SLANTED NEWS HARMS EVERYONE

Vice President Spiro Agnew has leveled harsh criticism of "the press," and judging by public response, there are many who agree with him. What bothers us is that some of the "establishment" papers, while condeming the Vice President, seem to go out of their way to prove him right.

Case in point: last summer Associated Press dispatched a story which read: "Birmingham, Ala - An all-white jury has decreed the death penalty for a Negro convicted of robbing a white girl of \$30 and a wrist watch.

"The seven women and five men of the Circuit Court jury deliberated less than three hours before returning the verdict against John Henry Jones, Jr., 23."

The AP story then went on to relate that the 18-year old girl testified that Jones forced his way into her car at gunpoint; that the maximum penalty for armed robbery under Alabama law is death; all death sentences are appealed automatically to the state Supreme Court; and that Jones still faced two counts of criminal assault, one of abduction and one of assault with intent to murder.

One of the big-city dailies published only the first two paragraphs of the five-paragraph story, and headlined it: "\$30 Robbery Brings Negro Death Penalty."


What were the facts?

On a September, 1969 Saturday afternoon, Rose Marie Campisi, 17, was reported missing, last seen at a local hospital where she had taken her brother for treatment. Search parties were organized and throughout the following day the search continued. On Sunday morning, the members of her church, mostly young teenagers, organized a search party under the direction of the church priest. Approximately 4 o'clock that afternoon, her car was found at the bottom of a 100 foot ravine. The young girl was found locked in the trunk compartment, disrobed, raped, beaten and very seriously injured. She remained several weeks in the hospital and suffered permanent injuries.

When Jones was arrested, he had the pawn ticket for the victim's watch. He was identified by the shop operator as the person who pawned the watch, taken from the victim at the time of the rape. Rose Campisi testified that after the defendent abducted her at the hospital, he drove her to an isolated area, stopped the car, dragged her seventy feet into the woods, stripped her of her clothing, beat her with his fists, kicked her, raped her, dragged her back to the roadway where he tied her hands and feet together, placed her infront of the car and ran the car over her. She further testified that the defendant then put her in the trunk of the car, slammed the trunk door on her, and drove the car over the precipice. She remained in the trunk for twenty-four hours before being found, miraculously alive. It was further found that an attempt had been made to set the car on fire before it had been run into the ravine.

Clearly, the AP story did not accurately report the dastardly nature of the crime that had been committed. The clear implication of the dispatch was that the defendent, being black, was given a maximum penalty sentence for a minor crime against a white girl; a "black lie" in the truest sense.

such obvious, blatant distortions bring discredit to everyone in the field of journalism. As members of that profession, we resent such slanting of the news far more than does the Vice President or anyone else, and we think it should be stopped.

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


