#### WHY WAS TONGUE RIVER NAMED TONGUE RIVER AND WHO NAMED ROARING SPRINGS?

Frank Collinson

Tongue River was a favorite place for Indians to pass through on the way to and from Indian territory when they made raids in Old Mexico. I was told by the old Scouts and Indians, that at one time the buffalo all died at Tongue River, from a disease called black tongue. I have always understood that was the reason it was named Tongue River. In the summer of 1876, we were pulling through that country on the way south and camped one night on Tongue River. When everything got still and quiet we heard water falling about a mile below our camp. The next morning I got up early, got on a horse and rode down. When I got to it I saw water coming out of the ground. I got off my horse and tied him. There was a big willow thicket running from the springs along Tongue River. When I was within 15 steps I saw something lying in front of me. It was a dead buffalo, and on that Buffalo were two panthers. They jumped

up on the bluff, on the north side and I killed them both. I am sure they were the first shots they had ever heard. I then examined the water and found it to be good. I looked around and saw this was a favorite camping place for Indians. By then, some of the boys had come down. We skinned the two panthers and named the spring, Roaring Springs. You could hear the roaring a mile or two up and down the creek. We decided since it was good water, many buffalo should be there. We stayed and killed many buffalo, then headed south to Duck Creek. Later, when the Jingle Bob cattle moved in, we built a rather large branding pen, about a mile below Roaring Springs, near where Dutchman Creek runs into Tongue River. We called it Roaring Springs Corral, later known as The Jingle Bob Corral.

### County Holds Reapportion Meeting Monday

The first public meeting for the reapportionment of voting districts was held Monday, June 10 in the Motley County Courtroom.

Mike Cline, representative of SPAG was on hand to explain the purpose and the map proposed for the voting precincts.

A new State law is requiring each county to redistrict for minority interests to be more equal and fair. Voting age numbers are as follows:

Precinct I, 383 total people - Black 15, Hispanic 10, Anglo 358; Precinct II, 384 total - Black 47, Hispanic 74; Anglo, 260; Precinct IV, total 383 - Black 7, Hispanic 14, Anglo 361.

Also included in the redistricting proposal (which will be sent to Austin for final approval), is to make Motley County a one Justice of the Peace County. If this is accepted by the State, it will be set up for the 1994 election.

Other public meetings will be held in Roaring Springs, June 17, 7:00 p.m. at the Depot and June 20, 8:00 p.m. in the Flomot Community Center.

As time approaches for the Roaring Springs Homecoming it awakens many fond memories. This event makes me remember the many fun times I had with Roaring Springs girls, and brings to mind many funny stories and happenings.

At one point in time Roaring Springs was the center of many of my family's activities. My relatives made up a good portion of that town's population. We did much visiting with cousins, aunts, uncles and my grandfather. This group of kinspeople included the Coopers, Freemans and the Victor Chalk family.

The Jake Cooper family had four boys and two girls, one for every age of the three of us in my family. My brother, Howard, and Ralph kept the younger ones in a constant state of turmoil and frustration. I never liked Ralph at all until I was grown. Polk was always the quiet, easygoing peace maker. Ralph centered his teasing and criticism on Frances and kept her in a state of perpetual tears all her young life.

### Roaring Springs Memories

I'll never forget one time we were keeping Bob Cooper. I hadn't started to school yet, but my brother John was in the first grade and Bob was younger than I. The day was Sunday and of course all the stores were closed. Bob wanted crayolas. John and I had crayolas but I guess we hid them or wouldn't let him use them. Bob cried all day begging for "clayolas." My mother tried to explain that the stores were all closed and she couldn't get crayolas. But Bob kept on crying.

There are some events that I'll never forget. One of these events was the first time I met my future husband, Melvin Meason. We were spending a Sunday outing at the Springs, and a boy was there that we didn't know, but John and I got acquainted with that boy. It was Melvin. I was in the sixth grade and Melvin was in the seventh or eighth grade. Before the day was over I came to the conclusion that he was a very nice kid. Neither of us were blessed with good looks. Melvin had a cap, knee pants, black stockings and high topped shoes. I certainly was not raving beauty! I had a "Buster Brown

bob", long black cotton stockings and bloomers that made my dress puff out as I was rather plump even at that time.

