## A Look At The Candidates

NOTE: The following is a brief profile of some of the candidates seeking election in the May 2nd election. Comment was not available from all candidates. Remember to vote on Saturday!

**JEFFREY THACKER, 39**, is seeking a place on the Motley County ISD School Board.

He was born in Lubbock, Texas, July 4, 1952. He attended Roaring Springs Schools and graduated in 1970. He also attended Texas Tech University for 2 years. He and his wife, Pam, have two children, Bradley and Blair.

Mr. Thacker is co-owner and operator of Thacker Jewelry and Thacker Supply in Roaring Springs.

He states his reason for running for this position, "To learn more about and how our school system operates."

When asked if he had plans or ideas to help better our school system, Mr. Thacker stated, "To hopefully assist the board that is already doing a good job. Some job experience input."

He stated, "I will try to serve the community in the best way possible. I will appreciate any support."

**JO ANN DURHAM**, is seeking a place on the Motley County Hospital Board. She is 46 years old and was born in Borger and attended school there. She graduated from Weatherford Cosmetology and is owner-operator of JoAnn's Country Cuffure in Matador.

Jo Ann and her husband, Bill, have two children, Barbara Wallace of Matador, and Deanna Logan and her husband, Ed Logan of Floydada. They have three grandchildren, LeAnnra, Kelsi and Brett Wallace.

When asked her reason for running for this position, Mrs. Durham stated, "Because I am interested in having the best medical care possible for our rural area." She continues, "I hope to meet each challenge and decision with an open mind and try to 'make a difference.'"

**BOB DAVIS, 48**, is seeking re-election for Motley County Hospital Board. He was born and raised in Lubbock and graduated from Lubbock High School. He and his wife, Rosalee, have three children, Jenifer, Jeremy and Dustin. He is self employed.

When asked if he felt that he had been open minded, fair, and a benefit to this position, as an incumbent candidate, Mr.

The First United Methodist Church in Matador is observing their 100th anniversary in 1992. The church was organized in 1892 under a group of cottonwood trees on Ballard Creek during a summer revival meeting. Former pastors have been invited to preach as we continue celebrating the church's centennial year.

Guest speaker at the Sunday morning church services, April 26 was the Rev. Kenny Kirk of Spur, former Matador pastor 1978-80.

On May 24, 1978 the Methodist Church collapsed and the building was in ruins. Bro. Kirk in his first pastorage, arrived here August, 1978. He had a big responsibility working with the building project. He did a fine job and was the pastor at the first services in the new building, September 15, 1979.

The cornerstone for the building is placed in the outside vestibule and reads, "First United Methodist Church 1979. I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord." Psalms 122:1. Kenny Kirk, Pastor."

His wife, Terry and their son, Aaron, who was the first Matador Methodist parsonage baby in many, many years, and other son, Matthew attended the services.

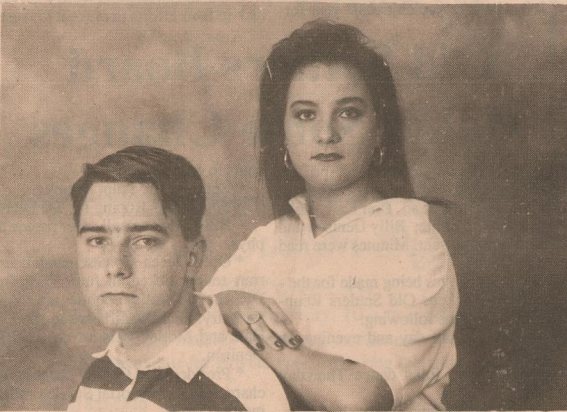

## Matador Garden Club Has Program On Conservation

A conservation program pertaining to Texas highways was presented at regular meeting of Matador Garden Club, April 20, at the home of Mrs. Edgar Lee. The meeting was called to order by Mrs. Lee, vice president, in the absence of Mrs. W.N. Pipkin, president.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. Douglas Meador, and committee reports included one calling attention to the cactus display at the Motley County Library, by Mrs. Ted Elliott, who also reported on the work which has been done on the downtown planter boxes. Plans were discussed regarding the date for a field trip to Lubbock to view the flower gardens at the home of Mrs. Virginia Hodges. It was decided to wait until the club meets in May, to set the date.

