November 11 - Veterans Day

A day to remember the men and women of war

As November 11 approaches we remember Armistice Day, now known as Veterans Day. We remember those men and women who gave their lives and efforts in military service for our country.

Just before Homecoming this year, while visiting in Matador, Lila Meador brought in a picture of Paul Eubank in his Navy uniform for us to put in the Homecoming paper. But since it was so close to November 11, we decided to save this picture of Paul for the November 11 issue of the Tribune. Paul was not a native of Motley County but he taught in Matador Elementary School, was Boy Scout Master, and he was also the instigator of the Father and Son Banquet which is held every year, and he was elected as our State Representative.

He was a Lieutenant in the Navy and was Pilot of a Fighter Plane based on an Aircraft Carrier. He was killed when his plane went off the deck of the carrier into the ocean. His body was never recovered. He was killed in 1944.

We decided that if we ran his story in the paper it would only be fitting to name the other Navy, Army and Marines who had been killed or missing in action, wounded or taken prisoner

during 1944.

Our source of information was copies of the Matador Tribune for 1944. If anyone has been overlooked who served in the armed forces in 1944 and were wounded, missing in action, killed, or taken prisoner, the error was not intentional.

Sgt. Ray Webb, Matador, was a ball turret gunner on a B-24. He was shot down over Austria. As he dropped by parachute he was shot in his right hand. When he landed he was taken prisoner by the Germans. He was freed from prison by allied troops and returned to Matador.

Lt. Kenneth Simpson, Matador, U.S.M.C. died in a plane crash state-side.

Ensign T.E. Long, Roaring Springs, Navy Bomber pilot, went down somewhere in the Gilbert Islands.

Pvt. Garland Hollar, Roaring Springs, Missing in Action.

Lt. W.B. Gilbert, Flomot, Dive Bomber pilot USMC, killed in action.

Sgt. Malcolm Reinhardt, Matador, Prisoner, after fall of Corregidor.

Sgt. S.A. Swim, Roaring Springs, turret gunner on flying fortress, was taken prisoner and was released and he returned to Roaring Springs.

Philip Graves, Prisoner after the fall of the Philippines.

Lt. John William Sherwood, Roaring Springs, killed in plane crash at Cherry Point, N.C.

PFC Travis McDonald, Northfield, paratrooper, killed somewhere in France.

T/Sgt. Harold Faulkner, murdered in San Antonio, Texas.

CPL Dale Bourland, Flomot, Paratrooper, killed in action in Holland.

Pvt. 1st Class Gilbert McMahan, died at Fort Benning, Ga.

PFC John W. Garrison, Flomot, wounded in action somewhere in the South Pacific.

PFC Raymond Kingery, Roaring Springs, wounded in action in France.

Pvt. Waldo Scott, Missing in Action in Italy.

Pvt. Wesley H. Irwin, Japanese War prisoner.

Lewis McDonald, Northfield, paratrooper, killed in action in France.

PFC Lonnie Terry, Whiteflat, wounded in action in Italy.

Joe Berry Meador, wounded in Italy.

Pvt. Clifford O. Anderson, Darden Canyon, missing in action in Italy.

T/5 Joe Anderson, Darden Canyon, with tank Battalion, wounded in action in France.

Pvt. 1st Class Clyde Smallwood, Matador, Bouguinsville wounded while escaping from Japanese ambush.

Armistice Day Proclaimed In 1919

A holiday proclaimed annually by the President of the United States and the state governors in honor of former members of the United States Armed Forces to recall their sacrifice in wars and contributions in peace, November 11 was first proclaimed Armistice Day in 1919 to commemorate the signing on

November 11, 1918 of the Armistice that brought an end to the World War I. "The war to end all wars."

Armistice Day continued to be observed on November 11 through 1953 on June 1, 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed an act of Congress to honor Veterans of all wars since the Spanish American War on November 11 of each year, a day

dedicated to World Peace.

Veterans Day came into being with observances held in towns and cities throughout the United States and in Arlington National Cemetery outside of Washington, D.C.

The holiday was celebrated on the fourth Monday in October from 1971 until 1977. In 1978 the traditional date of November 11 was restored.

One Vehicle Accident Claims Life of Local Man

One man was fatally injured and one man was hospitalized when the pickup they were driving overturned in a one-vehicle accident which occurred at approximately a short time before 12:30 a.m. Wednesday, November 6.

