## Seek Information On Old Cemetery

AN effort is being made to secure information on the old Whiteflat cemetery, located on the Frank Eiring Ranch, which may contain from nine to 18 graves of pioneers.

Known buried in the cemetery are Rev. J. C. Powers, Mrs. Bob Meador and a daughter, and B. D. Kimbell, who died February 28, 1894.

Mr. Kimbell was the grandfather of W. G. "Guy" Kimbell of Matador and Mrs. Meador was the mother of Mrs. J. M. Birchfield of Matador.

The cemetery was changed after the late A. B. Echols donated the land on which is located the present Whiteflat Cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris Stephens are interested in trying to preserve the pioneer burial ground. Mr. Stephens is operating the Frank Eiring Ranch. He said only one tombstone remains at the site. At one time there was a fence in the corner where the cemetery is located, but it either rotted down or was removed.

The Tribune is anxious to receive any accurate information on the cemetery.

Bill Smith of Matador said he was at the cemetery in 1917 and that he believes the number of graves was not over nine. Other reports have indicated as high as 18.

## Credit Office is Open Full Time

Rolling Plains Production Credit Association office in Matador is open full time (effective August 1) with Mrs. Odell Meyer returning to work. She had been absent 13 months as the result of major surgery.

The announcement was made Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club by John M. (Sonny) Russell who made the principal address.

Lion Russell explained the function of the credit association and its importance to farmers and ranchers in the county. He explained how the association borrows money and loans it to producers, without being in conflict with the regular banks in the communities it serves. He said the Production Credit Associations are not government agencies.

Lion Russell said the office here is now open five days weekly with the assistance of Mrs. Meyer, who is in charge during his absence in tending the Spur office. When he is here the Spur office is served by an assistant. Previously the two offices had been only on a part time basis.

Boss Lion Pat Seigler announced that the club will hold a mop and broom sale, probably next month but that the exact date had not been set.

## Higher S. Security Checks in October

The first social security checks to include the 20 percent increase will reach beneficiaries in Motley county on October 3, the regular date for the delivery of checks covering benefits for September — the month for which the increase is effective. Beneficiaries need not take any action because the increase will come to them automatically.

Social security benefits were being paid to residents of Motley county at the rate of \$52,000 a month at the close of 1971, according to Mance King, social security manager in Plainview.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Motley county, 421 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 84 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 42 are getting benefits as disabled workers and their dependents.

King pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60. In Texas, 355,662 people under

## COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Some of you are going to think that I have flipped my lid when you read this, but think about it.

We are going to have to quit planting in the furrow. How many of you have had to replant because rains covered up the crop, or buried it so deep it wouldn't come up?

Some are already planting on the bed, especially in other counties that are higher, drier and windier than we are, and they like it. Yields are going up and cost of production going down. Would you like that?

Why do we plant in the furrow? To save moisture; to prevent the crop from drying out; to prevent the crop from blowing out; or just because our fathers and others did it that way?

Let's look at some of the advantages of planting on the bed. First, you don't run the risk of losing the crop by it covering up after heavy rains. (True you may still lose the stand if torrential rains fall, but as you know there are some instances that you are not even sure of saving your seed if they are still in the furrow). Second, you won't waste as much moisture by opening up the bed to plant as when you plant in the furrow. Third, it is easier to use chemicals for weed control when the crop is planted on the bed.

Fourth, the cotton crop is easier to strip; 5th, diseases are not as much a problem; and 6th, crops blow out easier in the furrow than on the bed because of the spinning action of the winds in the furrows.

Now let's look at some of the disadvantages. First, the crop may dry out faster. (But is this true? Did you ever look at the level of water in a jug? Is the water level higher on one side of the jug than the other, if the jug is level?) Second, it will require the purchase of equipment that we don't have; and 3rd, it will take an adjustment in our farming methods.

I'm not asking you to switch over all at once. Do it like the cat eating the grindstone. A little bit at a time. Why not try some bed planting and see how it works out for you? In other words, try it, you MAY like it, and if you don't it won't cost any more than other things you have tried.