Mrs. Alvin Stearns was program leader and introduced the program with a discussion of trash on Texas highways. "Litter detracts from the natural beauty of our countryside; it endangers our environment; it costs money, time and even lives," she said, and pointed out that virtually every mile of highway in the state bears the ugly evidence of trash tossers. And every year, over 100,000 Americans are injured in accidents caused by cars swerving to avoid trash on the road. One thousand of these people will die.

"A strong anti-litter campaign can educate the public to the very real dangers of highway littering. Your State Department of Highways and Public Transportation encourages you to support the Texas anti-litter program." A brochure on the subject admonished.

"Roadside Development" was discussed by Mrs. Lee, who explained the various programs sponsored by the Department of Highways and Public Transportation, such as highway signs, the development of transportation and maintenance of the state's 73,000 miles of highway, and a complete explanation of the "Adopt-A-Highway" program.

Brochures provided by the Matador office of the Highways Department, included instructions on understanding the signs, pavement lines and signals, with the admonition that "Two of five traffic fatalities are caused by misunderstand-

ing, or not being aware of these warning signals."

"Providing new routes of travel and the task of maintaining the network of highways is the responsibility of the system, and an overview of this complex agency of state government gives Texans an insight into how they can play a role in the development of transportation strategies for Texas," Mrs. Lee said. Facts about the highway system included the shortest state-maintained highway; longest highway in the state; longest bridge; highest state-maintained highway; first highway built by the department; ferryboats; tunnel; first farm-to-market road; and only state-maintained highway without a number.

The material on the Adopt-A-Highway program includes an application form, together with instructions concerning participation, which are available at the local department of Texas Highways and Public Transportation.

At the conclusion of the program, Mrs. Lee served refreshments of sandwiches, Red Devil's Food cake, grape clusters and nuts, coffee and tea to the ten members present who were Mrs. R.C. Giesecke, Mrs. George Seigler, Mrs. Robert Darsey, Mrs. Artie Wason, Mrs. J.D. Craven, Mrs. W.D. Lipscomb, and the program participants, Mesdames Stearns, Meador, Elliott and Lee.



## Home Economically Speaking

### NO MORE DISPOSABLE CUPS...

Many coffee drinkers take the last sip of their coffee and throw the cup into the trash can - a routine repeated many times a day by office workers worldwide.

The average office worker in North America goes through around 500 disposable cups a year. All those empty cups and related utensils are easy to toss, but they don't just disappear. In fact, most plastic coffee cups are made from polystyrene foam. In a landfill, they don't break down. Even paper cups don't break down easily. In fact, in a landfill, almost nothing breaks down. It just sits there.

There are solutions:  
\* Issue each employee a ceramic mug, perhaps with your company logo or an environmental message printed on the side.

\* Keep sturdy mugs, not polystyrene or paper cups, near the office coffee pot.

\* Don't buy plastic stirrers; just keep some spoons on hand.

\* Arrange for your cafeteria or coffee shop to give discounts to employees who bring their own mugs for coffee.

\* If there is space to wash dishes, make durable plastic dishes available for employee use.

### BETTER, SAFER CLOSET ORGANIZATION...

When space is at a premium, better organized closets are one way consumers can increase the amount of storage.

Special, easy-to-install closet systems can convert the traditional open closet into a practical configuration of adjustable shelves and hanging spaces customized to the length of the clothes you have. Several of the newest systems include support posts or walls, so that no drilling is required when installing the system, making it safer to install.

