## MATADORS HATCHET TURKS 34-0

The Matador Matadors moved up in the Class 3B district ratings Friday night after caging the Turkey Turks here on Burleson Field 34-0.

Turkey kicked off to the Matadors and halfback Kenneth Marshall sputtered back to the Turks' 33 yard line. Matador advanced to the 11 yard line and then lost the ball to the Turks on a fumble. Turkey didn't dent the Matador line and end Berry Bostick picked off a Turk interception.

The Matadors unleashed a jet propelled attack in the second quarter when Marshall started the Matadors' scoring with a 33 yard touchdown, and quarterback Bill Barnhill hit end Dwayne Campbell with a 2 point conversion pass. Halfback Andy Green kept the scoreboard flashing when he sprinted 35 yards to chalk up another Matador touchdown. The conversion run fell short. A high snap was fumbled by Turkey, and guard, Gerald Jackson broke through to recover for the Matadors. The Matadors' third goal-ward bound trip was stalled at the 2 yard line when the Turks pounced on the loose pigskin. The half ended 14-0.

Third quarter, Matador moved ahead quickly against a fluttering Turkey defense as quarterback Barnhill sneaked over from the 4 yard line. The conversion run was unsuccessful. Fullback Smitty Smith smothered a Turk fumble on the 20 yard line and on the next play, Campbell hauled down a Barnhill touchdown pass. Smith crossed the double stripes for the two points. The quarter ended with Campbell wrapping up a Turk fumble.

Last quarter, fullback Smith snatched a pass out of waiting Turk's arms and zig-zagged for a 25 yard Red touchdown. The conversion run missed the goal-line. The Matador freshman team finished the game with end Jimmy Don Hurt stealing a Turk aerial. Quarterback Steve Stevens completed passes to Billy Osborn and Pepper Nichols. The final score was 34-0.

The Matador gridders threw blocks, made tackles and scored touchdowns like old times with 14 first downs to Turkey's 4. Final ledger had Matador gaining 325 yards on the ground and 116 aerial yards for a total of 441 gained yards.

The Matador Matadors will travel to Nazareth Friday night to tangle with the Swifts at 7:30 o'clock for their last 1971 gridiron contest.

## Nation's Greatness Rests On Production of Farms

THE ABUNDANCE of food and fiber in this great nation is made possible by the work of the American farmer whose farmwork earning was about \$1.57 per hour in 1969. On the other hand the factory worker received an average of \$3.19 per hour.

The position of agriculture was explained Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club, by Donald Johnson, Executive Vice-President of the Plains Cotton Growers Inc., Lubbock. Mr. Johnson was introduced

by County Agent Lion Bill Palmeyer, and spoke in observance of "Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week."

"The best and finest foods in the world are available in the country," Mr. Johnson said, "because of the efficiency of the American farmer, yet he is blamed with the 48% increase in food prices since 1941. This is not true. The farmer is receiving 3% less.

"The cotton shirt I am wearing cost \$9 in Lubbock. The farmer who produced the cotton received 23c, but it cost him 32c to produce it. It is only through the subsidy that the farmer can stay in business.

"Only 2% of the total tax bill goes to the farmer," Mr. Johnson declared, "but it is the world's best bargain... it helps maintain the greatest living standard in the world. The farmer produces enough for himself and 44 additional people in this country.

"Agriculture is the largest industry in this country... 4 out of 10 people earn a living from agriculture and every dollar produced in agriculture adds \$3 to the national economy... the \$307 billion asset of agriculture is equal to about two thirds the current value of all current U.S. corporate assets. Involving 4.6 million workers, it is more than the combined work force needed to operate the nation's transportation, public utilities, steel and automobile industries..."

