Dual Drive is Convenient for Rural Carrier

IF YOU MEET or pass a 1971 Ford pickup with two steering wheels, do not be alarmed about your eyesight or mental condition. You have just seen R. W. Miller of Roaring Springs, rural mail carrier.

He drives about 100 miles per day, six days a week delivering mail in the Roaring Springs and Afton areas. Mail boxes are required on the right hand side of the road and normal steering is on the left.

The controls of the pickup include steering, brake and accelerator in duplicate. It was built by J. C. Ford (a rural carrier) at the Inman Machine Shop in Tulla, and has been in use several years.

Mr. Miller has the same control of his vehicle on the right hand side as he has on the left. The device is so constructed that the right hand control can be removed in a short time. The two steering wheels are connected by two V pulleys and a belt. The brake and accelerator are connected by rods.

Mr. Miller has been working the Roaring Springs route for ten years, moving to this area in 1961. He moved here from Plainview where he was a city carrier for about 13 years.

Most vehicle manufacturers make a right hand drive for rural carriers, Mr. Miller declared, but the problem comes when it is time to trade. Few people but rural carriers would have use for a steering wheel on the right hand side. When he is ready to trade he merely removes the extra steering wheel and other controls and he has a normal left hand control vehicle.

Eastside Square Landmark Razed

One of the oldest structures in Matador has been razed. It is the sheet iron wooden structure owned by the Edmondson Estate on the east side of the square, next door north of the former Burton-Lingo lumber yard and next door south of Thompson Feed and Seed.

The old building housed what was probably Matador's first motion picture show. Later it was a feed store and cream station. The late L. B. Archer operated it as a feed store and coal yard about 40 years ago. Later it was operated by L. R. Bishop.

The structure is being razed by W. R. Tilson. He removed some of the steel siding and interior, then collapsed the remainder to where he can remove lumber and other materials. Printed football programs of 1938 and 1939 were found pasted up in the old office.

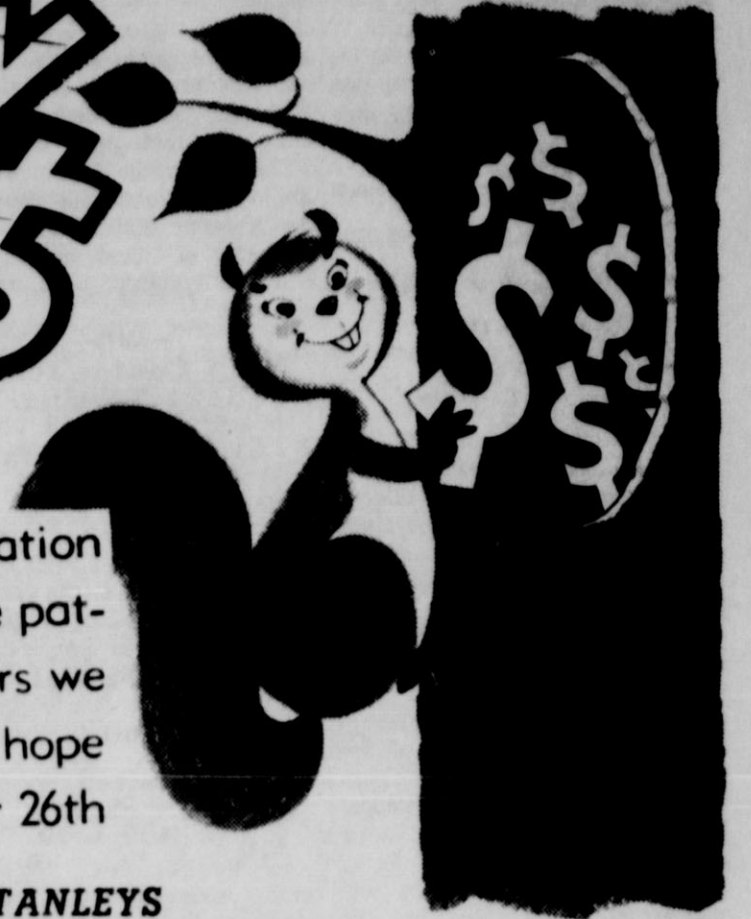

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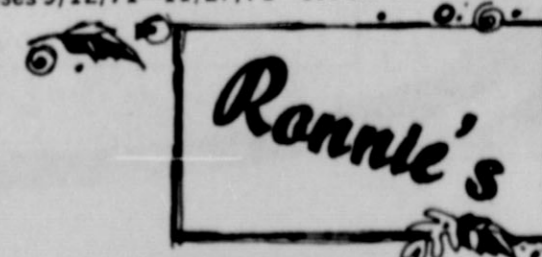

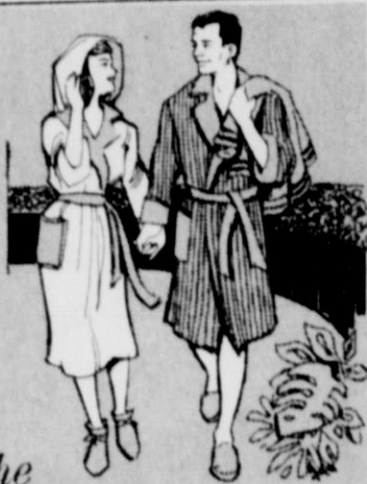