One Sunday we were visiting the Lige Cooper family and my dad told Jettie and me that we could go riding in our Model T Ford Sedan. By this time I was allowed to drive. We were given a time limit on the length of time we could be gone. Then there was Melvin again. He and Ralph Penny were walking down the street, so we felt compelled to pick them up. We overstayed our allotted time and as we drove down the Old Settlers street, I saw my dad walking up the street looking for us! I stopped, the boys got out, my dad got in and it was a long, long time before I got to drive that car again!

I could never stand Melvin's nickname - Mule! I asked him how he got that awful name. He said that Miss Bessie Medlin gave it to him. She told him several times to do something and he didn't do it. She said, "Melvin, you are hard headed as a mule!"

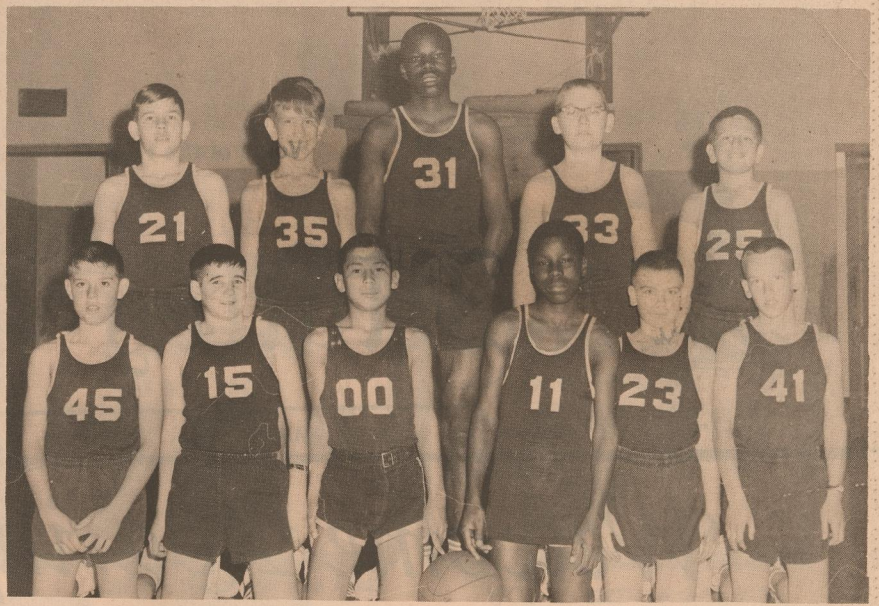

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION

AUGUST 10, 1991

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

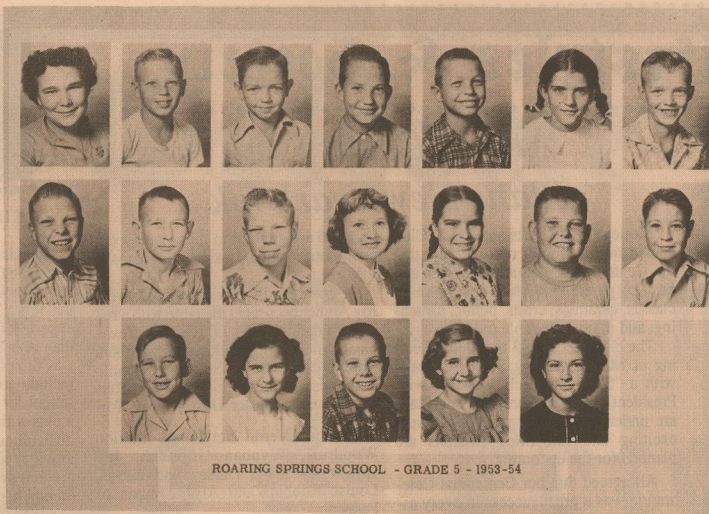

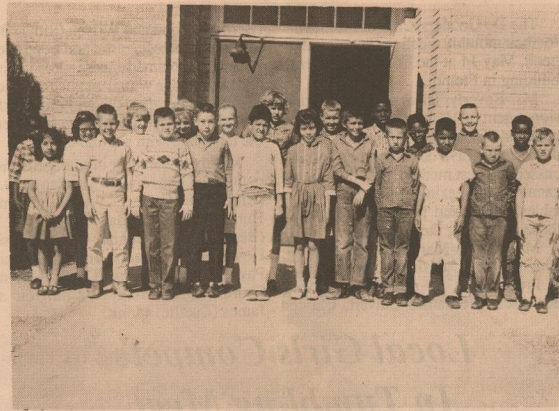

## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers and approximately 155,000 business customers.

