Three Held Here on Burglary Charge

THREE Lubbock residents, one woman and two men are being held on a burglary charge in Motley County jail, in connection with breaking in and entering Ronnie's store Wednesday night. The second robbery here within a week, a plate glass window was broken, and the loss was estimated at between \$800 and \$900. About 25 ladies pant suits and about 60 pairs of mens pants were missing.

The Lubbock trio was picked up in Lubbock Friday night for violation of the curfew then in effect. In the car were found two pairs of mens pants bearing a cost mark of Ronnie's store. The cost marks were positively identified and the three were placed in jail Saturday night. A bond of \$25,000 has been set for them.

Quitaque, Turkey Schools Consolidate

Quitaque and Turkey residents voted overwhelmingly to consolidate the two schools in an election held Saturday, September 4th. It was the second time that Turkey and Quitaque had voted to consolidate. In an election held earlier in the summer with Flomot, voting for a three school consolidation, the Flomot voters turned it down making it necessary for Turkey and Quitaque to hold another election. If either town had voted against consolidation, the measure would have been defeated although the total vote might have been in favor of the consolidation.

Turkey voted 226 for the merger and 15 against, while Quitaque voted 179 for with 14 against the consolidation. Next on the agenda will be an election on a bond issue to finance the building of a complete new school plant to be located approximately halfway between Turkey and Quitaque. The date for that election will be announced later.

The two boards of trustees have already met (separately) and determined who will remain on each board for the present. Turkey will have four members now and Quitaque three. This will alternate, with Quitaque having four members next term.

Remaining on the Quitaque Board are Buster Chadwick, Jimmy Davidson and Glenn Ramsey. For Turkey the members are Jan Turner, Smitty Guest, Lewis Ferguson and Homer Hawkins.

New Law Controls School Bus Passing

A new State law, effective August 30, will no longer permit Texas motorists to stop and then pass a school bus which is loading or unloading children.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the new law, passed by the 62nd Legislature, applies in both cities and rural areas and requires motorists moving both directions on the same roadway with a school bus to stop and REMAIN STOPPED as long as the flashing lights on the bus are in operation.

Under current law, which applies only in rural areas, drivers must stop for a stopped school bus, but may then proceed around it at a speed of not more than 10 miles per hour if safe to do so.

The new law will not require those vehicles on another roadway of a divided highway to stop, and stops are not required if the bus has stopped in a loading zone of a controlled access highway where pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

Speir noted that provisions of the new law will be strictly enforced to afford maximum protection to the school children of

Matadors Deflame Dragons in Opener

FOOTBALL got into the air for the 1971 season here at Burleson Field Friday night when the Matador Matadors hosted the Paducah Dragons, and defeated their guests 14-0.

The 1970 District 3B champions started their winning plays in the first quarter when they received the Paducah kick-off and marched 39 yards for a touchdown. The Matador defense mowed down the Dragons and made a hole for

quarterback Bill Barnhill who dashed over from the five yard line. Barnhill then maneuvered the ball between the goal posts to put 7 to 0 on the scoreboard.

In the third quarter Barnhill shot a 51 yard scoring pass to end Dwayne "Peanuts" Campbell for the second Matador touchdown. Barnhill booted a successful after touchdown kick for the final score of 14 - 0.

Offensively, fullback Smitty Smith ran 80 yards. Matador's active defense made it possible for the offense to race for 12 first downs, while holding the Dragons to 6.

The Matadors will travel to Crowell Friday night to meet the Class A Wildcats at 8:00 o'clock.

Matador had some good plays and the defense strengthened and smoothed out as the scrimmage went on under Coach Stan Irvine's watchful eye.

"From Spain"

New Spectacular in Palo Duro Canyon

Flaming torches and floating banners transformed the Pioneer Amphitheatre in Palo Duro Canyon State Park for the gala opening, September 2, of the new production, "They Came From Spain."

The new drama tells the story of the first white men to see and report West Texas' sprawling plains and the spectacular chasm that is Palo Duro.

"They Came from Spain" depicts the journey in 1541 of Spanish explorer Francisco Vasquez Coronado and his conquistadors through the arid Southwest in search of gold.

They found no gold, but as the script says, they discovered a vision of something far greater.

Written by Margaret Harper of Canyon, "Spain" is a worthy successor to the popular summer musical "Texas" that concluded its successful season, August 28.

Mrs. Harper is a native West Texan and founder of the theatre in the canyon.

