Adopted unanimously while members who served with Eubank in the House stood at attention was a resolution declaring Eubank the "personification of all that is best in the American tradition."

Copies of the resolution were ordered sent to the members of his family and the House ordered that its adjournment be in honor of the former member's memory and service to his state and Nation.

MEMORIAL RITES ANNOUNCED FOR PVT. J. C. McMAHAN

Memorial services will be held for Pvt. J. C. McMahan, Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Baptist Church, it was announced this week. Pvt. McMahan lost his life in action in Belgium on January 22.

Fleming Post American Legion chapter of Motley County will have charge of the service, which will include a Flag service, hymns, Words of Memory and Tribute, Scripture and prayer by Rev. G. E. Turrentine, pastor of the local Methodist Church, quartet singing, and the memorial message by Rev. H. G. Verner, Baptist pastor. The Legion will have charge of the closing phase of the service.

J. C. McMahan was born at Sherman, Texas, December 23, 1919, and was killed in action January 22, 1945, at the age of 25 years and 29 days. He was married to Miss Mary Gaines at Floydada, Texas, June 28, 1940. In addition to his young widow, he is survived by their son, Larry Lamar, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. N. McMahan, one sister, Mary Joyce and a younger brother, Bobby Ray McMahan, of McLean, and another brother, S/Sgt. Mabry E. McMahan in the armed forces, based in Agra, India.

Pvt. McMahan entered the service of his country in July, 1944 and following 17 weeks of training at Camp Hood, left from Ft. Meade, Maryland for overseas duty. His parents came to Matador when he was a small child, and he was reared in this community, receiving his education here and graduating from Matador High School in 1938.

Former Resident Awarded Honors

S/Sgt. Ervin G. Clower, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Clower of Roswell, N. M., former Matador resident, has been awarded the Purple Heart, Air Medal and Distinguished Flying Cross, according to a message received from his wife at Houston. Sgt. Clower is a graduate of Matador high school, class of 1939.

Honors were awarded him for heroic efforts as a bomber engineer in preventing fire of a gasoline-flooded plane struck by flak after it had dumped bombs in the Poliski raid, August 17. The plane was forced down in the Adriatic sea, carrying with it all airc sea, carrying with it all crew members except Sgt. Clower and two others. Sgt. Clower removed his trousers, filled the legs with air and remained afloat for 24 hours before being picked up by an Italian fishing boat. A detailed account of his exploit was published in a Roswell newspaper. His ears were injured during the experience and he is recovering in a hospital.

"THUNDER and Lightning blizzard struck this area early Monday morning leaving a blanket of sleet as the mercury stood around freezing much of the day. About nine o'clock Monday night the temperature dropped to 22 and heavy snow began falling, which continued through much of the night. From four to six inches of snow fell in the Matador area with similar amounts reported from other sections of the county. Snow fell at Lubbock and various other South Plains sections. While the temperature dropped lower at Amarillo, only one inch of snow was reported.

Violent thunder and lightning accompanied the sleet storm here early Monday, while the temperature stood at 22. Clear skies and warmer weather Tuesday melted lots of the snow. City engineer Herman Stanfield said that the total precipitation registered here at the city wells rain gauge was .70 inch.

TWO A. M. FIRE ALARM

Matador fire alarm sounded at exactly 2 a. m. Tuesday morning when the snow storm was at its height. A stove left burning at the Mission Gas & Oil Company station ignited soot in the flue and gave the appearance of the building being on fire. Matador Volunteer Fire Department responded and shut off the stove. Fire chief Cecil Shelton said no damage was sustained, although it is probable that a fire might have resulted if the oil stove had continued to burn.

Snow dregs were clearing the Highway early Tuesday and aiding stalled vehicles back on the pavement. Several vehicles were reported stalled south of Matador. Only injury resulting from the storm was reported by Ed Smith, Matador ranch line rider, whose horse slipped and fell with him Tuesday afternoon. Mr. Smith sustained a sprained ankle.

The W-2 calculations will be made on a 10 per cent deduction basis. In filing W-2 returns, persons who had more than one employer during 1944 must send in W-2s from all employers with the figures totaled on the last one received.

And, persons using form 1040 must attach their W-2 receipts to the form when they file. Full tax payments must accompany form 1040 when it is filed and March 15 is the deadline.

Pneumonia Deaths Decrease In Texas During Past Year

According to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, pneumonia caused over 2,800 deaths last year in Texas, a reduction over the previous year but still too high. It is more prevalent during the winter and spring months.

Pneumonia is usually caused by a germ called the pneumococcus, which many of us have lurking in our throats ready to start trouble when our resistance to it is lowered. We can keep up our resistance by avoiding undue fatigue and avoiding unnecessary exposure to extreme weather conditions. When we go out into the cold, additional wraps should be sufficient to protect us. Keeping the temperature of our homes as low as is consistent with comfort will greatly lessen the difficulties encountered in adjusting ourselves to the cold when we go out.

Another method of prevention in pneumonia is not to neglect a cold for the common cold often results in pneumonia when neglected. A person with a severe cold should stay at home and call his physician as a precautionary measure. Then he should follow his physician's advice until the cold has disappeared.

The successful treatment of a pneumonia case often depends upon beginning treatment very early. That is why a physician should be called at once in such cases. A patient may really have beginning pneumonia when he thinks it is only a cold. If the physician's advice is sought for the cold he will have an opportunity to start treatment early if pneumonia occurs in such cases.

Have chops cut 1/2 inch thick; season and brown well. Combine remaining ingredients and place in greased casserole. Top with browned chops, pressing in slightly. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 45 minutes or until chops are done. Serves 5.