Another space maker is free-standing unit that creates a sports closet wherever it is assembled. The unit is designed to

hold everything - from tennis rackets to bicycles - in a safe, accessible, compact manner. The center can be adjusted so the units form a tower or fit side by side, allowing the wood grain shelf to be placed anywhere in the unit. Adjustable bar supports can be set to any height to accommodate just about any time of hanging equipment and meet the needs of the tall and short alike.

Keep these suggestions in mind when the spring cleaning "bug" bites you.

### CREDIT CARD RATES ARE YOU PAYING TOO MUCH?

Don't read this article if you are a credit card user who always pays off the monthly balance. But if you are a credit card user who winds up paying a monthly finance charge, this news could pay off.

According to industry reports, banks are reducing the interest rates they charge on credit cards for some customers. But, this change is not widely advertised. And sometimes there are trade-offs, such as a higher annual fee for the card in return for the lower annual interest rate. The lower rate is likely to be offered only to the bank's most credit-worthy customers; so not everyone will qualify. Industry reports indicate that one reason for this change is that it is often less expensive for a bank to keep good customers by offering them a lower interest rate on credit cards than it is to pay the costs of advertising to attract new customers to replace those who were disenchanted by high credit card rates.

Given this trend, consumers should ask their bank card issuer if a lower annual percentage rate is available and if so, how other terms and conditions differ from the previous ones.

## Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by extreme freezing weather conditions which occurred between October 1, 1991 and December 31, 1991 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Spur, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor Larry Clements said today.

Dickens and Motley Counties are two of twenty-four in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the extreme freezing weather conditions which occurred between October 1, 1991 and December 31, 1991.

Larry Clements said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Clements said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until December 10, 1992, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Clements said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Spur is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

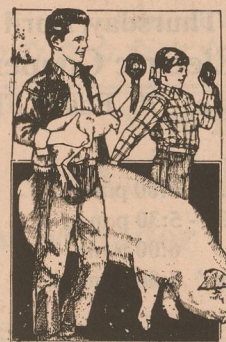

## Joe Campbell Takes Part In Texas A&M Seminar

Almost 200 Texas county treasurers and other members of their staffs took part in the 20th Annual County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas A&M University, April 13-16. Joe Campbell, Motley County County Treasurer, was among those attending.

The seminar theme was, "Unification". The seminar was a program of the Young Institute of County Government of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the County Treasurers Association of Texas and was sponsored and conducted in cooperation with the Texas Association of Counties.

Treasurers who attended all sessions were awarded 2.0 continuing education units (20 hours) by Texas A&M's Office of Continuing Education.

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered the keynote address.

Subjects discussed ranged from Depository Contracts, Investment Policies, Grants, and County Records to Self Protection. More than 30 speakers addressed the seminar.

Concurrent round table discussions were a part of the program, with county groupings conducted by population size. Reports also were presented by the Texas Association of Counties (TAC).

During the annual banquet, several County Treasurers Association of Texas scholarships were presented.

John Gilmartin, coordinator of the Young Institute of County Government, said this training was a vital part of Extension's training.

The treasurers are required to complete 20 hours of educational effort every two years according to state law.

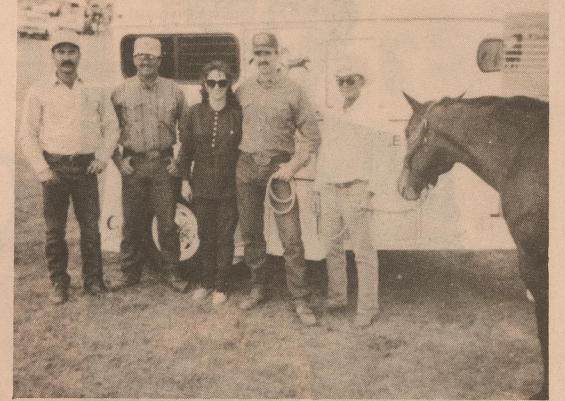
Developed by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), the campaign will assist Rural Transit Systems across the state in enhancing their images and ridership.


