Schools Combined By County Board

Bowing to the inevitable, a majority of the Motley County School Board, acting under powers granted by the Texas Education Code, passed the necessary orders, at its regular monthly meeting on May 16, to combine the Matador, Roaring Springs and Flomot Independent School Districts into a single Motley County Independent School District.

The order accomplishing the annexation recited the declining enrollment in all three schools (from 677 to 445 in the last ten years), making it extremely difficult to maintain an adequate school program in the separated schools.

Rapidly rising school costs have created mounting financial problems in all of the schools. It was pointed out to the Board that more than \$70,000 per year could be saved in school costs.

The enlarged district will be

eligible to receive as much as \$700,000 from the state over the next ten years in "Incentive Aid" funds. This money is for construction of new facilities, and paying off of bonded debts. There is at present, very little indebtedness in any of the districts.

Concern was expressed to the Board that the new urban-oriented State Legislature might jeopardize future commitments of this aid to school districts which would delay further in affecting needed consolidations.

The boundary lines of the new Motley County Independent School District will coincide with Motley County lines except for a small area in the North part of the county which is in the former Turkey District. A small area of Eastern Floyd County is also in the new Motley County District.

Sales Tax Election Called for Matador

MORE REVENUE is needed for the operation of the Matador city government, and cities get revenue from taxes and the sale of services. The Matador city council, in its May 9 meeting, approved the calling of an election in effort to secure the approval of a 1% sales tax.

If approved by the residents of the community, it would mean that merchants and other businesses now collecting 4% sales tax would collect 5%. The tax would be collected by the state and the 1% remitted to the city each quarter.

Matador, Roaring Springs, Dickens and a few other small towns in this area do not collect the 1% and therefore do not receive a quarterly check from the state. Paducah, Floydada, Childress, Quanah, as well as the larger cities like Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls collect the tax which makes it possible to operate without increasing ad valorem taxes.

It has been more than 20 years since Matador had a general property appraisal, and more than ten years have passed since city taxes were raised.

The city council feels that the 1% sales tax would probably raise enough funds without disturbing the present tax structure, and that it would be a fair tax with everyone paying a small share of the needed extra revenue.

The increased cost of operation and the constant depreciation of equipment make it necessary that more funds be raised. The council said it was decided to try the sales tax election. In event it is not approved by the voters, the council will be forced to have property appraised to bring it up

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

The scabies quarantine has been revised effective April 26, 1972. This revision will allow cattle to be moved from the premises in the county to a livestock market and be inspected at the market instead of having them inspected on the premises prior to shipment.

Nine more counties have been added to the quarantined counties listed previously. These are: Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Knox, Baylor and Wilbarger.

This may be the year we have screwworm trouble again. As of April 25th, 806 cases have been confirmed, with these being as far west as Hudspeth County, as far east as Polk County, and as far north as Dickens and Borden Counties.

To assist in the screwworm control program, don't rely on your judgement if a case of worms are screwworms or maggots. Collect 10 or more worms from deep in the wound, place them in a collection kit, and mail. In case screwworms strike in the county, the only way release of flies will start is the positive identification of a sample from the county.

For those who need mailing kits, I still have a small supply on hand.

Legal Notice

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY, DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACES; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town, or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town, or village; Now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MATADOR:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Matador, Texas, on the 27th day of June, 1972, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held within the City of Matador, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

Polling place for said election shall be at the Courthouse, Matador, Motley County, Texas.

Ethel Sheridan is hereby appointed Judge of said election. Olive Russell is appointed Alternate Judge of said election.

All qualified voters of the City of Matador shall vote at the Courthouse, Matador, Motley County, Texas.

There shall be 1 clerk for said election to be appointed by the presiding Judge of said election.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Matador, Texas, shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

() FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

() AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the

law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of the proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place of said City not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the MATADOR TRIBUNE, Matador, Texas, is a newspaper published within the City of Matador, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Section 7. Should any Section, Sentence, or Provision of this Ordinance be declared invalid, it shall not effect any other Section, Sentence, or Provision hereof.

Section 8. The need for revenue to meet forthcoming expenses of the City create an emergency so as to make it necessary to pass this Ordinance on its first reading and it shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

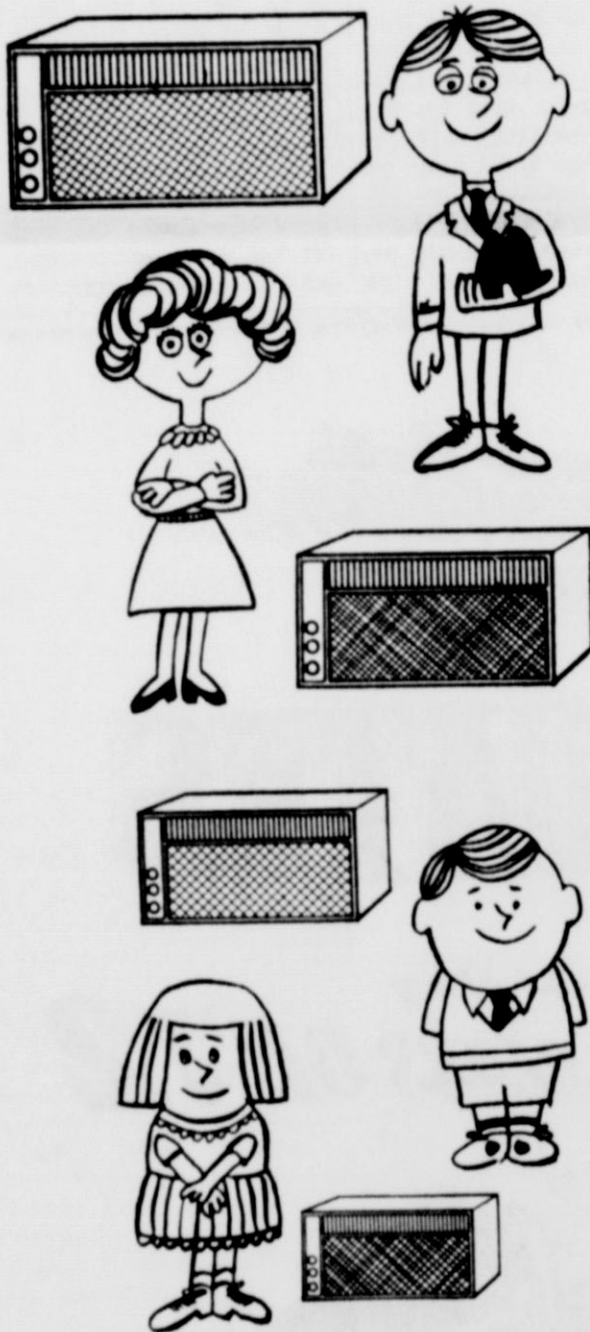
