Speaking informally in the dining room of El Matador Restaurant, Senator Hightower said pressures during the Legislature produced a lot of bad legislation. Approximately 3000 bills were introduced in both houses during the last legislature.

Most of County Receives Rain

Rains during the past week have relieved the drought situation in Motley County. The pattern of rainfall, however, has been "spotted" with an abundance of moisture in some sectors and other areas remaining dry.

The weather has been cool for the past week and farmers say they need sunshine to stimulate the growth of cotton and other row crops.

The rainfall in Matador has been in the neighborhood of two inches. During a rain last week Sheriff J. D. Spray who lives about one mile south of town received 2 1/2 inches, about 1 1/2 inches fell in south Matador, but on the extreme north edge of the townsite, only a sprinkle was received.

to study all bills," Senator Hightower said "and we must frequently depend on the personalities of the authors."

He spoke briefly on the code of ethics and said "I do not believe it is possible to make people honest by legislation." He said it is his opinion that some good will come out of the scandals after a full report has been made.

Senator Hightower defended the increase in taxes, declaring that inflation has caused higher costs in everything the state buys, including schools, roads and a thousand other things that must be bought with the tax dollar. He stressed the vocational schools where students can be trained to work with dignity, and thus relieve some of the welfare burden.

He justified the sales tax as a growth tax and said Texas is growing rapidly to the point where more money is needed for its operation.

All new and beginning students will register Friday, August 20, at 1:00 p.m. in the school library, he announced.

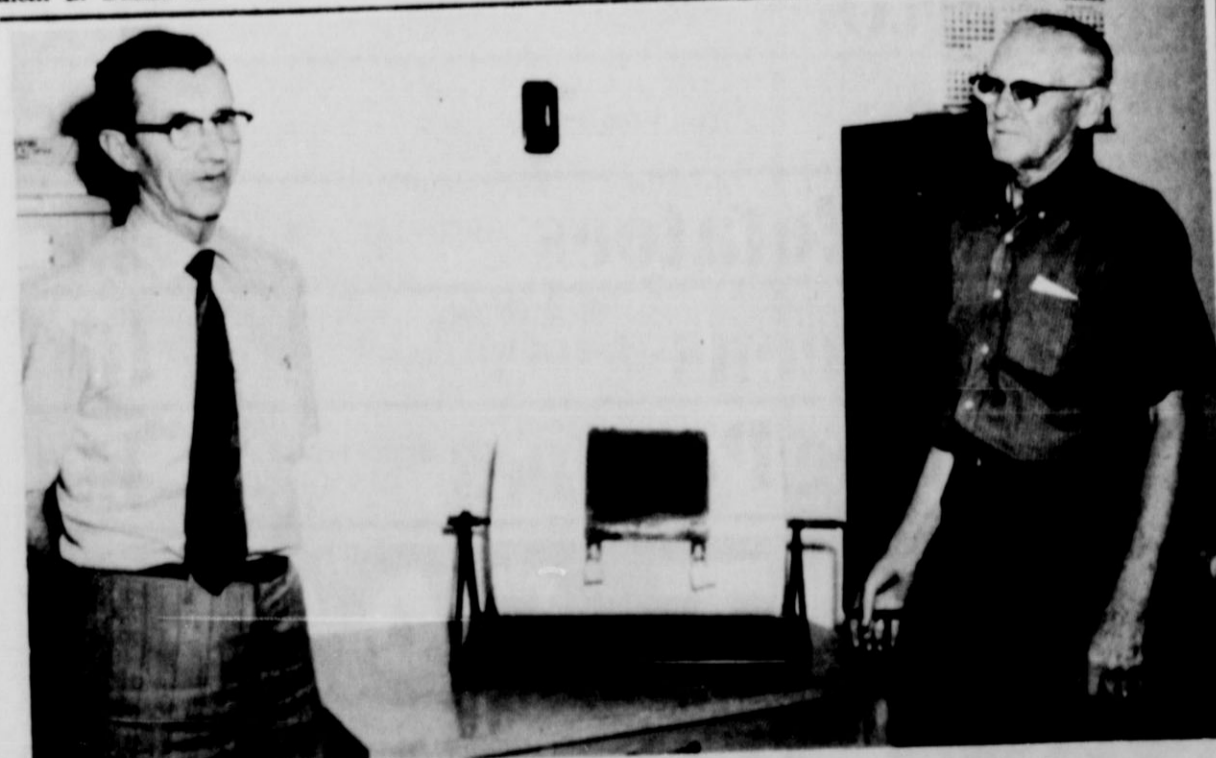
Supt. Wilson said that the buses will run on regular schedules the opening day and classes will dismiss at 3:35.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

It appears that we are well along on the fight against VEE (Venezuela Equine Encephalomyelitis), but let's make sure we make a complete job of it.

