

Information has recently been received from County Veterans Service Officer Bill Pallmeyer, Phillips, Jerry Hobson, Jerry Slathat honorably discharged veterans who have a 60% service-connected disability, are exempt from the payment of fees required for the issuance of operators or commercial drivers' license in Texas.


