

Antelope Are Brought To Local Ranch

Buffalo And Beaver May Add To Haven For Wild Life

Interest in game conservation is making rapid strides in this section as five delegates from Motley county attended the annual convention of the Texas Wildlife Federation at Galveston June 10 and 11. The delegation which was organized by Frank A. Buckley, county agent, started by automobile early Thursday and includes U. L. Willie, Gus Bird, J. R. Nall, J. C. Burleson, and Jim Cannon, all officers or members of the county game management association.

At least one herd of antelope has been started in Motley county as R. C. Echols obtained a pair of the rare game animals from a ranch in Hartley county. "I would not trade that pair for the best automobile in Amarillo," Echols exclaimed to Jim Cannon and Fred Simpson as the trio reached that city on their return from the trip Thursday night. The animals were moved in cooperation with Canon, local game warden and P. D. Misley, warden of the plains district under a permit granted by Gene Howe, Amarillo, state game commissioner. A severe penalty is attached to the killing or capturing of antelope without a permit. An effort is being made to secure more of this attractive game species and to establish other herds in this section.

A covey of chukar partridge is to be received this week by Fred Simpson from A. W. Hawk of Canyon, prominent exponent of wild life work. Negotiations are under way by Elbert Reeves to secure several buffalo from the U. S. Biological Survey.

Arrangements have been made for the introduction of colonies of beaver on several of the ranches in this county. Many of the large ground tanks recently built are to be stocked with adapted fish. Applications for Bream, Bass, Croppie, and Goggle-eye from the state and federal hatcheries are being received daily by the game warden and the county agent.

The first short course for employees of the state game commission will be held at Austin this month. This new means is being taken to teach all game wardens the principles of wildlife conservation as well as law enforcement.

MANY ATTEND FEEDER'S DAY

Feeder's Day at the Spur Experiment Station Friday found Motley County well represented among several hundred farmers and ranchmen who attended from all parts of West Texas. Among others from this county, Frank A. Buckley, county agent, reported seeing A. B. Echols, M. J. Reilly, U. L. Willie, C. D. Bird, W. M. Graham, W. B. McClendon, Geo. Seigler, and Elbert Reeves, Matador, J. F. Anderson, L. A. Stearns, Hawley Plemmons, and A. L. Havis, Roaring Springs, and Curtis Graham and Ben Edwards, Flomot.

R. E. Dickson, Superintendent of the station, presided at the meeting where speakers called attention to improved feeding practices developed in experiments of the past several years. Silage and meal produced cheap gains and good finish without the use of grain, five to six pounds of meal being the most practical amount for yearling cattle. Cottonseed was found to be a practical substitute for a large part of the meal. Cane silage was found to be equal in feeding value to kafir silage and more desirable because of greater yield per acre. Cattle fed in the dry lot for more than 120 days should be fed one pound good alfalfa hay per day to prevent vitamin A deficiency.

Captain Legge Says Highways Will Be Safer In Future

Henry Ford, local manager of the Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., was unanimously elected as the new president of the Matador Lions Club at the regular meeting of the organization held in the basement of the Methodist church Tuesday. Other new officers elected for the fiscal year beginning in July are: Henry Pipkin, 1st vice-president; G. E. Hamilton, 2nd vice-president; J. R. Whitworth, re-elected as secretary and treasurer; A. B. Craven, Lion Tamer; J. D. Craven, Tail Twister. One year directors; T. B. Edmondson and Dr. J. S. Stanley; two year directors; Jack Bradshaw and C. A. Pitts. Miss Rachel Patton was unanimously re-elected as Lions Sweetheart. The new officers will be installed at the next regular meeting, Tuesday June 21.

Interesting Safety Address
Captain W. W. Legge of the Lubbock Division of the Texas Highway Patrol, introduced by District Attorney John Hamilton, made an interesting address regarding the Texas Highway problem. "We have reduced fatalities over 22 percent in the past 6 months," Captain Legge declared, "yet we have only 360 men for the 23,000 miles of Texas highway. We are asking for 700 more men with which to do the job as it should be done, every officer is selected for moral character, physical ability and training. We are interested in the education of the driving public and the enforcement of highway laws. We have but one purpose and that to protect the public, however we warn a driver only one time. It is essential that we have public sentiment in order to enforce the laws, our highest death rate is from drivers between the ages of 18 and 22 years... 75 percent of our accidents are caused by vehicles traveling over 60 miles per hour, with liquor being responsible for a great amount of the accidents... All the highways in this part of Texas were designed for a speed of 35 miles per hour.

