

It depicts Tribune editor Douglas Meador writing his "Trail Dust" column and illustrates a paragraph which appeared in the Auxiliary's "Columnists' Bin", a weekly feature of excerpts from the nation's newspaper columnists. The feature is edited by Olin Hinkle and John M. Henry and the illustration is by Harry Wash. Mr. Hinkle is a professor in the Department of Journalism, University of Texas, and was formerly associated with the Department of Journalism, West Texas College, Canyon, which probably accounts for the foothill Caprock effect in the caricature.

The quotation which appeared in the Auxiliary accompanying the drawing, is as follows: "Douglas Meador fills his "Trail Dust" column in the Matador (Tex) Tribune with writing like this: "Along the highway of futile hopes blooms the fragile and sweetly-perfumed flowers of meditation; tiny gardens made dewy with dismal tears." He's one of the big state's most quoted.

'I am especially grateful for the tribute paid Trail Dust." Meador declared, "and regret I had missed the particular issue of the Auxiliary in which it appeared. Some thoughtful person associated with the Chicago office sent a copy of the May 9 issue, the original drawing by Mr. Walsh and the zinc etching. 