—★—

A possible improvement in the successful boll weevil program will be tested in four counties this year. Strips of early maturing cotton varieties will be planted in a few fields in each county next to prime overwintering sites such as shinnery and mesquite to draw the emerging weevils into traps. Pheromone traps, as well as the strips of early cotton will attract the overwintering weevils into limited areas with testing work to be done in Motley, Dickens, Hall and Briscoe counties.

In addition, when early cotton is planted, Temik will be incorporated into the furrow to destroy weevils as they are drawn to the cotton and pheromone traps.

The program will be carried out by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations of Texas A&M University and the Plant Protection Division of the USDA. The program will measure the effectiveness of Temik and the sex pheromone traps and the use of

early maturing varieties. We all know the losses that can result from the boll weevil. Producers are requested to cooperate with program officials because all producers are interested in obtaining an economical boll weevil

In July many Texas farmers will receive acreage and production questionnaires from the Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Tex. Accurate information is needed to assist in crop production and promotion, therefore all that receive these questionnaires are requested to complete them and return.

## Fuzz on Cedar When Opened? Sign of Quality

Q. What is the white fuzz-like substance occasionally found on the surface of cedar lining when it is first taken from the package?

A. This is an element in the natural oil which is normally absorbed by the air inside the closet to produce the aroma. It does not indicate dampness and is in no way related to mildew.

When cedar lining is confined in the tightly wrapped package, this substance crystallizes on the surface. It is an indication of high oil content in a quality product. It can be wiped off with a soft cloth or it will disappear by itself when exposed to fresh air for a short time.

Q. Should a finish be applied to cedar closet lining?

A. No finish of any kind should be used. To apply anything to the surface other than pure distilled oil of cedarwood would seal off the pleasant cedar aroma, rendering the closet ineffective as a moth deterrent.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973, and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

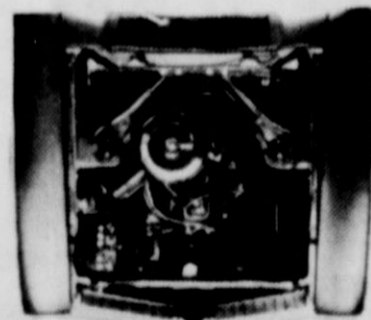

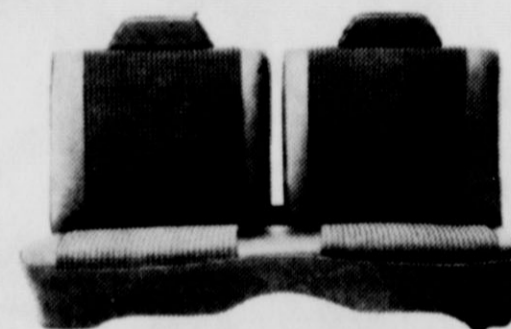

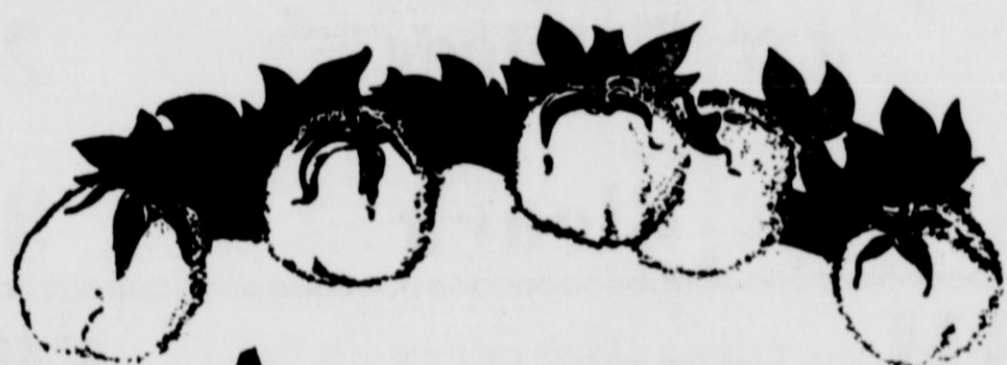