Wayne Teague, age unknown, of Matador was pronounced dead at the scene and Ronnie Price, age unknown, was taken by AeroCare helicopter to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Motley County Sheriff Jim Meador stated that he received the call reporting the accident at approximately 12:30 a.m. Wednesday, November 6. Motley County Ambulance and Motley County Volunteer Fire Department were also alerted.

When he arrived at the scene it appeared that an 80's model extended cab Ford pickup had overturned several times, throwing Mr. Price from the vehicle. Mr. Teague was still

in the vehicle. He was wearing a seat belt.

After being examined by EMS, Motley County JP, Cora Smallwood, was called.

At newstime Mr. Price is reported to be in serious but stable condition at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Funeral arrangements are pending for Mr. Teague with Campbell Funeral Home in Spur.

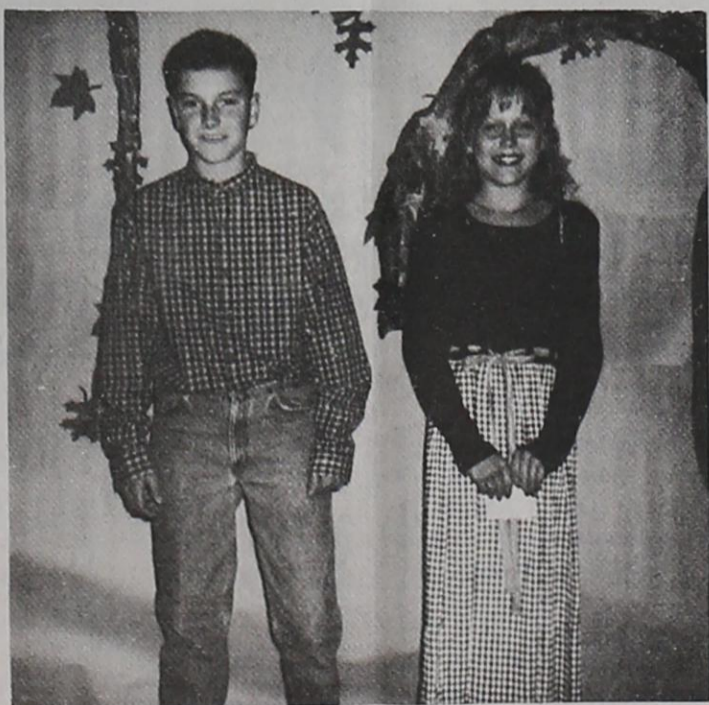

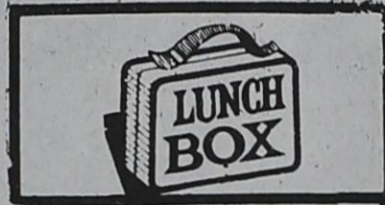
The Motley County Matadors traveled to Springlake-Earth Friday and found out why they are the second ranked 1-A school in Texas.

We also discussed several new fundraising ideas for the basketball season. We hope that the basketball parents will come join us at Booster Club. We need you to come and share your ideas with us.

