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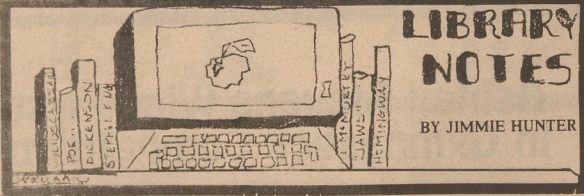

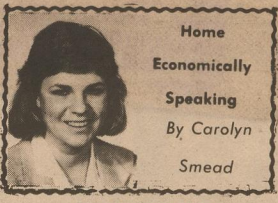
"Son Beams"

TAXING YOUR CHILD'S INCOME

Interest on a bank account or pay from an after school job may mean your child has to file an income tax return this year. Changes in the federal tax law require that children must file a 1987 tax return under three conditions: * If a child has earned income of more than \$2,540. Earned income is from salaries received as pay for work actually done. * If a child has unearned income of \$500 or more. Unearned income is generated by interest, dividends and capital gains, including those that come to the child as the beneficiary of a trust.

* If a child has a combination of earned and unearned income of \$500 or more. For example, let's say you provide most of the support and claim a tax exemption for your 18-year-old son who is a single college student. During 1987 he earned \$2,500 from a part-time job and \$400 in interest. That means he has to file a 1987 return because his unearned and earned income of \$2,900 is more than \$500. Another example would be the child who receives unearned income. If your 10-year-old daughter, for instance, receives \$400 in interest as the beneficiary of a trust set up by her grandmother, and another \$250 dollars in interest from a savings set aside for her future college expenses, she has a total of \$650 in unearned income and must file a 1987 tax return. In most cases, the simple 104A form can be used for the child's tax return. Since children typically have very small incomes, they will also be taxed at a lower rate.

Women's Golf Association Reviews Highlights From Past Coffees During Holiday Season

Dec. 21, 1968 a Mexican supper was hosted by Beverly Vinson, Margaret Jane Hill and Winifred at Winifred's home. Decorations featured a South of the border theme, with a willow Christmas tree, candles, and straw madonna on the TV; a Santa Claus figure with a Mexican straw hat, and the dining table, covered with a green cloth and centered with a tin Mexican candle tree, surrounded by colored chocolate Christmas balls for favors. Margaret Jane had carried the tree, with two others, on a plane from a recent trip to Juarez.

On Dec. 22, 1969 Lillian and LaVoe had their annual coffee at Lillian's home. The table was covered with a beautiful Christmas cloth that Lillian had made and decorations included Christmas flowers in a 100-year-old (or more) blue pitcher; three wise men, also a skating scene on the piano, and a white ceramic Christmas tree on the TV which was made by niece of Melton's - with choir boys around it.

On Christmas Eve morning Hazel and Rose had their annual coffee for the golfers and other guests. Main point of interest was the tree, topped with the angel - first used 31 years ago and each year since. This year June Keltz contributed an angel made in Taiwan; Wynona Gilbreath's offering was a lion and Hortense Sager added a ball; butterfly and a bird of happiness. A miniature owl designed and made by Peggy McCallie Dietze was her latest contribution - always making an ornament each year.

December 16, 1976, Mickey Bostick entertained the Women's Golf Assn. with a Christmas luncheon. Entire house was very festive and a gourmet meal was served to Norma Nell Marrs, Joyce Campbell, Helen Hill, Nell Clem, Laverna, Dorothy D., Dorothy Russell, Lucretia Jr., Campbell, Frances Hobbs, Mary M., Winifred, Faye, Geneva, Elaine Hart, Pat Warren, Francine Green, LaVoe, Louise, Tommy Edwards and Hazel. December 22, 1978 Hazel had a Christmas coffee.

hostesses. First year Lillian hadn't had the coffee at her home. Outstanding among the decorations was a tree fashioned of Tinker Toys and designed by Ronnie Thacker. Dec. 18, 1980, LaVoe was again hostess for the golfers and other friends, assisted by Lillian, Nell C., Mamie Y., and Ronnie Thacker. Theme for the decorations was trees. Over the breakfast bar was a large tree card (a jigsaw puzzle put together by Jana, Johnny, Amy and Melonie) and very carefully mailed. Colorful Christmas cards were mounted on the fireplace wall, in a tree shape and on a table nearby was a golf tree, copied from a smaller lollipop tree placed on a small table. The golf tree, constructed of wood by Bruce Lefevre, was decorated with colored golf balls and tees. As one golfer remarked "always wondered where golf balls came from and now found a golf tree." Hazel entertained golfers Dec. 23, 1980 at morning coffee. On Dec. 17, 1981 LaVoe, and Lillian entertained friends for a Christmas coffee at LaVoe's home. Focal point of interest among all the decorations were the most decorated stockings of the Thacker kids - Johnny, Joey and Jeff - made by Lillian for their first Christmas - to the newest member, Blair. Two tables were set up for the "tastin' bees" of the goodies concocted for delicious eating. The table was centered with a Lazy Susan designed and painted by LaVoe's sister, Johnnie. Tuesday morning, Dec. 22, 1981 Hazel entertained with her usual Christmas coffee for golfers and friends. Among the new ornaments on the tree this year was a white tufted angel made by Mary Groves. The tiniest of beads outlined wings and around the gown. The hands were folded and the face (eyes, nose and mouth) all embroidered - even to pink cheeks. Truly a creation of art, since Mary made the design and spent eight hours (Dick said) just buttonholing the beads on.