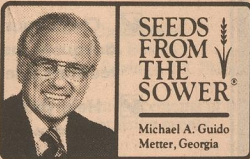
Ashley is the daughter of Steve and Betty Stevens and Samantha is the daughter of Billy and Brenda Osborn.

## Home Economically Speaking

### CHILDHOOD STRESS

Stress is an expected and normal part of life, even for children. Today, because of the crisis in the middle east and the fact that it is a "prime time" war, children are experiencing even more stress and strain than ever before.

Common stressful events for children include going to day care, preschool or school for the first time, fights or arguments with friends and family members, difficulties with a teacher or caregiver, a move to a new home or town, parents' divorce or separation, death of a family member, or parents' loss of a job. As children face one or both parents, older siblings, or other family members leaving for war they can be both confused and severely stressed.

Adults can best help children to cope with unique life stresses by talking with them openly about their feelings and plans. Anderson said helping children to understand the unique stress can result in children not feeling they were at fault or the reason for the changes that did occur.

Stress responses are unique for each child. When adults observe the behavior of children closely, they quickly learn to recognize signs of stress. Adults can find out a great deal by listening carefully to a child's conversations. Watching and listening to children at play is also revealing.

The appearance of unusual behavior, especially if it is short-lived, is probably no cause for great concern, Anderson stressed. However, do look for patterns of changes in a child's behavior.

Be prepared to help children deal with stressful situations if the behavior continues over a period of time, interferes with normal growth and development, or marks the occurrence of other noticeable changes in behavior at about the same time.

For children, an important buffer against stress is a healthy parent/child

relationship. Growing up in a caring family provides children with the security, consistency, respect, and honesty they need to become confident and independent people.

There are ways that adults can show children that they care. First, build communication patterns with children. Talk with and listen to your children. Describe and explain what they can expect. Just as important, listen to what your child has to say. Listen for the message in the words and also watch for the feeling and meaning behind them. Adults need to be sure to clarify and correct children's misconceptions about stressful events or situations.

Spending time alone with each child is also important. This "private time" together will allow children the opportunity and encourage them to ask questions. Sometimes just the presence and attention of the adult reassures the child the parent cares. Another important way to offer reassurance and support for children is through touch. A hug, a kiss, a smile makes everyone feel better and more secure.

Finally, in regards to the current situation in the Middle East, parents and adults will be well advised to strictly limit the amount of war "viewing time" children are allowed. It is difficult for young children to realize that the war is a long way off and they tend to misinterpret much of what is being said. Find alternative activities that children and adults can enjoy together to take everyone's mind off the war.

# Betty's Tax Talk

The right to protest to the appraisal review board is the most important right you have as a taxpayer. You can protest if you disagree with any of the actions the appraisal district has taken on your property. You can discuss your concerns about your property value and exemptions in an informal session with an impartial panel of your fellow citizens.

Most appraisal districts will informally review your protest with you to try to solve problems. Check with your district for details.

## WHAT IS AN APPRAISAL REVIEW BOARD (ARB)?

An appraisal review board is a group of local citizens legally authorized to check the appraisal district's work and resolve disputes with taxpayers.

ARB members are appointed by the appraisal district's board of directors. An individual must be a resident of the appraisal district for at least two years to serve on the ARB. Officers and employees of the appraisal district, the local taxing units, or the State Property Tax Board cannot serve on a review board.

ARB members also must comply with special conflict of interest laws. The ARB reviews the appraisal records for correctness and legal requirements. In the case of a protest from a taxpayer, it listens to both the taxpayer and the chief appraiser. The ARB orders changes in the appraisal records for equality and uniformity, and to grant exemptions and agricultural appraisal which the chief appraiser has denied. The ARB's decisions are binding only for the year in question. The ARB begins work around May 15 and finishes by July 20.

ARB meetings are open to the public. Notices of the date, time and place of each meeting must be posted at least 72 hours in advance at the appraisal district

office and at the county clerk's office.

## HOW DO YOU FILE A PROTEST?

### \* FILE A WRITTEN PROTEST

The appraisal district has protest forms available, but you don't have to use an official form, a notice of protest is sufficient as long as it identifies the owner, the property that is the subject of the protest, and indicates that you are dissatisfied with some decision made by the appraisal district.

