office can be filled by election."

Sec. 2. That Section 15 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 15. There shall be established in each county in this State a County Court, which shall be a court of record, and there shall be elected in each county by the qualified voters, a County Judge, who shall be well informed in the law of the State, shall be a conservator of the peace, and shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. He shall receive as compensation for his services such fees and perquisites as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 3. That Section 18 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 18. Each organized county in the State now or hereafter existing, shall be divided from time to time, for the convenience of the people, into precincts, not less than four and not more than eight. Divisions shall be made by the Commissioners Court provided for by this Constitution. In each such precinct there shall be elected one Justice of the Peace and one Constable, each of whom shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified, provided that in any precinct in which there may be a city of 8,000 or more inhabitants, there shall be elected two Justices of the Peace. Each county shall in like manner be divided into four commissioners precincts in each of which there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof one County Commissioner, who shall hold his office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified. The County Commissioners so chosen, with the County Judge as presiding officer, shall compose the County Commissioners Court, which shall exercise such powers and jurisdiction over all county business, as is conferred by this Constitution and the laws of the State, or as may be hereafter prescribed."

Sec. 4. That Section 20 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 20. There shall be elected for each county, by the qualified voters, a County Clerk, who

shall hold his office for four years, who shall be clerk of the County and Commissioners Courts and recorder of the county, whose duties, perquisites and fees of office shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and a vacancy in whose office shall be filled by the Commissioners Court, until the next general election; provided, that in counties having a population of less than 8,000 persons there may be an election of a single Clerk, who shall perform the duties of District and County Clerks."

Section 5. That Section 21 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 21. A County Attorney, for counties in which there is not a resident Criminal District Attorney, shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, who shall be commissioned by the Governor, and hold his office for the term of four years. In case of vacancy the Commissioners Court of the county shall have the power to appoint a County Attorney until the next general election. The County Attorneys shall represent the State in all cases in the District and inferior courts in their respective counties; but if any county shall be included in a district in which there shall be a District Attorney, the respective duties of District Attorneys and County Attorneys shall in such counties be regulated by the Legislature. The Legislature may provide for the election of District Attorneys in such districts, as may be deemed necessary, and make provision for the compensation of District Attorneys and County Attorneys. District Attorneys shall hold office for a term of four years, and until their successors have qualified."

Section 6. That Section 23 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 23. There shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county a Sheriff, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, whose duties and perquisites, and fees of office, shall be prescribed by the Legislature, and vacancies in whose office shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next general election."

Section 7. That Section 14 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 14. Except as provided in Section 16 of this Article, there shall be elected by the qualified voters of each county, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office for four years and until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes, as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Section 8. That Section 16 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 16. The Sheriff of each county, in addition to his other duties, shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes thereof; but, in counties having 10,000 or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected as provided in Section 14 of this Article, and shall hold office for four years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Section 9. That Section 44 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 44. The Legislature shall prescribe the duties and provide for the election by qualified voters of each county in this State, of a County Treasurer and a County Surveyor, who shall have an office at the county seat, and hold their office for four years, and until their successors are qualified, and shall have such compensation as may be provided by law."

Section 10. That Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 30, which shall read as follows:

"Section 30. The Judges of all Courts of county-wide jurisdiction heretofore and hereafter created by the Legislature of this State, and all Criminal District Attorneys now or hereafter authorized by the laws of this State, shall be elected for a term of four years, and shall serve until their successors have qualified."

Section 11. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 64, which shall read as follows:

"Section 64. The office of Inspector of Hides and Animals, the elective district, county and precinct officers which have heretofore had terms of two years, shall hereafter have terms of four years; and the holders of such offices shall serve until their successors are qualified."

Section 12. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 65, which shall read as follows:

"Section 65. The following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution:

(a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerks; (c) County Judges; (d) Judges of County Courts-at-Law; County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

"Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the general election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution.

## Boy Scout Council Plans Development Program of Camp Haynes Near Silverton.

Mr. Joe T. Salem, Council President, announced today that the Council's Executive Board in session at a meeting at Camp Post on Friday, July 23, voted and approved the development of the Boy Scout camp, Camp Haynes, located ten miles north-

east of Silverton, Texas. The camp construction to be included within the development project is the development of three Troop camps—the construction of a complete water system, a swimming pool, and a large open shelter.

Each of the Troop campsites, three in number, will have an Adirondack shelter 9 by 14 ft., a Troop cabin 12 by 14 ft., and Troop washing and shower facilities and sanitation facilities. The swimming pool, to be an all concrete construction, will be 20 by 50 ft. in length surrounded, of course by a cement apron for a sidewalk and with a fence all the way around. The bath house facilities are to be in one corner of the pool.

Mr. Salem also announced that the board had tentatively approved, of course contingent with the ability of the Council to raise the necessary money, the purchase of a campsite for the Council in the mountains of New Mexico and the purchase of canoes and row boats so that aquatic camps could be held for Explorer Scouts within this Council. Mr. Salem stated that the Council Executive Board had approved the inclusion of these items in the Annual Fall Operating Campaign to be held this October and November in all of the communities of the twenty counties of the South Plains Council. **Campsite Is Gift**

Camp Haynes was given to the Council in 1942 by the late John Haynes in memory of his mother and the camp has been known affectionately over the South Plains Council area for many years as Camp Mammy Haynes. The northern eight counties of the Council have looked forward now for the last twelve years to this very vital step in the completion of their Scouting program—the development of the property at Camp Haynes—so that more use can be made of it by the Scout Troops and the Explorer Posts of this Council. The plan of construction and the plan of use by the Council of Camp Haynes is that it is to be an advanced short term and overnight campsite for the use of all of the Units of the Council.

Mr. W. R. Swell of Lubbock, Chairman of the Council's Finance Committee, has the responsibility for developing the organizational plans of the campaign, and Mr. Ray Mowery of Texas Technological College is to be the chairman of the overall operating and capital camp development part of the entire campaign.

This development program and these other expansion projects of a camping nature have

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated Section 51g, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended; providing the Legislature may appropriate funds for the purpose of carrying out such agreement and may authorize the obligations necessary to obtain such coverage; prescribing the form of the ballot; providing for the promulgation and publication thereof.

**RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 51f, to be designated Section 51g, to read as follows:

"Section 51g. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable the State to enter into agreements with the Federal Government to obtain for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions coverage under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act as amended. The Legislature

shall have the power to make appropriations and authorize all obligations necessary to the establishment of such Social Security coverage program."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for agreements between the State of Texas and the Federal Government to obtain Federal Social Security coverage for proprietary employees of its political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine and each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State. July 29, August 5, 12, 19
