Supervisor Larry Clements said today, Dickens and Motley Counties are two of twenty-four in Texas recently named
by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting
from the extreme freezing weather conditions which occured between October 1, 1991 and December 31, 1991. Larry Clements said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan
needed to continue in business $\$ 500,000$, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have
suffered at least a 30 percent loss production to be eligible for an FmHA production to be eliligibency loan," Clements said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to
figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.
"Applications for loans under this
