When an inch of rain falls on 160-acre farm, it delivers 4,356,000 gallons of water weighing over 18,000 tons, according to Tony Dean, Soil Conservationist, with the county Soil Conservation Service.

When falling on poorly prepared cropland. Dean pointed out, this amount of water can sometimes become a tremendous force to control.

'Soil erosion and the resulting siltation of our streams, rivers most critical pollution concerns,' Dean said. "The problem strikes close to home as heavy rains in Motley County this summer have caused much soil loss due to erosion. Area farmers are realizing the need for good water
