


Bazaar Announced By Arts and Crafts





New Year Giving Royal Custom

The Saxons learned from the Romans the idea of giving presents at New Year's. Grad-ually in England it became cus-tomary for subjects to send costly gifts to their monarchs. Often the royal wardrobes were kept almost completely sup-plied by these annual presents. Queen Elizabeth accumulated so the story goes — hundreds of pairs of jeweled gloves. This practice continued in Great

Britain until the era of Crom-well and the Commonwealth. German boys and girls carry presents to their teachers, apples being given in some cases. In this country, too, peo-ple send New Year's Day greet-ings; but on this date presents are usually given only to ser-

vants, postmen, or janitors. Gifts and greeting cards are exchanged in France on the first day of the year. Children often make small tokens for their parents, and present them, with good wishes for the New Year. Shopowners usually send something to their patrons; and at this date servants and clerks sometimes get an extra month's

Refusal to Work

Out of work? To millions of people in that predicament, unemployment compensation has been a Godsend. But in order to collect those weekly checks, you have to be willing to take another job if one turns up.



ing do you have to be? If the job is good but the hours are bad, must you accept anyhow-or lose your right to compensation?

Generally speaking, the law makes reasonable allowance for hardship cases. For example: An unemployed woman was of-

fered a job on the night shift at a nearby factory. When she refused to take it, her unemployment compensation was cut off. But in a court hearing, she told the judge that she would have had to walk home in the dark through a tough neighborhood-and that she had been terrorized twice by nocturnal assailants

The judge decided that her refusal to take the job was justified, and ordered her compensation payments reinstated.

That does not mean, however, that you can wait serenely until the perfect job comes along. Another case involved a restaurant worker who, accustomed to working from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m., turned down a job that started two hours later in the day.

"Frankly," he explained, "it's just too hard for me to change my hours. I'm used to the old way. But this time, a court denied his right to unemployment compensation. He was out of work, noted the court, more by choice than by necessity.

Suppose a job that is offered would create religious conflicts. A number of cases have arisen involving Seventh-Day Adventists who were not willing to work on

Almost invariably, the courts have accepted this as a legitimate reason for rejecting a job, with no effect on the person's right to collect unemployment compensation. "Work which requires one to

Simply stated, the Gregorian calendar provides that years divisible by four, except for the years numbering the centuries, shall have 366 days, and the century-marking years shall be leap years — and have 366 days — only if divisible by four after the ciphers have been removed. For example, the year year 2000 will be, since it is divisible by four after the last two ciphers are removed
