Matadors Are Still On Top

Firemen Receive 3 Calls In Day

Monday was a busy day for the Matador Volunteer Fire Department. They received three calls in a space of about three hours.

The first call about noon was from the Jack Luckett

home at the northeast corner of the town section where fire was threatening a truck.

A loose brake drum had caused fire on an almost new truck owned by a construction company. Another truck was being transported, and a trailer with about 2,000 gallons of fuel was being pulled. The call asked for a chemical extinguisher.

Fireman James Stanley responded with the emergency truck, followed by two other units to serve as standby. The fire was soon extinguished.

Jack Luckett said the driver had high praise for the efficiency of the department.

Mr. Luckett said that if the fire had gone out of control it might have done \$100,000 damage. He said he had two tractors and a pickup in the vicinity of the stalled truck. The vehicle had locked down at the point it stopped because of the hot brake.

The second fire Monday was at Jameson Machinery Company plant at the southwest corner of town, where burning grass and weeds got out of control.

The third fire was from the Roaring Springs area west where an engine had set a number of fires along the railroad right of way.

Damage was reported to the Campbell brothers ranches along the edge of the Caprock. The firemen worked most of the afternoon. Vance Campbell lost a stretch of fence. Loss was sustained on the Harold Campbell and Matador Ranches.

The ranchers highly praised the department for the services in bringing the prairie fires under control.

AFTER a victory of 22-7 Friday night over the Amherst Bulldogs, the Matador Matadors are still undefeated this season and on top in the district.

Matador fans followed the Matadors to Amherst in great numbers. One Matador fan said Matador had more people in the stands than Amherst.

A POWERFUL Matador resurgence in the second half put 22 points on the scoreboard for the Matadors over the Amherst Bulldogs there, Friday and marked up the 6th straight victory for the Matadors.

A caravan of Matador fans went to Amherst to see the Matadors chalk up an impressive 22-6 victory.

The Matadors dominated the score and the statistics. They gained 21 first downs and 9 penetrations to the Bulldogs' 7 first downs and one penetration.

The Bulldogs got on the board first following the Matador opening kickoff. The Bulldogs took the kickoff and three plays later Sandy Moore ripped 55 yards for the score. Butch Sutton kicked the extra point, making it 7-0.

The two teams couldn't get anything going the rest of the first half and the score stood at 7-0 at halftime.

IN THE THIRD quarter following an Amherst punt, the Matadors got the ball on the 5-yard line. They showed great ball control and marched the pigskin 95 yards where Castulo Gonzales scored the first touchdown for Matador. Steve Stevens ran the extra points over for an 8-7 score.

Following an Amherst punt in the fourth quarter, the Matadors powered the ball into scoring position and Stevens passed to Frank Welling for another touchdown. The extra points were no good.

The final score came on a 24-yard run by Weddel Campbell. Frank Welling caught a pass for the extra points, ending the score 22-7.

Coach Stan Irvine had great praise for the line. "Our line, both on offense and defense controlled the line of scrimmage, giving us good ball control," he said. One example of the ball control was the first score of the Matadors. That drive alone took over 9½ minutes of the third quarter.

The Matadors stay home this week and play the Nazareth Swifts here on Burleson Field, Friday at 7:30.

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As a boy I used to feel sympathy for milk pen calves at weaning time when a blob of metal was placed in the nose, which allowed them to eat but made it impossible to reach a teat on the mother's udder. Frequently an intelligent calf would learn to toss the metal back and reach the source of milk. Another problem was cattle breaking onto the field when the grass was low. Usually the break in was led by a "roguish" cow who would part the wires with her head and push her way into the field. My father used to fashion a yoke out of barbed wire and place it around the animal's neck. The contraption had a hook above and one below the neck which was designed to catch on the fence. Since our fences were a little less than adequate, the cow often got through, which left me the task of chasing her out of the field with the aid of the dog. This practice was discouraged because a cow gave less milk after being chased by a dog. The best solution was to sell the cow.

The reflecting curve lights along highways at night could be small candles in the observance of man's conquest over distance. Their purpose, of course, is that of guardians of his journey into the darkness.

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The loss of faith in government recently has had a tragic impact on the average citizen. He wanted to believe that most leaders were honest, making mistakes at times, but trying to do their best for the welfare and dignity of the nation. 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Election Set For Nov. 6

Voters of Motley County will have an opportunity to go to the polls Tuesday, November 6, and vote on the nine proposed State amendments.

Observers here expect the vote to be light in the special election. However some of the amendments may raise enough interest to bring out a larger than expected vote. The amendments have been published twice in previous issues of the Tribune.

The six voting places are as follows: Precinct 1, Matador School, Precinct 2, Flomot School, Precinct 3, Northfield school building, Precinct 4, Roaring Springs School, Precinct 5, Whiteflat store and Precinct 6, courthouse.

The amendments include Annual Sessions pay raises, SJR 8; Homestead protection for single adults, HJR 7; Homestead exemption for single adults, SJR 13; Rules to create conservation districts SJR 1; Coastal Counties sea wall bonds, SJR 12; District courts jurisdiction SJR 26; Veterans land fund increase HJR 6; Broadening ad valorem tax SJR 29 and water storage tax exemption SJR 25.