"It is important that the proper signal be given before the driver alters the course of his vehicle... highways will be safer in the future because we will control those drivers who refuse to be educated."

HIGHEST TECH HONORS GO TO MISS THACKER

Roaring Springs Girls Vie For Highest Average

Miss Juanita Thacker of Roaring Springs, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Thacker of that city, was the highest ranking student in the arts and sciences division and in the entire graduating class of Texas Technological College. It was announced in the commencement exercises Monday morning.

Miss Thacker, one of 320 seniors to be graduated, received her B. A. degree in Zoology. Her grade point average was 5.57, with an "A-minus" average in all subjects throughout her entire college career. A narrow margin separated grades of Miss Thacker and three other seniors in the arts and sciences division, one of whom was Miss Wyleta Smith also of Roaring Springs, whose point average was 5.562. Misses Thacker and Smith have been classmates throughout their school life, and both were honor students of their class when they graduated from grade school and later from high school.

Miss Thacker is a charter member of Alpha Epsilon Delta, honorary pre-med fraternity granted Texas Tech this spring, membership of which is limited to pre-med students of sophomore rank or above, with grade average of B or above in all subjects.

Flomot Youth Graduates
John Elbert Speer, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Speer, Flomot, was also a member of the graduation class of 320 seniors of Texas Technological College, and returned a M. A. degree in Education at the twelfth annual commencement of the college, Monday morning.

Screwworm Danger Season Forecast
"Prepare for the Screwworm in great numbers," R. R. Reppert, entomologist of the Extension Service of Texas A. and M. College, has warned Texas ranchmen in a recent communication to Frank A. Buckley, county agent.

The Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine of the U. S. Department of Agriculture has forecast a severe infestation, probably worse than that of 1935, in many parts of the Southwest, especially Texas. Weather in most parts of the state has favored the rapid development of the insect.

The best way to prevent livestock from screwworms, Reppert points out, is to examine animals frequently so that wounds may be treated before they are seriously infested. Treat the infested wound with 90 percent commercial benzol. The wound is then plugged with clean cotton saturated with benzol. Reinfestation is prevented by lightly covering the area around the wound with dehydrated pine-tar oil of 1.065 specific gravity.

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Ground Soaked As Storms Continue; No Damage Reported

Pluvial weather, laden with hail, wind and electrical storms, has brought the June rainfall total for the eight days of the month to more than two inches and with a gain of near one fourth inch above the total for the entire corresponding month last year. Figures taken from the rainfall chart maintained by J. H. Sample totaled 2.45 inches at 9 o'clock last night, while the month of June 1937 showed a total of only 2.24 inches. Rainfall registered by Mr. Sample's rain gage is as follows: .10 inch on June 3; .43 inch on June 5; .35 inch on June 6; .35 inch on June 7 and 1.22 inches yesterday evening. Some wind and hail has accompanied most of the storms but no extensive damage has been reported. In the rain and electrical storm Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning which registered only .35 inch in Matador, a heavy rain estimated at from two to three inches fell in the Whiteflat section which will cause many farmers to plant cotton again, it was declared. It was estimated that the heavy dashing rain fell in about 40 minutes.

Hinders Wheat Harvesting
The rainy weather has delayed wheat harvest in this section, however most farmers and ranchers are rejoicing at the improved prospects.

During the heavy rain, late yesterday a small lake was created on Main street south of the City Drug Store when a storm sewer became clogged. Water extended from curb to curb until the debris was removed.

