

A few suggestions for remov ing a heavy limb to prevent tearing of the bark include-the making of a cut from the underside about 8 inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least onethird of the way through the branch or until the saw binds. Make the second cut from above and several inches further out on the trunk. Continue cutting until the branch is removed. Make the final cut flush and parallel to the main trunk. Apply tree wound to the exposed surface.

Sick appliances have warning symptoms as do sick people. If heeded, these warnings may prevent fire, damage to property and dangers to personal health. Here are the four main symp-

toms as listed by the engineer: Is your appliance blinking on and off? If it is, you're being warned that there is a loose connection somewhere. It may be only a loose screw, but repairing it is a good idea.
