If approved by the residents of the community, it would mean that merchants and other businesses now collecting 4% sales tax would collect 5%. The tax would be collected by the state and the 1% remitted to the city each quarter.

Matador, Roaring Springs, Dickens and a few other small towns in this area do not collect the 1% and therefore do not receive a quarterly check from the state. Paducah, Floydada, Childress, Quanah, as well as the larger cities like Lubbock, Amarillo and Wichita Falls collect the tax which makes it possible to operate without inceasing ad velorum

It has been more than 20 years since Matador had a general property appraisal, and more than ten years have passed since city taxes were raised.