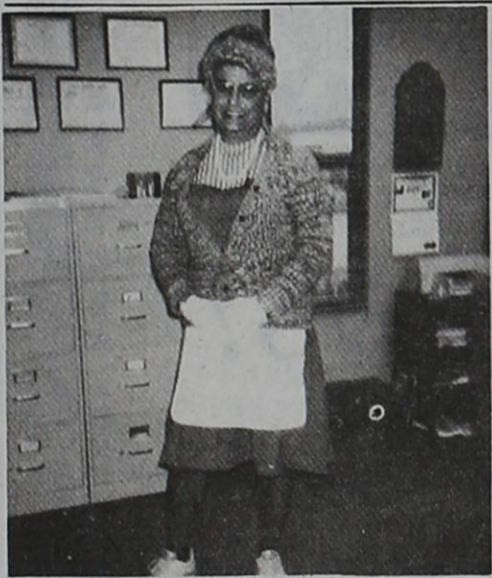

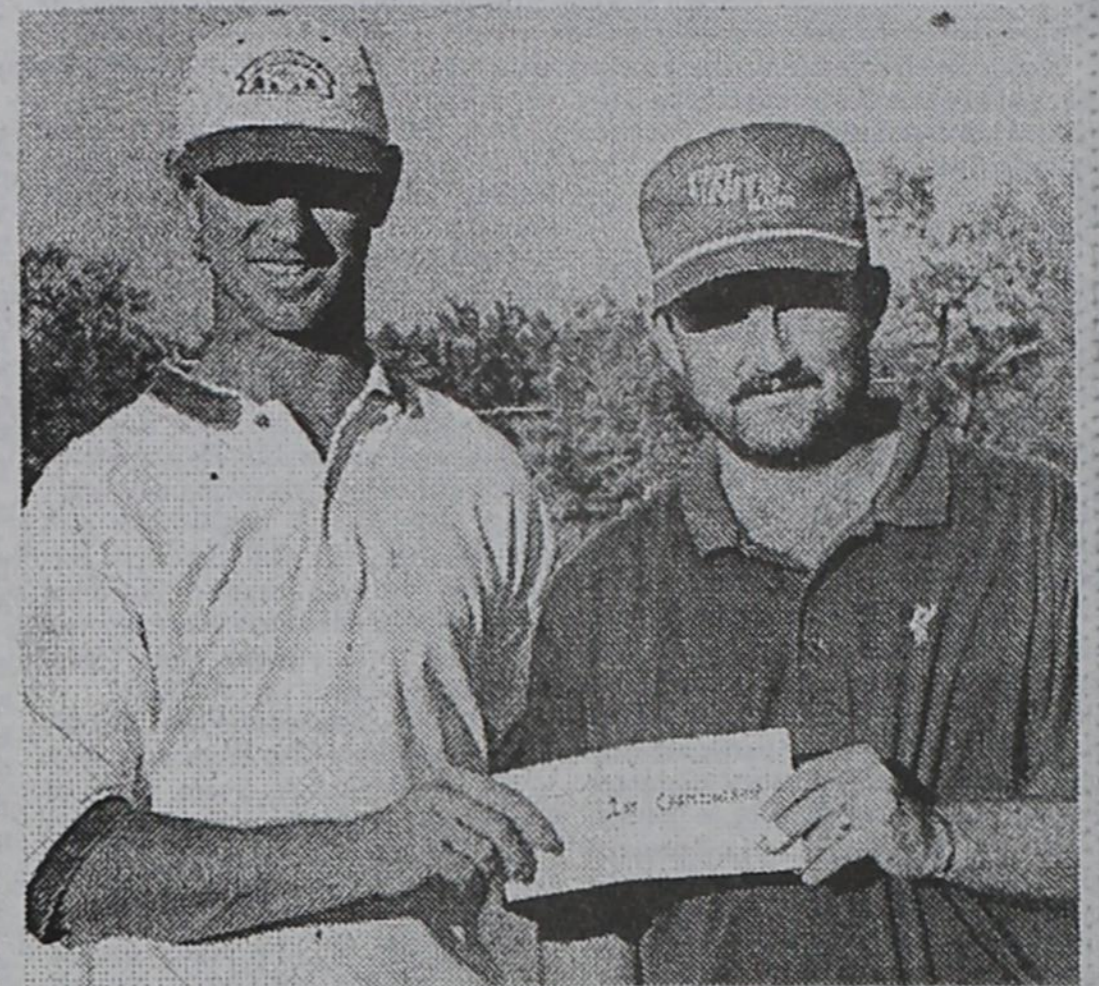

West Texas Nursery Planting Conservation In Motley County

A West Texas nursery is planting conservation in Motley County and throughout two-thirds of the state, while also lending a helping hand to High Plains producers.

For the last 18 years the Texas Forest Service (TFS) West Texas Nursery (WTN) has grown windbreak seedlings, evergreen and deciduous trees and shrubs, for landowners from the coast of Corpus Christi to Texline in the Panhandle. The WTN's primary objective is to produce and sell quality seedlings at a price that landowners can afford, enabling them to plant large quantities of trees to establish multiple row windbreaks.

Windbreaks are trees and shrubs systematically planted adjacent to fields, homesteads, or feedlots as a barrier to reduce or redirect the wind. They create permanent, natural protection and habitat for wildlife, reduce erosion and increase land value and aesthetics.

Annually, WTN grows approximately 200,000 evergreens of eight different species in its two irrigated greenhouses and about 400,000 bare-root seedlings in its eight-acre field nursery. The trees are grown from seed collected by nursery staff.

Each year the seedlings are sold and delivered through Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) and over 90 other SWCD's around the state. The date of delivery, beginning in February, is dependent on the planting season within the delivery region.

But the WTN's service does not halt at production. Nursery staff members also assist High Plains producers by taking conservation from the greenhouse to the field. Upon the request of a High Plains landowner, the TFS WTN will meet with the landowner, discuss the protection needs and design a windbreak plan according to those needs. Landowners willing to follow the guidelines listed

within their plan are then personally assisted by the TFS in planting the windbreak. (Qualifying landowners must own at least 160 acres.)

