(Editor's Note: Mrs. Morris, grandmother of Pup Price of Lubbock, wrote this interesting letter in the 1950s to Verlin Reeves.)

I boarded the train in Hico, Texas, with my brother-in-law C.D.Bird in March, 1893. We spent the night in Ft. Worth. Next morning we took the Ft. Worth and Denver and spent the night in Childress. It was a small town, only one hotel, just a plank only one hotel, just a plank building. There were very few houses there. I was awakened some time in the night with the howling of coyotes. I had never heard their howl before. I didn't feel very comfortable with them

so close by.

Next morning we took the mail hack for Matador. We traveled all day and reached Matador in all day and reached Matador in late afternoon. The driver of the mail hack was Jon Cammack, brother of Ed Cammack of Matador. The roads were very rough, just trails. I made several trips on that line. I remember one

trips on that line. I remember one in particular. They drove little Spanish mules on that trip.

At Northfield they changed teams. There was a big tank of water close by. Got hitched up and off we started, the mules running and pitching and ran through that tank. That hack was bobbing around like a cark. bobbing around like a cork Nothing fell out but we got we feet and a good scare.

Irises Purple? by Marisue Potts

The old reliable purple flags of yesterday's pioneer homes have been replaced by newer, more exotic varieties as a drive through the streets of Matador

Over at Keith Patton's irises come in all shades, types, and varieties. Orange, pink, yellow and yellow and orange, violet and yellow and orange, violet and yellow,dark red,blue,white, and even some purple blossoms vie for the passerby's attention. Named for Iris, Greek goddess of the rainbow, the plant normally grown by bulbs or rhizomes,can have 20 or 30 seeds in a seed pod which might produce that many different colors.



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

Local Youth To Participate In 4-H Contest in Vernon



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My History Of The West (Continued From Page 1)

We spent one Christmas at the Matador Ranch and had dinner at the Bob Haileys. Three couples of us decided to go to Dickens City to a Christmas dance and

supper. It was bitter cold and we were late getting started. We got within ten miles of Dickens and the horses shied at something. The driver dropped one of his lines, and in the scramble for the line, the horses

got out of the road and into a ditch. Broke an axle and there ditch. Broke an axle and there we were, not a house in sight.

One couple, Clara Currie and

Walter Jackson, were in a buggy. They took me and Miss Lou Darden in the buggy with them and the boys, Jon Jackson them and the boys, Jon Jackson and Jim Thompson, rode the horses bareback into Dickens. So we danced and had supper, and the next day faced that bitter cold back to Matador and on to

the spring Charlie Bird built more on to his house. We had two rooms then and a long porch two rooms then and a long porch across the two rooms and little bedroom on the end of the porch. We felt like we were in a mansion. Mrs. Bird and I decided we would plant us a Turnip Patch. We didn't have a horse that would work single, so we each took turns at pulling the plow. Some job!! But we got it done and planted our turnips.

Our postoffice was six miles away so we didn't get mail very often. It was at Beckton, later

often. It was at Beckton, later moved to Afton. The Colliers kept the postoffice and a small stock of groceries and a few other It was handy for the

Most of the settlers made two rips to the railroad at Quanah-spring and fall -for their supplies. It would take about eight days to make the trip. On one of the trips I went along with Joe Jackson and his daughter, Annie, and Sallie Whitaker and Mrs. Dovie and his son, Luke. Next morning we were eating breakfast and Luke got up and

got his gun. He shot a big rattler right at my back, coiled in a prairie dog hole. I had several close calls with the rattlesnakes.
