RALPH T. NICHOLS RITES HELD HERE

Funeral services for Ralph T. Nichols, 56, of 2012 32nd St., Lubbock, were held at 3 p.m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Matador.

The Rev. James McGinley, pastor of the College Avenue Baptist Church, Lubbock, and Rev. James Hancock, pastor of the local church, officiated.

Burial was in Roaring Springs Cemetery under direction of the Souter Funeral Home of Matador.

Mr. Nichols died at 11:30 a.m. Friday, after suffering a heart attack. He had resided in Lubbock for two years and prior to that he was a resident of Motley County for 40 years. He was a retired Highway Department employee.

Ralph Thomas Nichols was born October 11, 1909, at Goldsboro, and passed away August 26, at the age of 56 years, 10 months and 15 days. He came to Motley County in 1924 with his parents, the late A. B. Nichols and Mrs. Nichols. He was married to Ruby Roller Bridges on July 31, 1942, at the Flag Springs Baptist Church.

He was a member of the College Avenue Baptist Church of Lubbock, and a past member of the L.O.O.F. Lodge of Matador.

Survivors include his wife, two sons, Carroll Nichols, who is in the U. S. Navy, based at Charleston, South Carolina, and Manuel Bridges of Lubbock, three daughters, Mrs. Carson Watt (Vada Beth) and Mrs. L. D. The deeds and accomplishments of our beloved women will forever remain etched in Motley and Dickens counties," Lt. Governor Preston Smith told old settlers and their dependents in an address Thursday morning at the Motley-Dickens Old Settlers pavilion.

He outlined the progress of the two ranches, the Spur (Swenson) and the Matador, and commented on the eternal friendship between the two.

In closing he paid tribute to the pioneers and issued an admonition, "Your duty and mine is to write a new chapter with gratitude for their guidance and founding strength, that their wonderful lives will not have been lived here in vain."

This was Lt. Governor Smith's second official visit to the county in less than a month. He was principal speaker at the county's 75th Anniversary Celebration August 5.

Association President Sam Ross extended the welcome and introduced Mr. Smith, who paid tribute to 116 deceased pioneers of Motley and Dickens counties. Following a minute of silent prayer in memory of the deceased pioneers, invocation was by the Rev. Mrs. Ben Dillard, pastor of the Assembly of God Church in Roaring Springs.

Roane to Spray a Million Acres

Government Grants Diapause Contract

A MILLION-ACRE contract has been awarded Roane Flying Service, Inc. by the government in further pursuit of the diapause cotton boll weevil control. Roughly the territory is from Post to Silvertown, to Turkey, to Jayton and back to Post.

Roane's permanent Texas location is Buzz Airport, Roaring Springs, B. A. Douglass, manager, said Tuesday that government inspection of his company's planes will start today. Seven more planes were expected yesterday and the total will be about 35.

Roane Flying Service, with headquarters at Jeannerette, La., operates in several southern states. The firm owns more than 100 planes.

Mr. Douglass said two flagmen are required with each plane, in addition to the pilots. Local personnel will be employed

with the exception of the pilots. When the diapause contract is completed, Roane's payroll will be between \$3,000 and \$10,000 per week. Government personnel will be in addition.

The flying firm has purchased much equipment since moving here, including one 11,000 aviation gasoline tank, which will hold about three days supply at the peak of the contract. Mechanical facilities make it possible to service planes at Buzz Field, to keep them in the air with a minimum of down time.

"We feel fortunate in being the successful bidders for the diapause contract," Mr. Douglass declared. He said the Roaring Springs (State Highway 70) location is very satisfactory for the work, and that he has received complete cooperation in making the facilities suitable to the needs of his firm.

KAREN JO ELLIOTT dislikes making decisions. Her plans to enter the University of Texas in Austin were made late this summer after she decided to study journalism and English. The decision was a switch from her former intentions to major in math and to be a teacher.

The following article appeared in the April issue of the West Texas Publisher edited by Mrs. Violeta Mahood.

Karen, age 18, is a native of Matador and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Elliott. She attended the mid-winter meeting of the West Texas Press Association at Lubbock with Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Meador and showed keen interest in the fast-moving program, the panel by the college journalism students, and other activities.

Karen has worked on her school newspaper for three years before taking over the editorship this year. The paper appears weekly in the Matador Tribune.

By-line stories in the Tribune show Karen's wide interest in community and other affairs though she writes stories of school interest for the newspaper, too. She writes and types her copy and then sets it on the linotype. She also keeps office, addresses single wraps and reads proof.

"Mr. and Mrs. Meador are wonderful teachers," she says, "and they have taught me all I know since I started work shortly before the first of the year." Matador does not offer journalism courses in high school so this was Karen's first experience in actual newspaper work.

Is she leaning toward a journalistic career?
"Journalism has really attracted me since I have been working at the Tribune," she said, "but I have wanted to be a teacher since I was in the third grade and I do not think I could really be happy at anything else."

