CONDITION IMPROVED

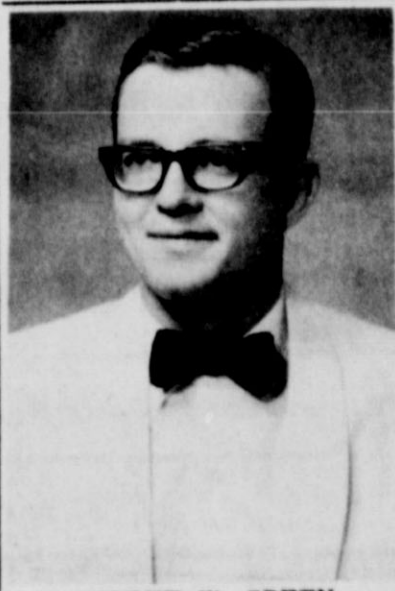

Old Settlers Plan for 48th Annual Meet

SEVERAL changes have been made for the program of the 48th meeting of the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association at Pioneer Park in Roaring Springs, August 26, 27 and 28th. A meeting of the directors at El Matador Restaurant here Monday night outlined the program which will start Thursday, August 26 with a memorial service at 2:30. The service is dedicated to deceased residents of the two counties in the past year. The

service will be followed by a brief introductory program and an address at 3:15. A business meeting will be held at 3:45.

President Sam Ross of Flomot called the meeting to order Monday night, at which the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. The next meeting of the directors will be held at El Matador, Monday night, August 23, at 8:30 and will be the final meeting before the annual reunion of the organization, formed almost half a century ago.

A change in the program will be the parade, which will start at 6 p.m. Thursday. "Peck" Thompson, President of the rodeo division, said the three nights of rodeo performances will start at 8:30 and that each performance usually requires one hour and 45 minutes. Books for registering rodeo performers will open Tuesday, August 24 and close at noon, August 26. Headquarters will be the rodeo grounds. Two hand-made saddles will be given as prizes. One in the roping contests and one in the old men's roping contests, Saturday, August 28.

Rodeo entrance fees are bare-back riding \$20, bull riding \$20, Girl's barrel race \$15, team roping \$28, tie-down calf roping \$20 and old men's roping \$20.

Disabled Veterans Exempt from Fees

Information has recently been received from County Veterans Service Officer Bill Palmeyer, that honorably discharged veterans who have a 60% service-connected disability, are exempt from the payment of fees required for the issuance of operators or commercial drivers' license in Texas.

The 62nd Texas Legislature in regular session has also enacted a bill (House Bill 615) which provides free license plates for certain disabled veterans, Palmeyer advises.

To qualify for disabled veteran license plates, a veteran must be a Texas resident, a veteran of the US Armed Forces, have a service-connected disability of at least 70%, now be receiving compensation from the Federal Government as a result of such disability, and Texas title must be in applicant's name before application for disabled vet license plates are requested.

Applications must be submitted prior to Oct. 1, 1971 and are available from County Veterans Service Officer Palmeyer.
