**Suitable Items Listed**  
In a letter to Federated Women's clubs of this district, Miss Elizabeth Manar, Social Service Department of Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls listed suitable items for the patients and requested that gift wrapping be supplied with each gift.

"The wrapping is part of the occupational therapy for the patient," she explained. "This project," she wrote, "is based on the hope and prayer that men, women, and children with a big heart will buy a small gift so that each patient, young and old will have a remembrance from a friend on Christmas morning. The cost of the gift is not important, but to know that someone cares enough to send a gift brings a tear of joy to the eyes of a very grateful patient, ranging in age from 12 to 80 or more."

For men, gifts suggested included combs, brushes, socks, scarves, ties, cassettes, tobacco, smoking pipes, shaving cream, after-shave lotion, shampoo, bath powder, fishing equipment, baseball equipment, any wearing apparel, gloves, cuff links, tie clasps.

Gifts suggested for women include any costume jewelry, cosmetics, cologne, hose, handbags, ribbons, scarves, bobby pins, hair pins, combs, brushes, deodorants, compacts, flowers (for hair, etc.) any wearing apparel new or used; evening gowns, boxed candy and cakes.

Also listed were overall gifts such as electric irons, used typewriters, radios, phonograph records, playing cards, dominoes, crochets and embroidery thread, knitting yarn, stamping patterns for embroidery, and cash for use in repairs for radio, TV, etc., for which the state does not provide.

All packages going to distant cities should be in the post office by December 10. Other mail should be sent on its way as soon as possible, and all local mail should be in the post office no more than a week or ten days later. This kind of co-operation would mean that all Christmas mail would be delivered on or before Christmas Eve, the Postmaster explained.
