AWARDS BANQUET PLANS COMPLETE

Program plans for the annual Motley 4-H Clubs Achievement Awards Banquet have been completed and the programs have been prepared. The banquet will be held Tuesday evening, November 14, in the Legion building, starting at 7 p. m.

Invocation will be by Rev. Miller Robinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church here and benediction will be delivered by Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor of the First Methodist Church. Speaker James L. "Curley" Hays will be introduced by Miss Jane Hamilton. The address will be followed by the presentation of awards.

She divided her time between her children, and had earlier resided here with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Dirckson. Her death was attributed to a heart attack, although she had been in failing health for six months.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church at Wheeler, Texas, with Kirk funeral home of Wheeler in charge of arrangements. Burial was at Wheeler by the side of her husband, who died March 9, 1957.

Lena Buessing Guthrie was born June 5, 1874 in Lavaca County, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Buessing. She was married on March 9, 1895 in Lavaca County, to Lem Guthrie.

They continued to live in Lavaca County for 11 years, moving to Baylor County in 1906 and from there to Matador in 1914. They made their home here until 1930 when they moved to Wheeler and later to Eden.

Mrs. Guthrie was a member of the Methodist Church. Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Lemmie Day and Mrs. Lilly Edmondson of Tipton, and Mrs. L. H. Dirckson of Matador; one son, Lamar Guthrie of Hollis, Okla.; four grandchildren; four great-grandchildren; and five sisters, Mrs. Freda Rich of Shiner, Texas, Mrs. Minnie Ludwig of Luling, Mrs. Hattie Schornick of New Orleans, La., Mrs. Joe Smith of Yoakum.

Dynamic Address Honors Veterans

RELIGION AND FREEDOM ARE INSEPARABLE, Jimmy Willson Jr., Floydada businessman, civic and religious leader, declared here Tuesday as principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club.

It was a dynamic address in which Willson paid tribute to the veterans of all wars who have purchased the freedom of this nation through their sacrifices.

"We must be vigilant in the protection of this rich heritage and be neither led nor driven to destruction," he said.

In a quotation from Lincoln he said, "If destruction be our lot, we must be the author and finisher of it." "We need a renewed philosophy of living and we need to return to a simple basis," Willson said, "and we need to participate in government from community to community. Do you care what is happening to our country?" he asked.

At the beginning of his address Willson announced that what he would say had been said many times before, and should be repeated endlessly until the people of America returned to the bedrock of religious training. "We must live by what is right and not by what is legal," he said, "and we must accept the responsibility of our God-given right of individual choice. We need to revitalize our spiritual advancement our nation's great advancement our nation has made in science, agriculture, economy and a thousand other ways. We must turn to the churches and religion that has made our nation great..." He was introduced by Lion Mayor Bill Seal.

The program was the beginning of an observance of Veterans Day (formerly Armistice Day) Saturday sponsored by the county's two veterans organizations. Churches here will pay further tribute to veterans in sermons and programs Sunday.

The First State Bank will be closed Saturday in observance of the legal holiday. Places of business which do not observe the holiday otherwise, are asked to fly flags in a tribute to veterans.

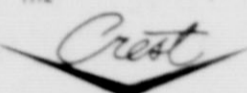