\* FILE YOUR NOTICE OF PROTEST BY MAY 31, or no later than 30 days after the appraisal district delivered a notice of appraised value to you, whichever date is later.

If the chief appraiser sends you a notice that your agricultural land is no longer in agricultural use, you must file your notice of protest within 30 days of the date the chief appraiser mailed the notice.

If the ARB has ordered a change in your property's records, you must file your notice of protest within 10 days of the date on which the ARB delivered you a notice of the change.

If you file a notice of protest before the ARB approves the appraisal records, you can still get a hearing if the board determines that you had a good reason for failing to meet the deadline.

If you don't file a notice of protest before the ARB approves the appraisal records, you lose your right to protest. You also lose the right to file a lawsuit about the taxable value of your property.

However, if your protest is late because the chief appraiser or ARB failed to mail your notice of appraised value or denial of exemption, you may file your protest any time before the taxes on your property become delinquent.

In some cases, you may file with the ARB to correct an error even after these deadlines.

Also, the rates for certain combinations of Custom Calling Features (Call Waiting, Call Forwarding, Three-Way Calling and Speed Calling-8) would increase or decrease depending upon the combination of features. In addition, the company proposes to obsolete the optional Custom Calling Service feature Speed Calling 30 for residence customers except for existing customers at their existing locations. Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolescence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.

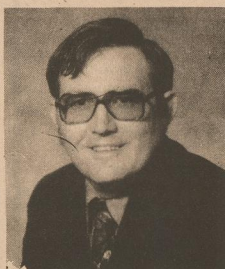

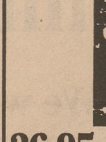

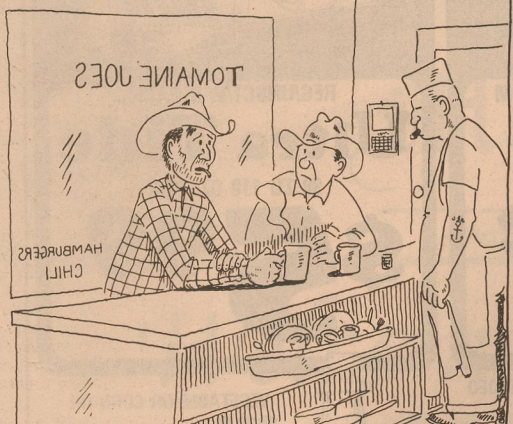

### NOTICE OF INTENT BY MOTLEY COUNTY COMMISSIONERS COURT TO REAPPORTION COUNTY COMMISSIONERS PRECINCTS

The Federal Voting Rights Act requires county commissioners courts to meet certain requirements and in order to be in compliance with the Federal statute, the Motley County Commissioners Court has determined that new commissioner precinct lines need to be established.

The County plans to provide opportunity for all persons in the community to participate in the process by which the final boundary lines will be drawn. Comments, suggestions, and proposed plans are welcome. A public hearing on reapportioning commissioner precincts will be held on each of the following dates:

Monday, June 10th at 8:00 p.m. in the County Court Room, Matador.

Monday, June 17th at 7:00 p.m. in the Old Depot, Roaring Springs.

Thursday, June 20th at 8:00 p.m. in the Flomot Community Center.

Any group or persons that wish to submit a proposed redistricting plan for the commissioners courts consideration should submit the plan to the county clerk on or before the following dates so that the plan may be inspected prior to the public hearings: June 6th, and June 18th, 1991.

The following criteria will be used by the commissioners court in assessing plans for adoption:

1. Any plan should not operate to dilute the voting strength of racial or language minority citizens.

2. Any plan should not fragment minority communities or pack them into districts in concentrations greater than needed to elect minority representation.

3. Any plan should be drawn to conform with geographic boundaries utilized by the Bureau of the Census in the 1990 census to the extent possible unless other reliable sources are used.

4. Any plan should be based on 1990 census data unless it can be shown that other reliable sources are used.

5. Any districts should be composed of territory that is contiguous and reasonably compact.

6. Any plan, to the extent possible, should preserve historical boundaries, and recognize clearly identifiable economic or community interests.

If anyone or groups would like to submit a plan or make suggestions, the County is very much interested in receiving them or consideration during the redistricting process. Please feel free to call Judge Hart at 347-2334 if you have any questions about the redistricting process.