December 20, 1979 Christmas coffee was at LaVoe's home with Lillian and Mamie Yeates as co-

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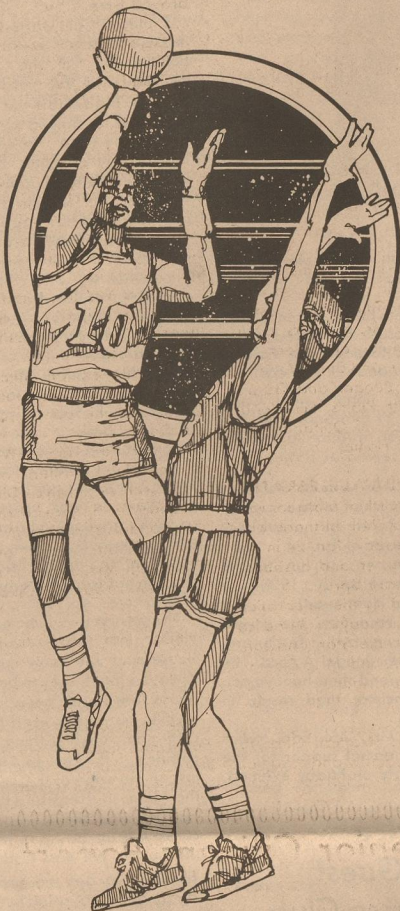

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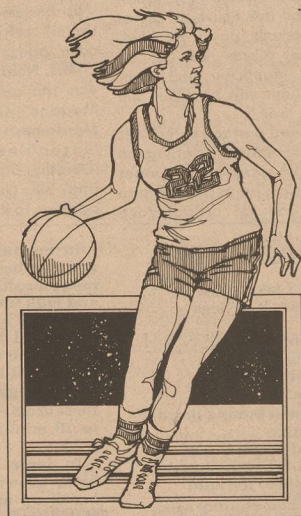

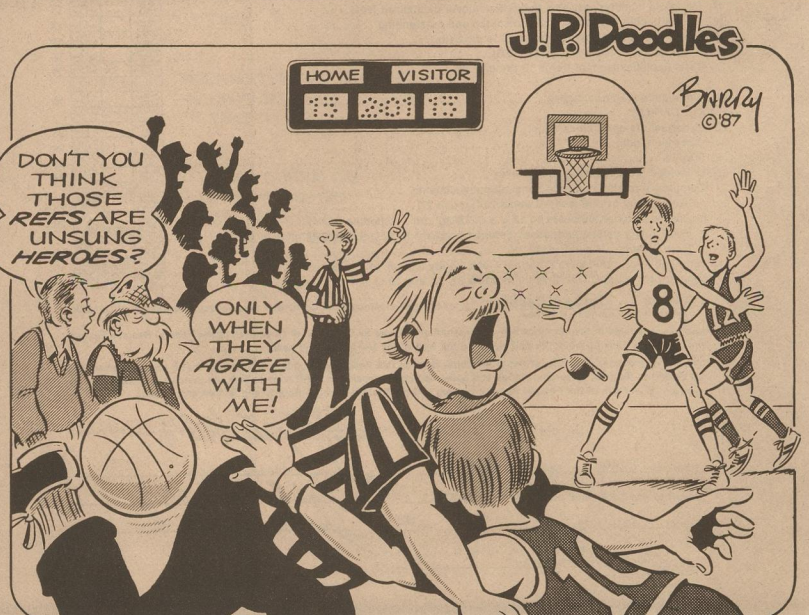
Friday, Feb. 26, and will continue until 5:30 to allow students time to get here after school. We will also register on Saturday morning for those who cannot be here on Friday," she said.

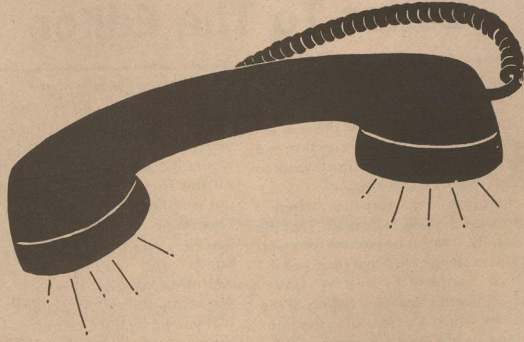

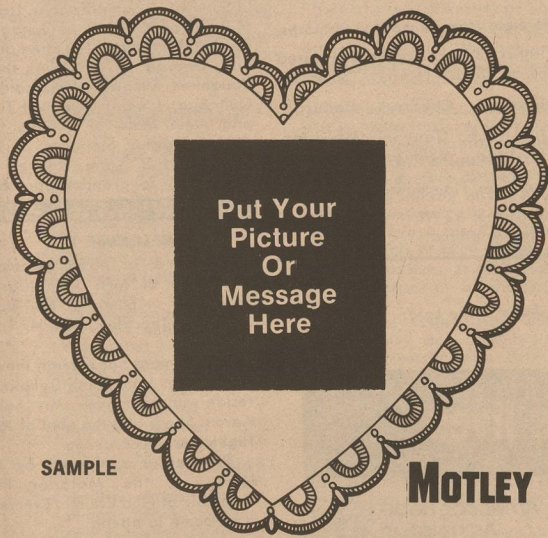