If you have some horses or mules that haven't been vaccinated, let me know immediately, or if you know some one who hasn't had all of their animals vaccinated.

Leaving a few unvaccinated animals could have the same results of leaving a few rats in the barn.

Another way we can help in the program is to eliminate mosquitoes. You wouldn't think that these pests would give us trouble this year as dry as it has been, but as you well know, we still have a few mosquitoes. Check for places they breed such as old cisterns, tires, tanks or evaporative coolers and eliminate all breeding areas possible.

Finally, if sickness or death is noted, please report, as I need to report this to authorities connected with the program. Not too much is known about the disease, but those in charge of the program think we can stamp it out if all work together.

Gasoline is a volatile liquid and the storage facility can have a bearing on its performance in an engine and the amount lost.

Did you know that a dark-colored 300 gallon gasoline fuel tank setting in bright sunlight during hot weather can lose 10 to 12 percent of its capacity by evaporation in about three months? Losses may run higher in smaller storage barrels, but by painting the storage tank with white or aluminum paint these losses

can be reduced by a third. Fuel contains a blend of several parts, one of which is extremely volatile and provides engines with easy starting. Most of this ingredient can be lost when the gasoline evaporates.

Seasonal changes in grades of gasoline spell trouble if fuel blended for one season is carried over in storage tanks until another season. For example a winter-grade fuel should not be bought just before spring. This may cause the engine to skip or stop because of vapor lock. The condition occurs when gasoline boils in the fuel line, fuel pump or carburetor. Summer grade fuel may cause hard starting during cold weather.

When gas ages, it becomes gum-

my, similar to shellac. This gum may stop up the carburetor and cause engine deposits. It could even cause engine damage when mixed with small amounts of fresh gasoline.

Fuel costs are high as we all know. By following these suggestions though, it is possible to reduce the fuel bill and reduce engine trouble.

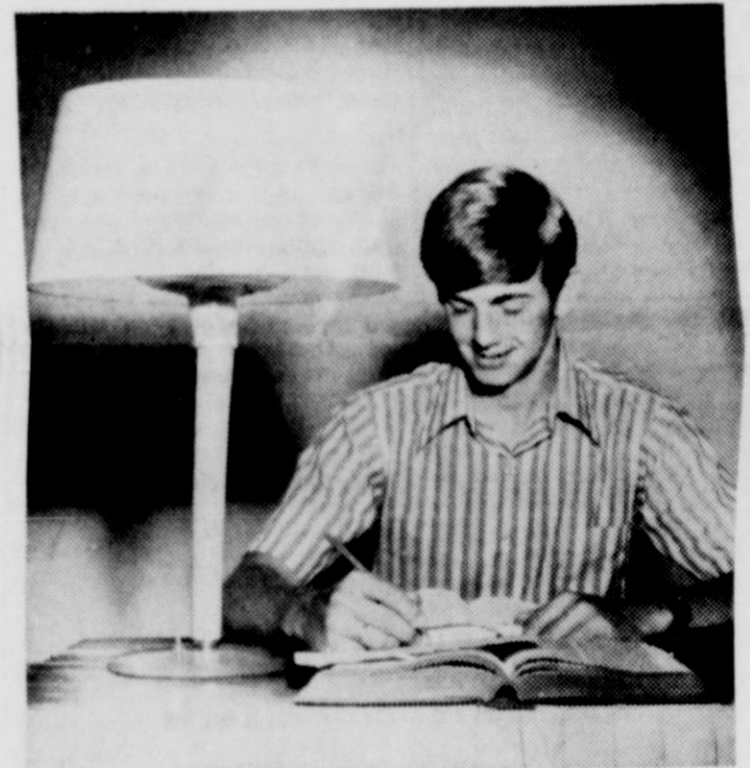