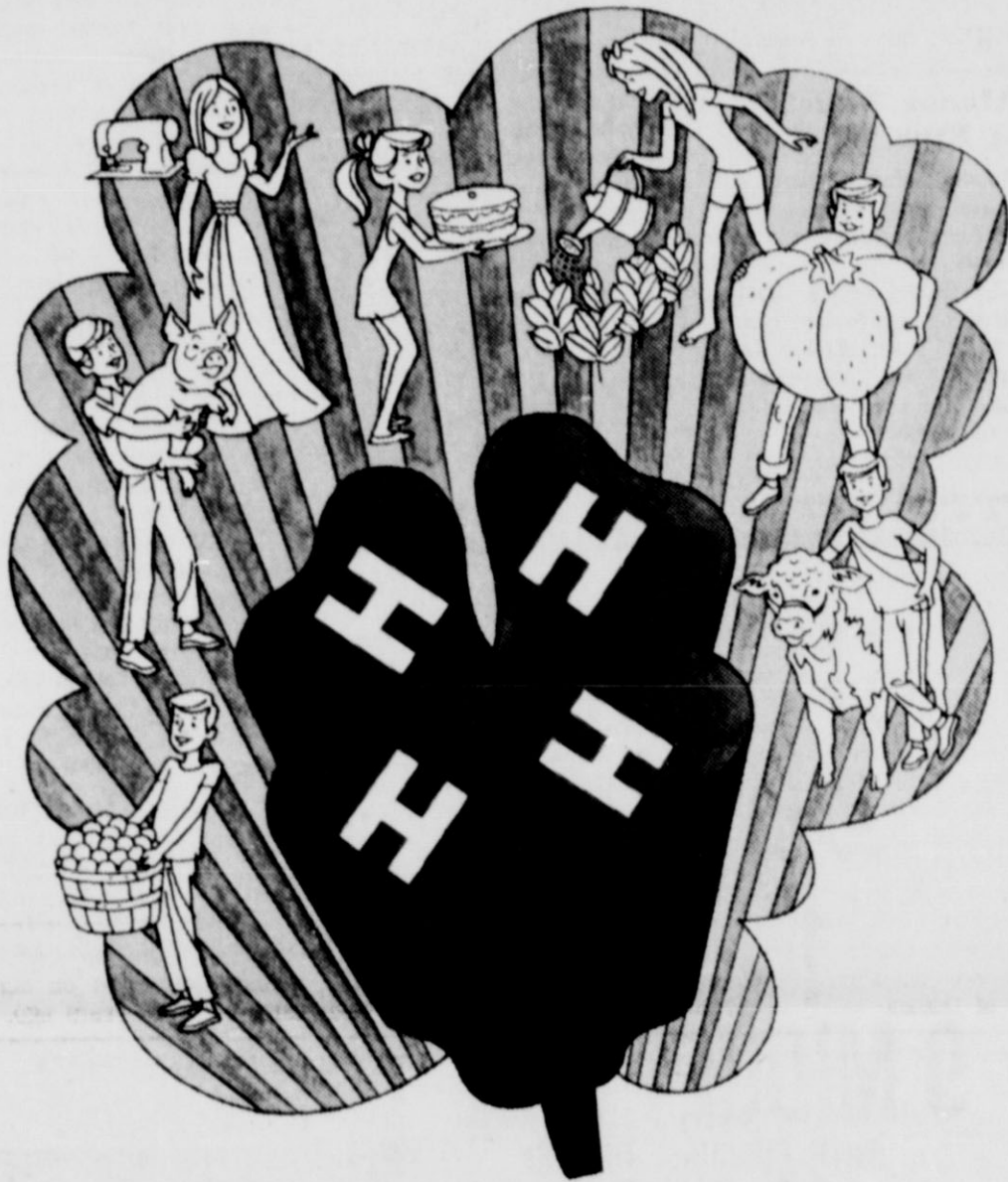

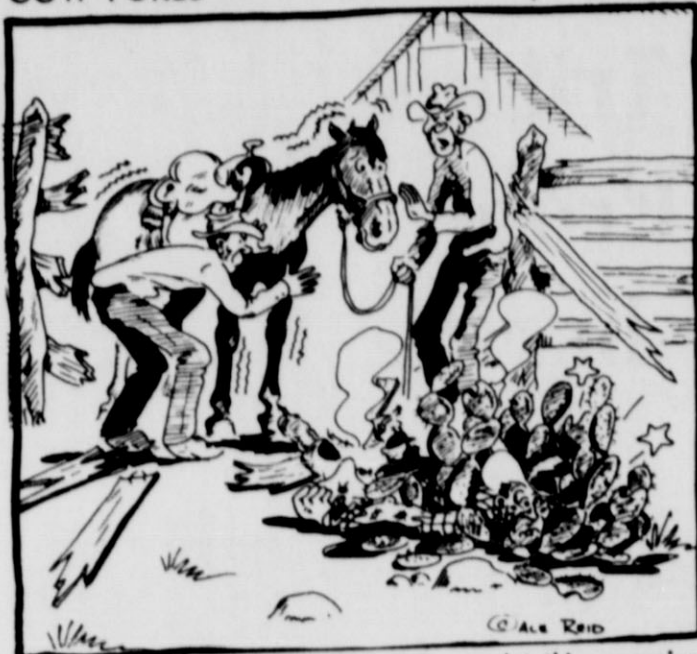

**Texas Economy Gains Billions By Food, Fiber**

Texas is a giant in the agricultural industry and Texans have much to be proud of and to be thankful for regarding the food and fiber produced in this state. Thus the state's agricultural products will receive special notice during Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week, November 15-20.

Special observances are planned to emphasize that the people of Texas have a large stake in the vast amount of food and fiber produced by those in agriculture," explains Charles K. Baker, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which is assisting in promoting the week-long event. "Texans benefit both as consumers and as residents of this state due to the tremendous contributions of agriculture to the overall economy."

Agriculture in all its phases adds almost \$10 billion annually to the Texas economy, points out the economist. Cash receipts from farm marketings during 1970 were \$3.1 billion and are expected to reach the \$3.76 billion mark by 1976. Every dollar produced by agriculture has a multiplier effect of 2.7. This means that a \$1 million increase in agricultural income results in an increase of

\$2.7 million in the total Texas economy.

**Texas Is Leading State**

Texas is the leading state in the production of cotton, grain sorghum, beef cattle, sheep and wool, and goats and mohair, and is second in rice production and third in peanuts, pecans, and citrus. The state generally ranks third after California and Iowa in total crop and livestock cash receipts.

Baker emphasizes the fact that agriculture is one of the most efficient sectors of the overall economy. In 1970, each farm worker supplied himself and 46 other persons with food and fiber needs. Output per man-hour of farm work has increased 223 percent since 1950 due to improved technology and management. The benefits are passed on to the consumer who now spends 16.5 percent of his disposable income for food — a drop of 19 percent in the past 10 years. Per capita food consumption increased six percent during that same decade.

The economist urges all Texans to participate in the observance of Texas Food and Fiber Abundance Week the week prior to Thanksgiving. "This is an excellent opportunity for all of us to reflect on the bountiful harvests that agricultural producers over the state reap each year to provide for us high quality, yet economical food and fiber products."

Many Texas leaders, county judges, and local townspeople are involved in planning special ob-

servances in each county of the state.
