Helping their children and teens develop health attitudes toward food is an important responsibility of parents. And don't underestimate the influence of fathers' examples, as well as mothers'.

A specific problem area centers around poorly chosen snacks and those that interfere with mealtime appetities.

This is a particular problem for the teenage girl since she needs to choose nutrients wisely to avoid too many calories.

Parents can help teenagers recognize the difference between nutritious "super snacks" and "empty calorie" snacks. Then parents can help teens develop snack habits to actually improve their diets.

Busy schedule demands can create nutrition "gaps" for many teenagers who are active in school affairs or who may have jobs.

These demands make it hard to eat with the family and this can lead to informal snacking rather than eating a nutritious meal. Parents can help teens plan snacks that provide the nutrition needed each day.

Peer pressure influences teenagers' eating habits and their physical growth, and parents should be aware of the age-related problems.

For example, teenage girls want to fit the expected figure pattern of slenderness to be beautiful. Many feel they must severely limit caloric intake, and that can keep them from eating adequate amounts of food.

In general, remember that your teen needs nutritious foods for the growing he or she is doing. Recognize the problems and help your teen solve them for a more healthful step toward adulthood.


YOUNG FLYER CITED FOR COURAGE AND **DEVOTION TO DUT**

Additional distinguished honors to Motley county men in the armed service was announced this week through a special dispatch to the Tribune from the public relations office of the 66th Troop Carrier Squadron, somewhere in the Pacific, revealing that Lt. Fred G. Simpson had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. The communication, signed by James L. Sterling, Jr., is as follows: "First Lt. Fred G. Simpson, Jr.

of Matador, Texas, a pilot with this organization, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross by Lt. General George C. Kenney, Commanding General of the 5th Air Force.

"Lt. Simpson was cited for extraordinary achievement while participating in operational flight missions in the Southwest Pacific area, during which hostile contact was probable and expected, These operations consisted of dropping supplies and transporting troops advanced positions. These flights involved flying at low altitudes over mountainous terrain under adverse weather conditions in an unarmed transport plane and often necessitated landing within a few miles of enemy bases. Throughout these flights outstanding courage, ability. and devotion to duty were demonstrated.'

"The son of Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Simpson, Sr. of Matador, Texas, Lt. Simpson was graduated from the Matador high school in 1938, and attended West Texas State College. He was appointed an Aviation Cadet in March, 1942, receiving his wings and commissioned as 2nd Lieutenant in November, 1942 at Lubbock Field, Texas on July 10, 1943. He was promoted to the ranks of First Lieutenant.

Hunting and Gun Safety

by Arlan Gentry Cottle County Agent

this past weekend, here are some tips to help this season be a safe one for you.

Firearms Safety depends on you make no mistake about it.

Hunting and target shooting are among the safest of all sports. These rules are intended to make them even safe - by reemphasizing and reaffirming the basics of safe gun handling and storage and by reminding each individual shooter that he or she is the key to firearms safety.

1. Always keep the muzzle pointed in a safe direction.

This is the most basic gun safety rule. If everyone handled his firearm so carefully that the muzzle is never no firearms accidents. It's as simple as safe direction. Keep your face away that, and it's up to you.

2. Firearms should be unloaded when not actually in use.

Firearms should be loaded only when you are in the field or on the target range or shooting area, ready to shoot. Firearms and ammunition should be secured in a safe place, separate from each other, when not in use. Unload your gun immediately when you have finished shooting, well before you bring it into a car, camp or home.

3. Don't rely on your gun's safety. Treat every gun as though it can fire at any time, regardless of pressure on the tripper. The "safety" on any gun is a mechanical device which, like any such device, can become inoperable at

target.

5. Use correct ammunition.

You must assume the serious responsibility of using only the correct ammunition for your firearm. Improper or incorrect ammunition can destroy a gun and cause serious personal injury. Use only ammunition that exactly matches the caliber or guage of your gun.

6. If your gun fails to fire - when the trigger is pulled, handle with

All shooters should wear protective shooting glasses and some form of hearing protection while shooting.

Before you load your firearm, open the action and be certain that no ammunition is in the chamber or magazine. Then glance through the barrel to be sure it is clear of any obstruction. Even a small bit of mud, snow, excess lubricating oil, or grease in the bore can cause dangerously


increased pressures, causing the barrel to bulge or even burst on firing, which can cause injury to the shooter and bystanders.

9. Don't alter or modify your gun to fire - even if you've tried to shoot and have guns serviced regularly.

Firearms are complicated mechanisms which are designed by experts to function properly in their original condition. Any alterations or changes made to firearms after manufacture can make the gun dangerous and usually void any factory warranties.

10. Learn the mechanical and 8. Be sure the barrel is clear of handling characteristics of the firearm you are using.

Not all firearms are the same. Since guns can be so different, no person should handle any firearm without first having thoroughly familarized himself with the particular type of firearm he is using, the safe gun handling rules forloading, unloading, carrying, handling that firearm, and the rules of safe gun handling in general.