The story of "They Came From Spain," is told in three parts: The creation, mixing Biblical and scientific accounts, through multimedia sound and light effects; the journey, a travelogue film tracing Coronado's journey from Mexico to the Texas Panhandle and third, the canyon featuring a professional cast of characters in the roles of the Spaniards.

'HIGHWAY WEEK' IS DESIGNATED

AUSTIN — September 19 — 25 is National Highway Week — and the theme: "Roads and Streets — Backbone of Total Transportation," is a reminder of how important the more than 70 thousand miles of the Texas highway network are to the State.

In Texas, about 38 hundred communities have no mode of transportation available, other than highways. Every day, just about every Texan drives on high-

ways, or, as a consumer, uses products or services delivered over the roads.

Today the family car is used in almost every phase of family life. It is used to go to church, to the bank, drive-in theatres and restaurants, parks and play grounds.

Other drive-in services available to the family include laundries, dry cleaners, beverage and grocery stores, car washes, mail and library deposit boxes and tax offices.

The average passenger car is driven 9,582 miles a year. Sixty-six percent of this mileage is "necessity" use — earning a living, going to a doctor or dentist, shopping and the like.

Currently, the Texas Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance of approximately 6.5 thousand miles of US- and State-numbered highway facilities and some 700 miles of Interstate freeways in the urban areas of the state.

Saves in Accidents

Texas now has more than two-thirds of its designated 3,176 miles of Interstate open to traffic. By completion in the late 1970's, total cost of the Interstate program is estimated at \$70 billion — but total user benefits are estimated at \$107 billion, mainly because of savings in driving and accident costs.

More than 39 thousand miles of Farm to Market and Ranch to Market facilities are in service now. This mileage alone exceeds the total State systems of all the New England States combined.

Today, Texans enjoy the largest system of toll-free roads in the world. More than 70 thousand miles of the nation's finest roads and highways form the "Backbone of Total Transportation" in Texas and are essential to the continued growth of the State.

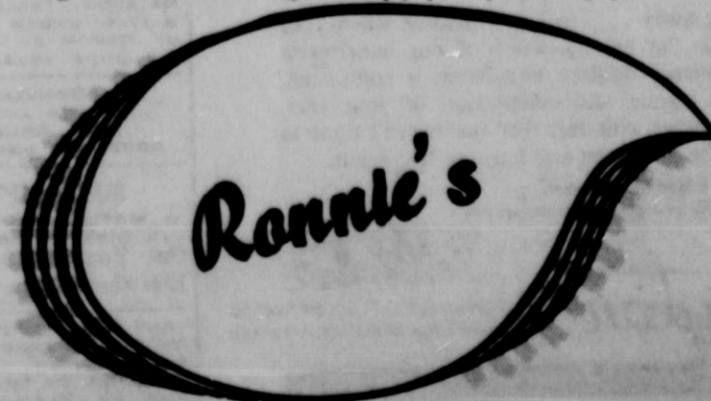

LAW #249 RELATING TO THE RECORDING AND RE-RECORDING OF LIVESTOCK BRAND AND MARKS

Effective August 30, 1971

SECTION 1. (a) This Law shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six (6) months after this Law takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the County Clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark or brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this law all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Law takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

SECTION 2. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this law shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Law.

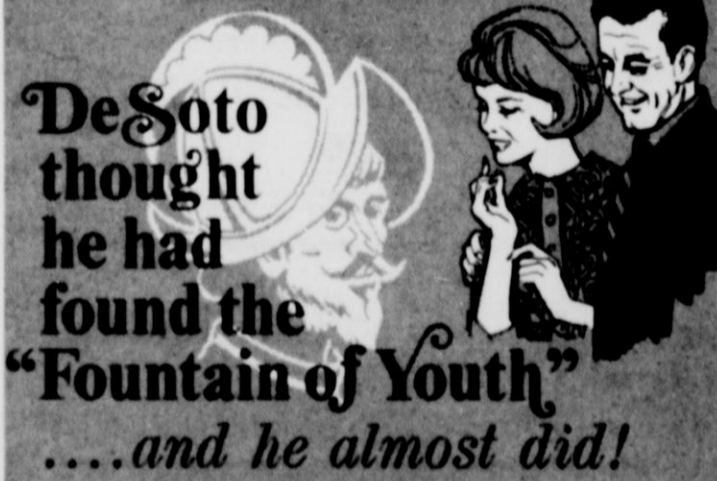