The TFS supplies a tree planter, which plants 400 to 500 seedling per hour, and a fabric layer, rolling out a UV synthetic fabric over the seedlings. The fabric conserves moisture and reduces weeds.

The TFS assists in planting field, livestock, homestead and wildlife windbreaks and living snow fences. In

1995 the TFS assisted High Plains landowners in planting 14 miles of windbreaks.

Producers, be it the farmer or rancher, interested in windbreak protection can begin ordering seedlings this fall for the 1997 planting season through Upper Pease SWCD. The 1996 High Plains Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Control Program came to an end October 31.

The 1996 Program, hampered by an unsettling lack of enthusiasm from the producers it is designed to protect, treated approximately 3 million acres of cotton in this year's effort to reduce the overwintering population that will invade 1997 cotton crops.

"There is no doubt that this year's program was successful, even with a limited operational capacity, and will provide a direct benefit to producers in many areas of the High Plains, whether they supported the program or not," said PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson.

Johnson adds that, even though the limited program will be beneficial, without the full support of both producers and allied industry it is unlikely the goal of removing the boll weevil from the High Plains will be accomplished.

The following is a break-down of the three diapause applications made this year.

- 1st application - 1,400,000 acres.
- 2nd application - 1,300,000 acres
- 3rd application - 300,000 acres

More information about the 1996 Program will be released as soon as it becomes available.

ible Land (HEL) in the Texas High Plains is given every opportunity to remain in the CRP.

PCG notes in its statement the tremendous benefits that have accrued as a result of participation in the CRP.

The proposed regulations utilize an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) similar to the one used during the 13th CRP sign-up. PCG is recommending a reevaluation of the EBI in order to ensure bids submitted for HEL from this area are judged fairly and that no single factor is inadvertently given priority during the process.

In a related area PCG is also preparing a statement concerning 1996 Farm Bill rules for conservation compliance on HEL and areas designated as wetlands. HEL and wetlands conservation are a major part of the current law.

PCG will seek to encourage the adoption of conservation compliance rules that provide adequate levels of local control, do not unfairly create undue economic hardship for the producer and are enforced in a common-sense manner.

BENEFICIARIES SHOULD REPORT CHANGE OF ADDRESS NOW

If you're a Social Security beneficiary and you moved recently, be sure to notify the Social Security Administration (SSA) as soon as possible. Failure to report their new address when they move is the most frequent reason beneficiaries do not receive their Social Security checks.

If your benefits are directly deposited into your bank account, you may not have remembered to notify SSA when you moved. But Social Security needs your current address so you can receive agency notices about your benefits. And now you're approaching the time of year when it's particularly important that SSA has your correct address. For example, in January you will be mailed a Social Security Benefit Statement (Form SSA-1099). You need this form to determine whether or not you will have to pay federal income tax on any Social Security benefits you received in 1996.

To report an address change, contact your local office or call SSA's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. any business day.

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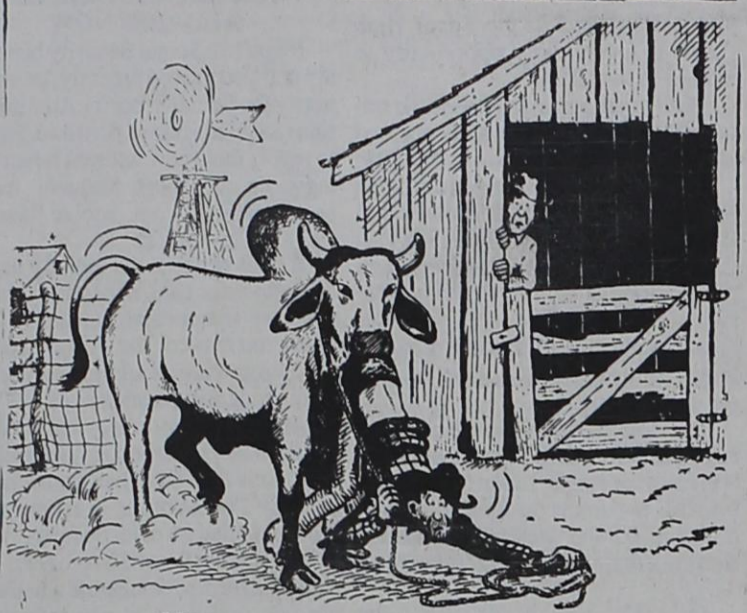