Like many other young people trying to find out what they want to do, Karen does admit that she does not know if she will really prefer teaching once she starts and if this should be the case, she would turn to

Schools Open with Scholastics Down

ENROLLMENT in Matador High School and Elementary School at 318 is down slightly from a year ago when enrollment reached a high for recent years at 328, following integration of the city schools.

Grade School Principal J. E. Edwards said Monday that there were 218 students enrolled in grade school and that several more are expected to enter this week. The first grade has a total enrollment of 29 students and the fifth and eighth grades with 30 students are the largest in school.

High School reports an enrollment of 100 students as compared with 106 last year. The 29 seniors reporting for their final year of high school compose the largest class. There are 28 sophomores, 27 freshmen and 16 juniors.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Results of district judging of Senior 4-H records have been received, and congratulations are in order for Kate Thompson, Matador, who was 1st in Conservation of Natural Resources; Max Barton, Matador, who was 2nd in Boys Fire Prevention; Loretta Thompson, Matador, who was 2nd in Girls Fire Prevention; and Sharlene Berryman, who placed 3rd in Achievement.

Let your cattle be choosy as to what they graze. It pays, even though some cattlemen think it is wasteful to allow cattle to graze selectively.

Given a chance, cattle will eat the leaves of forage in preference to the stems. This is fine, since leafy material is much higher in digestible energy than stemmy material, which in some cases are so low in digestible energy that they serve no useful productive function on cattle.

Pastures which look uniformly grazed are generally grazed too short for maximum production. If cattle are given the chance to graze selectively, the pasture will have an uneven, ragged look. In fact, a properly grazed pasture always has a good deal of what appears to be lightly or ungrazed forage.

There is just one way to judge the proper stocking rate. According to A&M research, about 30 to 40% of a pasture should look ungrazed or lightly grazed.

When forage quality is high, as in spring, it may be grazed heavier without loss in animal performance, but in the summer, particularly on perennial pastures, high stocking rates mean less selectivity and poorer performance.

All plants in the pasture are not good grazing plants. 4-H members who try for places on county Grass Judging teams learn the plants that are of high quality and low quality, as well as growth habits of the plants and value for wildlife.

Don't relax your guard when using agricultural chemicals. They can enter the body by ingestion, through the respiratory system and in many cases through the skin.

A person would not knowingly eat a chemical such as a pesticide; however, failure to remove contaminated clothing and to wash thoroughly prior to eating can result in the ingestion of the chemical on food handled by the individual.

Absorption of the chemical through the respiratory tract can also occur when one is exposed to chemicals in the form of dusts, sprays or vapors, or by smoking cigarettes that have contacted the chemical on the hands of an individual. Adequate ventilation will serve to reduce the degree of exposure

and the use of a respiratory protection device is a must in many cases if use hazards are to be minimized.

Protective clothing should be worn at all times when chemicals are being used. Their use will help prevent contact of the chemical with the skin, either directly, or as a result of spillage, exposure to sprays or dusts or indirectly through contacts with surfaces, equipment and utensils exposed to chemicals.

To prevent accidental poisoning, read, understand and follow container instructions; use protective clothing and respirators as directed on the labels; keep soap and water available at all times, and if chemicals are spilled on the skin or clothing, remove the clothing and wash the affected area thoroughly with soap and water. Remove contaminated clothing upon completion of the chemical use and scrub with soap and water; place contaminated clothing, equipment and unused chemicals in an area inaccessible to humans and dispose of unused chemicals and empty containers immediately in the prescribed manner.

Chemical safety is in the hands of the person who uses them, and the following experience in Motley County points this out. A few years ago I was visiting with a person who was

using a spraying rig, and said that he always had a headache after using the sprayer. A few minutes later, a wrench was dropped into the chemical, and the owner reached into the mixture to recover the wrench. No effort was made to wash the material from his arm. I brought this to his attention, pointing out the danger of drift or other methods of getting the material on the skin, and was told later by the operator that the headaches had stopped now that he was not letting the spray stay on his body.

If this has been your trouble when using chemicals, why not try this method and see if your troubles are not stopped.

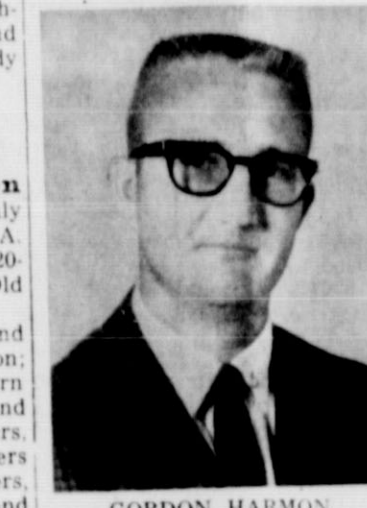
