

Heavy Loss Sustained in Spectacular Fire

AT SUNRISE yesterday the Hughs-Cook Implement Company and Hughs-Cook Company service station charred and blackened walls. Loss was estimated at between \$200,000 and \$300,000. Bill McCaghen, whose Conoco wholesale office was located in the building, was able to save part of the company records, two trailers and an adding machine. It was Matador's most costly

and spectacular fire since the old courthouse was destroyed in 1944. The building and contents will probably be classed as a total loss with the exception of the gasoline pumps located in the filling station driveway. The building was constructed in 1929 and belonged to Mrs. Edith Parker of 1806 Oak Drive, Amarillo. Bill Pipkin insurance agency said he carried approximately \$23,000 protection on the

building and contents, but of the amount. Mrs. Parker had only \$2,000 on the building. Arriving here yesterday after the fire, she said she would probably rebuild this fall.

Gasoline Cause Of Fire
Ed Hughs, manager of the implement company and filling station, said yesterday afternoon that he believed the fire resulted from a spark igniting some gasoline he had spilled. Mr. Hughs

said he had driven a combine to the back of the building shortly before sunup and went into the shop to sharpen a sickle for the reaper. In moving the sickle he struck a container of gasoline and spilled it on the floor. Realizing the danger of the gasoline and sparks from the sickle grinder, he started to spray the spilled gasoline from a water hose in the back of the shop but found the faucet would not open

except when forced with a pair of pinchers. He went outside to the combine to find a pair of pinchers in the tool box. When he looked back the entire shop was a mass of flames. He thought it might have been possible that spreading gasoline fumes were ignited by a spark from an air compressor.

Because of the south wind many of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department members living in the south part of town, did not hear the fire signal. A second signal was necessary to bring up the second fire truck.

Burning oil, tar roofing and construction of the building made a stubborn problem for the firemen. The city's entire fire-fighting equipment was employed during the hour required to bring the blaze under control. For a time the Methodist church was believed endangered because of the heat and smoke carried by the wind. Spectacular nature of the fire brought most of the city's residents to the scene before the blaze was extinguished.

Bill McCaghen told the Tribune late yesterday that his Conoco wholesale office had been moved to Campbell Chevrolet Company, from which point service will be resumed as usual.

More Rotary Hoes Are Put Into Use In Cotton Fields

COLLEGE STATION—Texas cotton producers last year equipped almost four times as many tractors with rotary hoes as in 1949. The number jumped from 7,000 in 1949 to 26,000 in 1952. That word comes from Fred C. Elliott, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and he says, the popularity of this equipment is due to its labor-saving value.

The rotary hoe is especially good, says Elliott for controlling the early weed growth, but the equipment must be properly adjusted and the tractor operated at the right ground speed for best results.

The tractor should be operated in third gear at speeds up to five or six miles an hour. An experienced operator, under favorable conditions, can do a good job at even faster speeds, says the specialist.

The picker wheels should be set so they will break the surface crust to a depth of one-half to three-fourths of an inch. When properly adjusted, the picker wheels break up the surface crust and also tear up the soil so that seedling weeds and grass are exposed to the action of the sun and wind before they have a chance to come through the ground and before their root systems become established.
