My brother-in-law opened the bottom drawer of my sister's bureau and lifted out a tissue-wrapped package. "This," he said, "Is not a slip. This is lingerie." He discarded the tissue and handed me the slip. It was exquisite; silk, handmade and trimmed with a cobweb of lace. The price tag with an astronomical figure on it was still attached. Jan "bought this the first time we went to New York, at least 8 or 9 years ago. She never wore it. She was saving it for a special occasion. Well, I guess this is the occasion." He took the slip from me and put it on the bed with the other clothes we were taking to the mortician. His hands lingered on the soft material for a moment, then he slammed the drawer shut and turned to me. "Don't ever save anything for a special occasion. Every-day you're alive is a special occasion."





# Cotton

Members of the Plains Cotton world wide web. Advisory Group had the good fortune to hear form Terry Townsend, of the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC) whose membership is est boll weevil activity. made up of cotton producing and consuming countries around the world.

Townsend, based in the ICAC's Washington office, noved the ICAC currently estimates that world market situations will change little over the next year. Long-term he notes that cotton appears to have a positive set of underlying fundamentals to work

He noted that ICAC estimates world prices as reported by Cotton Outlook, Ltd. in the Cotlook "A" Index will likely average about 72 cents per pound throughout 1998.

He noted that while lower prices are creating a situation of reduced cotton plantings worldwide any positive impact this might have in the short term is being offset by the recent decision by China to relieve themselves of a portion of their internal stocks. He noted that China could export as much as 2 million bales in 1998 offsetting an expected 2 million bale decline in world production.

Townsend also noted that one of the most significant factors affecting future prices will be that over the past 5-10 years world and U.S. cotton yields have remained essentially flat, whereas prior to that time it had been

increasing.

With the Adjusted World Price (AWP) continuing to fall cotton growers who still have beneficial interest in their 1997 cotton crop can receive Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP's). The LDP payment rate effective through May 14 is 2.35 cents per pound.

LDP's have been available for the past few weeks and can be requested by producers in exchange for their promise to forego marketing assistance loans for the 1997 crop. The key component for receiving LDP's at this time is that beneficial interest in the crop is still retained by the cotton grower. Only cotton eligible to be placed in the loan can receive an LDP. Cotton shipped prior to LDP application is not eligible.

Producers should check with their local Farm Service Agency office to determine what information will be needed to determine cotton eligibility for an LDP. All applications for this week's LDP must be turned in to FSA by 3:59 p.m. May 14.

It is probable that as price quotes are transitioned from current "A" Index quotations to Forward "A" Index quotes that 1997-crop LDP's will be phased out as early as May 14.

### Controlling Yield-**Damaging Diseases** in Peanuts

Both foliar and soilborne diseases can devastate a peanut crop quickly and completely. Disease



management first consists of identifying what diseases are present and the level of pressure, then determining the best control method for correcting the problems.

Scouting fields to monitor disease levels and keeping accurate records of the diseases found is important. A field history is critical since diseases can occur year after

Agronomic control methods such as crop rotation, planting resistant varieties and crop residue destruction help limit diseasecausing organisms. 
