HE'S THE HERO of little brothers, girl friends, and mothers who live in the constant fear that her boy will be injured. He's the culmination of dad's dream — a youngster he can pridefully point to and say, "That's my boy . . ."

On his shoulders ride the hopes of the entire community—
the students, the man on the street, and all those who have
worn the school's colors before him. He readily accepts the
challenge, without reservation or doubt, vowing to perform to
the best of his ability.

He's too busy doing windsprints to bother with stealing hub caps, too tired after an afternoon of blocking and tackling to build protest signs. He may not get the same size headlines as those who are threatening the very foundation of our society, but he'll run until he's ready to drop if it will help defeat an upcoming opponent.

He's the kid who blushes from praise yet bristles if you degrade his teammates or coaches — the kind of fella who can make you feel almighty small when, criticizing a defeat, he answers simply that "we did our best".

He's what the Red, White and Blue is all about; as American as apple pie; refreshing as the cool breezes which signal him to center ring.

It'll be good to see him again ...


