County Screwworm Case is Confirmed

A case of screwworms has been confirmed at the Barton Ranch at Flomot, according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

A case of confirmed screwworms means that a sterile fly drop will be made, Pallmeyer said.

The federal project with headquarters at Mission is operated by the Animal Disease and Eradication Department of the USDA, in cooperation with the Texas Animal Health Commission. The screwworm program, established 10 years ago, has been highly successful.

At last survey 3,069 screwworm cases had been confirmed, many in neighboring counties.

Any additional discovery of screwworm cases should be reported promptly to Mr. Pallmeyer.

Red Cross Seeking Flood Victims Aid

In attempting to bring relief in a 12-state area where floods have brought disaster and death, the American National Red Cross has completely depleted all disaster funds.

Preliminary estimates in the mid-Atlantic states indicate that 30,000 families will need extensive Red Cross assistance. The organization also needs funds to meet a portion of the expenditures following the Rapid City, S.D. disaster.

Lions Name Davis New Club President At Roaring Springs

THERE ARE three kinds of people: Those who make things happen, those who watch things happen and those who don't know what happened. This statement was made Friday night by Jerry Goolsby, 20, of Guthrie, Oklahoma, who made the principal address at the Roaring Springs Lions Club Ladies Night banquet and program held in the City Cafe.

The dynamic young speaker received a standing ovation. He was introduced by retiring Lions President Tommy Wilson who served as master of ceremonies. Young Goolsby, son of Mr. and

Mrs. E. M. Goolsby of Guthrie and nephew of Mrs. J. D. Palmer, was an exchange student in Lenzburg, Switzerland and concluded his part on the program with the showing of slides of the scenic wonderland. He was sponsored by the Guthrie Rotary Club.

"Switzerland has all the problems we have," the young speaker declared, "including hippies, pollution, etc. Many young people in Switzerland don't have a religion and don't believe in religion... the main problem everywhere is the so-called generation gap which is the result of too few people who are willing to get together."

He was enthusiastic about FFA as a builder of young people spiritually, mentally and physically. He said one out of every four jobs is related to agriculture. (Continued on page 3)

Flomot Exes Return For Homecoming

Anita Hunter is Crowned Queen

FOOTBALL is something and Red Amonett is something else. Before he graduated from Flomot High School he was on the first team of the Flomot Longhorns football team.

He was principal speaker Saturday night at the seventh Homecoming of Flomot Ex-Students and Teachers. He said the football program was started there in 1935 because other schools (Matador, Turkey and Quitaque) were pirating the eligible players.

"I had seen only one game of football played," he declared, "and most of the boys didn't know what it was about. We actually did not know how to put on the uniforms... but we had 13 men on the squad and played the full season, winning five

games and losing five." The Longhorns were famous in their day, known as one of the hardest teams in the district, and winning regional their second year.

Thayne "Red" Amonett liked to play football and he liked coaching. His first coaching job was at Matador, and after one year at Rails he went to Crowell to coach the famous Crowell Wildcats for 18 years. He is now Superintendent of Schools at Wellington.

He paid high tribute to his home community and his teachers, and cited his first coaches, Bill McWilliams and Leo Jackson, as well as the late S. D. Rattan, who was school superintendent.

"The people of this community had a great influence on my life," he declared. "Kids are good today, regardless of the reports we hear. They are not much worse (Continued on page 3)

Service Changed in Matador Post Office

SERVICE from the Matador post office has been changed, effective July 1, according to an announcement by Postmaster Charlie Scaff. The change is the result of the US Postal Service's newest innovation, area mail processing.

Lubbock post office will now process mail for outgoing dispatch. Dispatch from Matador has been speeded up with a pickup by Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma bus at 2:30 weekdays. First class and air mail leave here by this method.

The late departure from Matador has been advanced to 5:10 in the afternoons for the outside box. Mail deposited inside must be received before 5 p.m.

Patrons are warned not to deposit mail addressed "City" but to address it Matador, Texas.

Mail deposited in outside box will be transferred to Lubbock SCF and will be cancelled U.S. Postal Service, 793.

But Matador and other towns will not lose their local postmarks. A special deposit "for local cancellation only" will be provided and letters will bear the local office of origin imprint.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through the utilization of Lubbock's mechanized post office," according to Carl C. Ulsaker, Regional Postmaster General.

Lubbock is equipped with one 6-operator-position letter sorting machine capable of sorting 21,000 letters an hour, and an automatic cancelling machine capable of facing and cancelling 30,000 letters an hour.