Food Stamps Start In County Nov. 1

The use of food stamps in Motley County will start November 1, according to information from the state office. The use of stamps will completely replace the commodity program. The stamp program was started in 1970.

The Tribune has no confirmed information but it is assumed that all food stores in the county have been approved to accept the stamps. A representative of the program was here Tuesday and gave approval to Spot Cash Grocery and Billy's Grocery. Bill McCaghren's Station and Grocery has also made application.

Food stamps are used exactly like money in food stores but they can not be used to purchase tobacco

and other non essential food items. The program is designed to provide a better diet for low income families and eliminate waste in the former commodities program.

The Tribune has little information on the issuance of stamps, except that they will be issued by the post office. Postmaster Charlie Scaff said Tuesday that he would go to Lubbock Wednesday to receive briefing on the program.

Stores take the stamps to the bank the same as money and receive credit the same as money. The stamps are purchased by low income families at less than their value with a certain amount of extra or "bonus" stamps. Foods which may be purchased with food stamps include milk and foods made with milk; fruit and vegetables; breads and cereals; meat, fish, poultry, eggs, peanut butter and beans.

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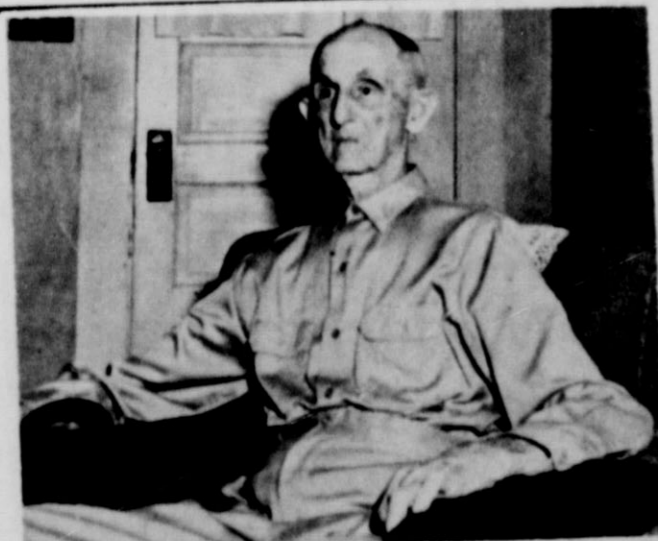
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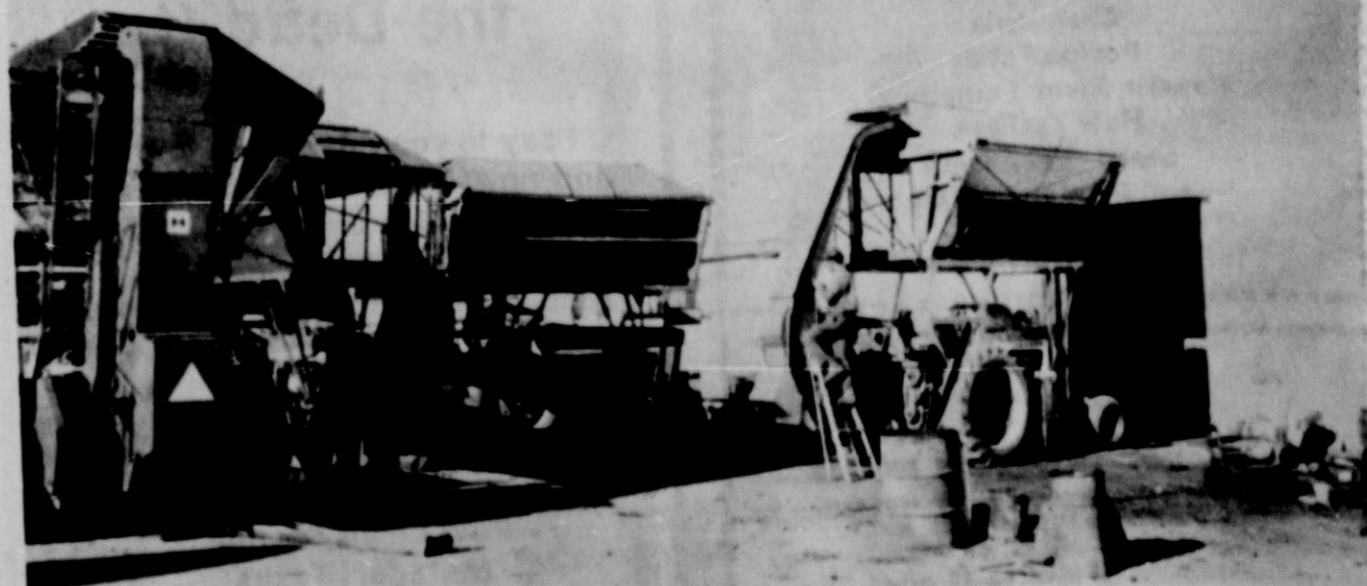