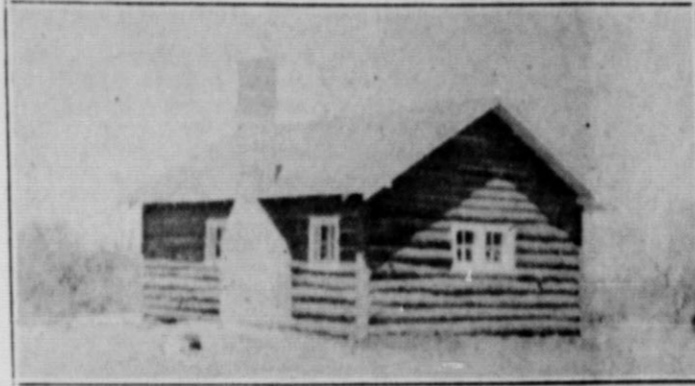

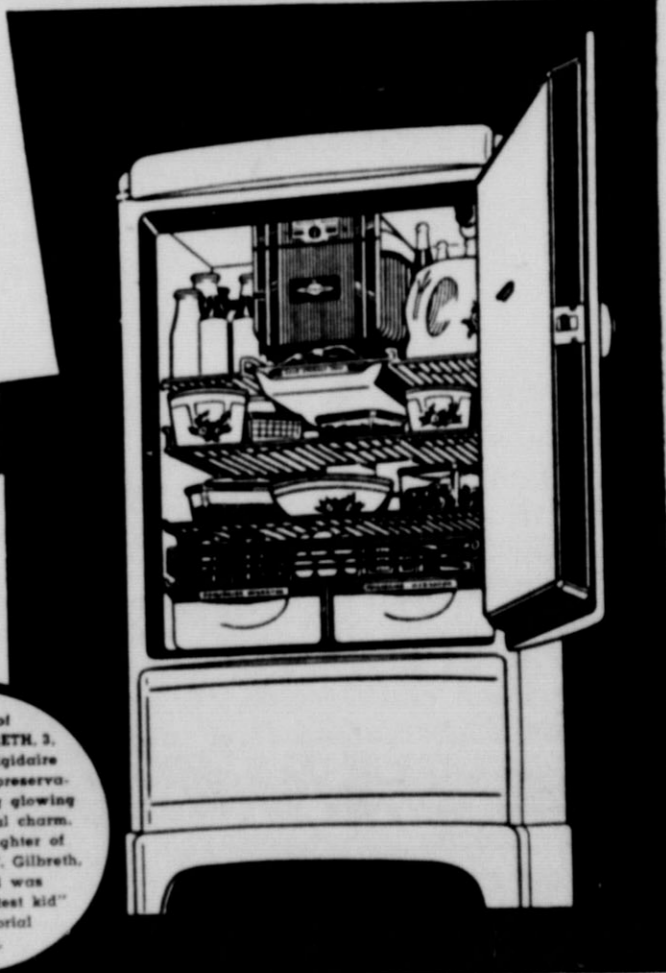

The observance of the day gives recognition to the important place lay men and women have in the organization and work of the church. This cannot be stressed too often, or too much, if the Church is to meet its opportunities and go forward with spiritual power.

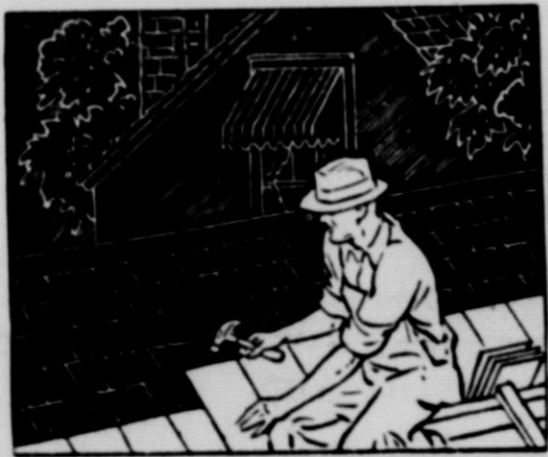

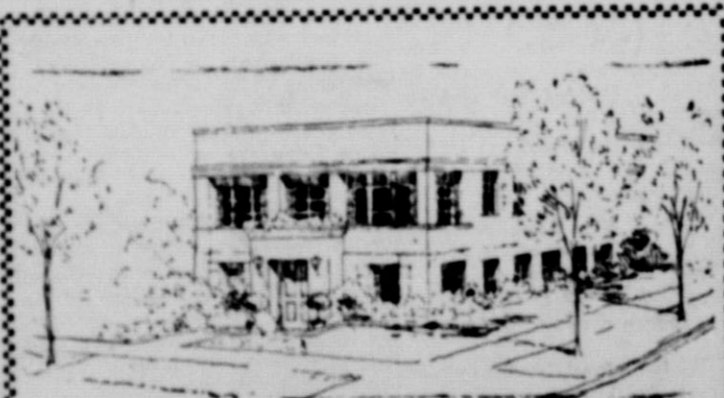