Cold Front Causes Storm Alert Here

A COLD FRONT moved across the Panhandle about midnight Sunday and triggered rains, winds and some hail. The ominous-looking clouds caused watchers to sound the storm alert. The new front brought the coldest July 4th on record, with a high of 68. The low here was about 60 degrees. The high Sunday had been 104 according to the Tribune thermometer.

Storm sirens were sounded early Monday in Matador to warn residents of the approach of a severe storm cloud. No twisters were sighted in the immediate Matador area, but several were reported in northern Floyd county and several other plains counties. County Judge Forrest Campbell opened the courthouse during the period of storm activity to provide shelter for residents and several passing motorists.

The rain that accompanied the cloud left from 1/2 to 1 1/2 inches of rain in different parts of the county. Bob Stanley's official gauge measured 67 inches of precipitation.

Several members of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department and officers of the sheriff's department and highway patrol maintained a cloud watch during the period of thunderstorm activity, with several members of the fire department remaining on

duty until 5:30 a.m. to observe further cloud developments.

Several members of the Matador Fire Department maintain a cloud watch during periods of thunderstorm activity in the area, in order to warn residents of threatening storm conditions.

The Motley County ambulance is used during these periods in order to have radio contact with sheriff's offices in surrounding towns and with the Department of Public Safety office in Childress. The DPS office maintains contact with the US Weather Bureau and broadcasts weather bulletins issued by that department. Citizens band two-way radios are used to maintain contact between vehicles when several teams are out.

When threatening conditions are sighted, the storm siren is sounded. The storm alarm is characterized by intermittent blasts of the siren. This sound differs from the sound of the fire alarm, which is a steady, continuous wail of the siren. The fire department's emergency panel truck then travels up and down the residential streets of Matador with its siren on in order to warn residents who might not have heard the downtown storm alarm.

Residents are reminded that the sounding of the storm alarm does not indicate that a tornado has been sighted by the weather observers. Rather it indicates that threatening conditions do exist in the area and that residents are advised to be on the watch and be prepared to take shelter.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

The number of screw-worm cases in Texas keep increasing and getting closer, so all livestock owners are asked to help keep the spread to a minimum.

First, leave off working the calf crop unless it is an absolute necessity. If the work must be done, properly treat the wounds and observe until the wound is healed. Second, start looking at your stock the way we used to, and if worms are observed, collect a sample and mail to the Mission Lab for positive identification. Doctor all cases as they were screw-worms, and carefully inspect any animals brought on the place.

We may have cases all over the county, but unless samples are sent to the lab at Mission, we won't receive any fly drops to help us control the pests.

Only the livestock producers can insure that the program will work, and I am sure no one wants to go back to the doctoring we had to do before the program started.

The small grubs tests has been harvested. Results are not good, but we did learn that some varieties did live, and didn't do bad for the dry season we had. Results will be made public when I obtain them from the Experiment Station at Chillicothe later this month.

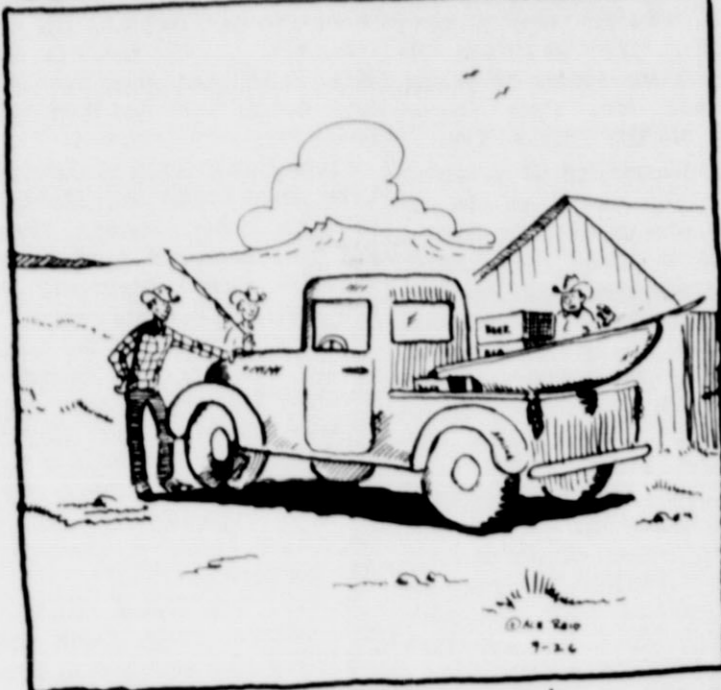
