August 16, 1945

Japan Surrenders
Union Service is Held Wednesday
Victory Announced After Anxious
Wait

"Peace on earth, good will towards
men. The peace of today, and the world

tor of the Matador Methodist Church in
special union services held Wed-
nesday evening at 9 o'clock in the
Baptist Church. A number of personal
expressions of thanksgiving were
given."

September 13, 1945

School Enrollment at
Lowest Ebb In Years

"Matador School System began its
1945-46 term with the lowest enroll-
ment in many years according to fig-
ures released this week by Superintend-
ent B.F. Tunnell. The scholastic roll
dropped from 458 in 1932 to 337 in
1945.

October 25, 1945

Move Started For New Courthouse
Cheap Money is Still Available
Bond Election For \$175,000 Is Called
Old Issue Will Be Absorbed In Plan

"It may not be the time to build, but
it is the time to borrow money to build
Over 100 tax-paying citizens of Mot-
ley County have presented the Com-
missioners Court with a petition ask-
ing that an election be called, which if
passed, would authorize the issuance
of \$175,000.00 for the construction of
a new courthouse.

November 22, 1945

Courthouse Bonds are Approved
Little Interest Shown By Voters

"A new \$175,000.00 courthouse
will be constructed here. A majority of
the 344 voters who went to the polls
Saturday proved the issue according to
unofficial returns.

December 27, 1945

in the Northwest Region of Texas and
came in fortieth. This was the first time
that MCISD has participated and Kathy
Gillespie, the teacher, stated that she
was very proud of her students. She
said that she felt the students learned
about the "ups and downs" of the stock
market as well as the effect that news
events have on the stock market. She
also stated that the class took the as-
signment very seriously and benefitted
from the game.

Mrs. Gillespie participated in the
SMG's Innovative Teacher Contest that
encompassed both Texas and New

Mexico. Each teacher involved in SMG
was asked to write a paper explaining
how the SMG was incorporated in the
class and how the SMG was benefi-
ting the students. Mrs. Gillespie won
this contest!

Mrs. Gillespie, Mrs. Cox and Mr.
Gleghorn were members of the local
teacher's team that competed against
other teacher teams from New Mexico
and Texas. There were twenty-three
teacher teams competing. The teacher's
team finished sixth. The competition
between the teacher team and the stu-
dent team to see who would have the
largest portfolio at the end of the game
was intense.

The Stock Market Game was not
only educational but fun. Mrs. Gillespie
stated that she hopes to have several

Rolling Plains PCA Holds 63rd Annual Meeting

Rolling Plains Production Credit
Association held its Annual Stock-
holders' Meeting in Canadian on Tues-
day, April 29, Childress on Thursday
May 1, and Stamford on Friday, May
2. Lance D. Morris of Crosbyton and
Thomas R. Helton of Wheeler, were
re-elected to the Board of Rolling Plains
PCA. Terry C. O'Neal of Pampa was
chosen by stockholders to represent the
Pampa Branch Office area. Board
members serve three-year terms. Other
Board members are Garon B. Tidwell
of Munday, Dan Henard, Jr. of Well-
ington, Grover Crum of Darrouzett,
Keith Corzine of Stamford, Garner
Schoenhals of Canadian, Dean Turner
of Matador and Jack Reese of Abilene.

Keith Corzine gave the Board
Report to the gathering. Earning the
highest rating possible by the Tenth
District Regulator for the ninth con-
secutive year, the Association main-
tains its Tier I designation. The award
is based on continued strength in capi-
tal, asset quality, management, earn-

ings and liquidity.

The Association made a net profit
after taxes of \$1,989,458. In 1996
Rolling Plains Production Credit As-
sociation loaned more than \$106 mil-
lion to approximately 1,000 borrow-
ers in its 25-county territory.

The Association's Board of Direc-
tors declared a patronage distribution
based on 1996 fiscal year earnings.
Total patronage was \$1,583,358 with
40% being paid at the three sessions of
the Annual Meeting. This patronage
returned 20 1/2 cents for every one
dollar of loan interest accrued on loans
of stockholder-members in 1996.

Stamford. Elected to serve on the 1998

Kenneth and I have traveled about 60,000 miles on the motorcycle, visiting Colorado, New Mexico, Michigan, Missouri, Tennessee, Florida, Georgia and points in between. This is our first trip to Utah. The *New Handbook of Texas*, 1996, a six-volume set published by the Texas State Historical Association, contains at least twenty separate listings pertaining to Motley County. There may be more, but you have to know who to look for in order to find a person or place.

Included in this Handbook is a section on Junius William Motley for whom Motley County is named. Also, information may be found on Motley

County itself as well as Flomot, Matador, Northfield, Roaring Springs, and Whiteflat. Roaring Springs, and I learned that it was first called Jessamine Springs. The Motley County Railway, the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway, the Matador Land & Cattle Company, and the Matador Ranch are business entities listed and described in the *Handbook of Texas*.