Baked Potatoes in a Mayonnaise
6 large baking potatoes 1 egg separated
1/2 c. mayonnaise 1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper

Bake potatoes in hot oven (450° F.) 1 hour or until done. Cut a slice from top of each and scoop out potato. Mash, add mayonnaise, egg yolk and seasonings. Refill shells. Beat egg white until stiff and heap lightly on top of each potato. Place in 350° F. oven until brown. Serves 6.

Or maybe it was his experience

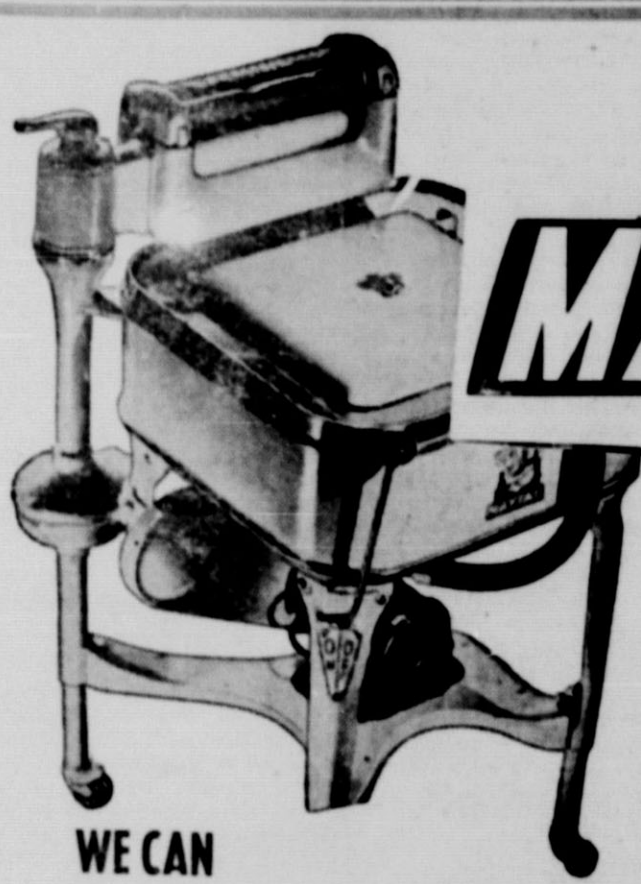

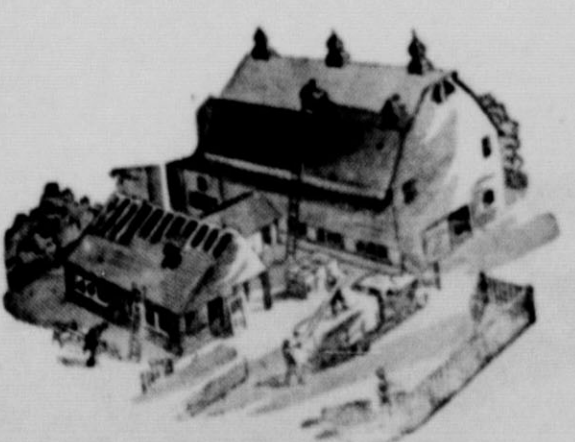

Dear Ben and Mrs. Ben:
Just received five copies of the Tribune and really enjoyed them. They were the first in over two months, so you see they were doubly welcome. I was sorry to read about Travis McDonald and Dale Bourland. I see a lot of the boys from their outfit and I always ask about them, but so far I haven't found anybody acquainted with them. I don't remember Dale very well, but Travis was one of the best boys I have ever known. Has there been any news from the Hough boy in the Philippines?

Ben I suppose the folks at home were a little worried during Jerry's big push, but believe it or not we never had any doubt about how it would turn out. The boys here really have confidence in our leaders. I am still in France but we are all hoping to be in Jerryland before long.

Well, I had to stop and listen to one of the boys tell about getting "fruit-hungry" as he says. He was on the front and advancing under enemy machine gun fire when he saw an apple tree with five big red apples left on it, so he crawled over to the tree and picked up a chunk and knocked them down, ate them and continued the advance. I could just see this old farmer boy keeping his head down below the gun fire, but getting those apples. To me it is an example of why our boys are whipping the Jerry at every turn.

Ben, I am enclosing a little money to help keep the presses rolling. Now don't fuss, because I am getting the bargain in this case. Thanks a million for what you are doing for all of us. Write if you have time.

almost given up hopes of ever seeing another Tribune it happened", he wrote, "I received five today, and words can't express how much I appreciate them. ... I have not finished all of them, but did enjoy the pictures a lot that were in the December 21 edition. If improvements such as moving all those buildings and new additions going up, continue, Matador will be like a new place when some of the fellows get back."

"I know I could be stationed in places worse than this. The climate is almost ideal except for so much rain, and it's the dry season now. Only a few days ago we were wading in mud and water ankle-deep. Should not be too long until our permanent area is all set up. When we first arrived we lived in pup tents for a week or so, and also ate C rations, but that is history. Now we have larger tents and a mess kitchen set up and the food is far from bad. There are still some Japs on this island, but they only show up, so they say, when they get hungry. Also had air raid alerts once or twice, and I found that out next morning, for I am a sound sleeper. One of the first things I did was to get a sore hand and it came about from not knowing how to open a coconut the right way!"

"There is a Lt. Powers in our Squadron, who hails from Lubbock; said his father once owned a cotton gin near Matador. Also he was a classmate of Jack Robinson at Tech, and asked about him. Am sure several will remember a Nash, who played football at Tech. He is in our sqd. Also met several others from home, another Lieutenant and one from Plainview and Quanah, and Bernie Howell, who played over K. F. Y. O. at Lubbock. Lt.
