Littlefield, Crosbyton, and Dimmitt.

In addition, clinics were shut down in Silverton and Floydada last September. "Not because of money problems," said Hawley. "But because we couldn't get medical personnel to locate there.

Closing the six outlying offices cut the number of SPHPO clinics on the South Plains nearly in half. Seven clinics re-main: two in Amarillo and one each in Panhandle, Hereford, Muleshoe, Mata-dor and the headquarters clinic in Plainviev

Hawley said while money has been an "ongoing problem for a long time, it came to a head in 1992-93 — due in large part to mandatory changes imposed by the government. We had no control over them and we didn't get any additional money to pay for them.

Hawley cited the major mandates as: Compliance with the new disabilities law; stiffer regulations on medical labs nationwide, which led to the hiring of an additional staff person at a cost of \$50,000 per year; and having to double physician

We had to do that to recruit and retain doctors," said Hawley. "Their average salary is now \$110,000 a year. When I came here six years ago, it was \$55,000 to \$60,000.

"In addition to upping the pay, we have to provide fringe benefits. We're in competition with everyone else in the nation when it comes to recruiting physicians

The county governments in Texas perform two basic functions: (1) they carry out the administrative and judicial responsibili-ties for the state and (2) they carry out local government responsibilities for county residents. All counties in Texas regardless of population or land areas have exactly the same form of govern-ment except forminor differences in some urban counties where the state has alurban counties where the state has al-lowed for additional officers and courts. The Commissioners Court is the most

important governing body of the county. The County Judge presides over the meetings and sees that they are carried on in an orderly manner. It is really not a court but an administrative body for the county affairs. The court must meet once each month and the regular meeting is the 2nd Monday of each month. Any three members of the court may consti-tute a court.

around the District Court and is recorder, registrar and custodian of all court plead-ings, instruments and papers that are part of any District Court case. There are many other jobs this person attends to. The County Clerk generally serves as clerk to both the Commissioners Court

and the County Courts. The clerk is re-sponsible for the filing, indexing and recording of all legal instruments affectand ing real property titles, such as deeds, deeds of trust, mortgages, contracts, etc. They also record births and deaths, de-

layed birth certificates, etc. County Treasurer is the chief custo-dian of the county finances handling money in a safe and responsible manner, paying whatever needs to be done. County Tax Assessor-Collector assess and collects property taxes, issues certifi-cate of title and license plates for motor vabicles atc.

vehicles, etc

CountyAttorney is required to have alicense to practice law. Motley County has a Special Prosecutor who is in the county one day a week to care for the duties assigned.

Justice of the Peace is elected from as busice of the reace is elected from each Justice of the Peace precinct. This varies depending upon the population of the county. The J.P. Court has jurisdic-tion in criminal cases where the fine does not exceed \$200 and may also serve as coroner if there is no medical examiner.

The Sheriff is the principal law en-forcement officer in the county and has jurisdiction over the entire county to prevent criminal actions and to arrest offenders. In counties with a population under 10,000 and where there has been no vote to separate the two offices, the Sheriff may also be the Tax Assessor.