There are separate sections on seven different residents of Motley County. These include Charles David Bird, Elizabeth Bundy Campbell, Henry Harrison Campbell, Arthur Byron Cooper, Ben Douglas Meador, Frank N. Mitchell, and Albert Carroll Traweek. Frequent visitors to Motley County, Quanah Parker, also is mentioned.

The *New Handbook of Texas* is full of fascinating historical information about all of Texas.

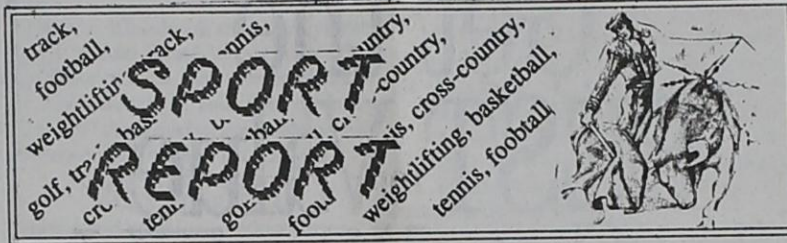

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Town meetings on speed limits scheduled statewide

Citizens who want to comment on the speed limits in Texas are invited to a town meeting scheduled Tuesday, May 13, 1997, 6:00 p.m. on the Childress City Auditorium. The meeting is being held by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS).

The meeting, one of 25 statewide, is being held to get public comment on specific locations where problems may exist regarding speed limits and the procedures used to set speed limits.

In November 1995, Congress repealed the federal law which mandated a national maximum speed limit

of 55 mph, except on rural Interstate quality highways. As a result, speed limits on Texas roads reverted to existing state law. Texas law requires the Texas Transportation Commission to set speed limits on roadways on the state highway system at 70 mph unless an engineering and traffic investigation determines that, for safety measures, the speed limit should be lower.

Beginning in late summer of 1995 and continuing through mid-June 1996, TxDOT conducted studies on the state highway system to identify those road segments that should be posted at speed limits below the maximum provided by state law. As a result of those stud-

ies, and action by the transportation commission, approximately 30,000 miles of the state highway system roadway mileage now has speed limits lower than 70 mph. The 70 mph maximum speed limit is now in effect on about 62 percent of the state system highway mileage.

The installation of new speed limit signs was phased in over a nine-month period from December 1995 through August 1996.

"Moving motorists safely along Texas highways is a job we take very seriously" said David Laney, Texas Transportation Commissioner. "We need to hear from the people who drive the roads, know where problems may exist, and have an opinion on whether the posted speed is too slow or too fast, or just right."

The public input, along with detailed crash studies, will provide comprehensive information for decision makers to help enhance the safety of Texas highways, Laney said.

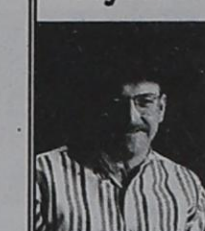
typing skills, knowledge of the keyboard, mouse skills, some word processing and spreadsheet experience, or attended one of the Patton Springs computer classes previously offered.

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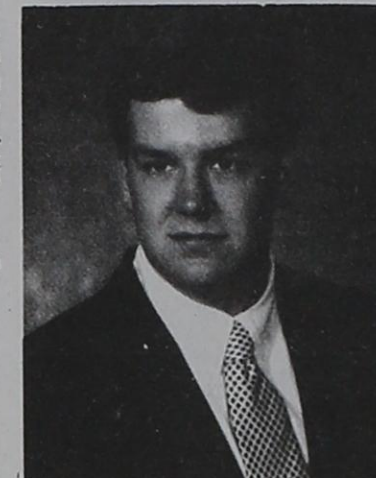
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Jonathan Engle Receives Award

Alexander's Southern Methodist University School of Law classes will begin August 18, 1997. Mr. Alexander is a 1993 graduate of Motley County High School.

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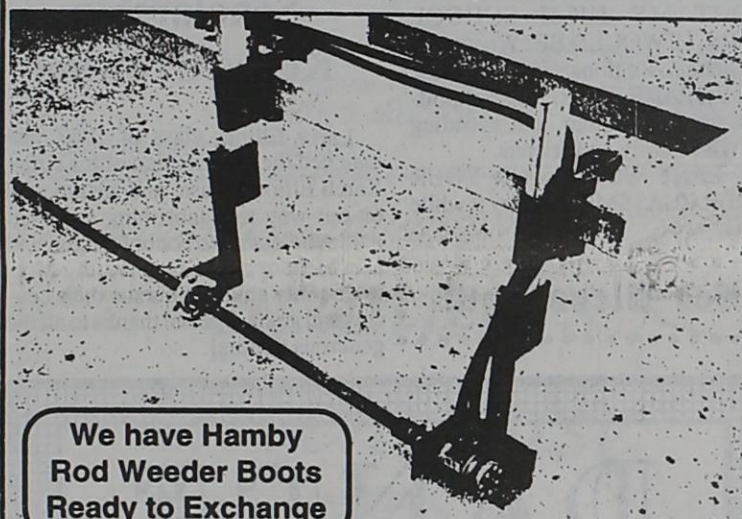
