### **Dual Drive is** Convenient for **Rural Carrier**

IF YOU MEET or pass a 1971 Ford pickup with two steering wheels, do not be alarmed about your eyesight or mental condition. You have just seen R. W Miller of Roaring Springs, rural mail carrier.

He drives about 100 miles per day, six days a week delivering mail in the Roaring Springs and Afton areas. Mail boxes are required on the right hand side of the road and normal steering is on the left.

The controls of the pickup include steering, brake and accelerator in duplicate. It was built by J. C. Ford (a rural carrier) at the Inman Machine Shop in Tulia, and has been in use several

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
