Motley County Matadors to play for Bi-District title

The Motley County Matadors secured second place in District last Tuesday evening with a second round victory over the Spur bulldogs. The Matadors will now proceed on to Bi-District competition with Chillicothe on Friday, February 22, at Clarendon Jr. College. In the meantime, the Mats will be playing three practice games to prepare for the play-offs. February 12, the Matadors will travel to Aspermont to compete with Bronte, then to Jayton on Friday, February 15, to meet Aspermont. The Matadors will play Snyder on Tuesday, February 19, at Childress.

All the Matadors contributed points in

the game against Spur, but David Alexander scored the highest number of points with 21. Also scoring in double figures was Chris Campbell with 19 and Clay Ewing with 18. Final score for the Spur game was 84-52.

In a high scoring game on Friday night against Paducah, the Mats began the first quarter of play with a deficit of 17 points, and though they outscored the Dragons for the next three quarters of play, the

Mats were unable to close the gap from the first quarter. The game ended with Paducah on top 108-92. David Alexander scored an outstanding 31 points, with Chris Campbell close behind with a total of 27. Clay Ewing put in an additional 12, Tony Gonzalez added 8, as did Matt

Washington. Billy Lefevre shot for two three pointers, giving him 6 points for the game.

Other Matadors sharing the second place title for the season are Burr Barton, Brad Wilson, Neal Sedgewick, Noel Guerrero, Frankie Ortiz, and Paul Barton. Managers for the Mats are Tim Adams, Dustin Davis and Scott Salisbury. Keeping stats and filming for the team are Danny Salisbury and Penny Mars. Coaches are head coach Bob Moore, assisted by Jerry Bass and Tony Raffaele.

Thanks to all the fans who have supported the Mats thus far. The Matadors especially need the support and encouragement of their fans at this point, so plan to be with the Matadors throughout the play-offs!

Commissioners have long agenda in regular monthly meeting

The Motley County Commissioners Court was called into session Monday, February 11, 10:00 a.m. Judge Boyce Hart, Commissioners, John M. Russell, Butch Hughes, Franklin Jameson and J.N. Fletcher and County Clerk Lucretia Campbell were in attendance.

Hughes gave the invocation and Clerk Campbell read the minutes. After a discussion of inventory of Precinct equipment, Commissioner Fletcher amended his motion for the January 14 meeting to include all furniture, equipment, books, etc., in the courthouse, in the inventory. This will be conducted by all heads of departments.

Judge Hart informed the Court that Long Insurance of Roaring Springs won the bid.

Bills were approved. James Gillespie explained to the new Commissioners about the cost-share between the County and City for the bills for the Volunteer Fire Department.

County Agent, Rocky Vinson, presented his office report. Elaine Hart, Deputy Clerk to the Tax Assessor, reported that \$61,877.43 net was collected in taxes in January 1991. Other reports read were Treasurer, Library. The J.P. reported collecting \$4,688.25 in fines.

James Gillespie reported on the 4 Winds RC&D program for rural improvements and cost share projects. He explained at present there isn't an abundance of funds, except two projects approved for Cottle and Stonewall Counties.

The next step in Motley County will be for representatives of Commissioners, Roaring Springs and Matador City Councils to meet and discuss projects concerning them. The dues are \$25 per year.

The Commissioners elected to join 4 Winds.

A 911 update was given by Mr. Gillespie. He stated that due to cost decreases on equipment and also the Public

Utilities Commission, and the fact that the Public Utilities Commission dropping the cost of trunk lines for 911, the system will be a fully enhanced system.

Gillespie said he will need the Commissioners to help identify county roads with numbers or names, being their choices. He also explained Northfield and Afton exchanges will be available at a later date because they are different exchanges.

Hart had one bid on County Depository Funds from the First State Bank of Matador. This bid was accepted.

The Commissioners reconsidered the Resolution from the State Highway Department read in January. This was passed.

The Court discussed at length a policy for county employees, sick leave and vacation time and passed a written policy, retroactive October, 1990, beginning this fiscal year.

Fletcher presented a request from a landowner in Precinct 4 to have two cattle guards replace the existing bridges, so he can graze the right-of-way. After discussion, the Court tabled the request until further study.

The Court reviewed the request from J.T. Swim, new J.P. for Precinct 4, to raise his salary. The court made motion to wait until budget reviews in August and at this time do a feasibility study to review revenue to the County from Precinct 4 and set his salary at that time. At present there is nothing to substantiate a higher salary. This passed, with Fletcher abstaining.

Other issues reviewed and passed were:

Replacing one new name on the Salary Grievance Committee;

Approved plan for County-District Clerk to excuse juror, a request from District Judge, J.R. Hollums;

Setting of court appointed attorney's fees;

Clerk to record Records Act in court

minutes;

Judge to get the elevator repaired;

Russell to do private work in Precinct 1;

Request from the City of Roaring Springs for Precinct 4 to grade and maintain City streets;

Change Social Security and Insurance for Precinct employees to be paid from each Precinct Road and Bridge account, effective October, 1991;

Appoint Franklin Jameson Judge Pro-tem;

Purchase of two law books for the county reference.

Court rejected request for Special Prosecutor to attend school in Houston.

Meeting adjourned.

Funeral Services Held For Three-Term Roaring Springs Mayor

Roaring Springs Mayor, H. Eugene Watson, died Friday morning, February 8, 1991 in a Plainview residence after a lengthy illness. He had been under hospice care.

Mr. Watson, 76, was born in Red River County Texas. He married Cleo Yandell in 1939 at Roaring Springs. They moved to Plainview in 1962 from Roaring Springs and moved back to Roaring Springs in 1983.

He was serving his third term as mayor and had worked as a heavy equipment operator for Hale and Motley Counties. He was a 32nd Degree Mason. He was a member of the Roaring Springs Lions Club and the Roaring Springs Assembly of God Church. A daughter, Mary LeFevre, died June 1990.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Sunday, February 10 in First Baptist Church with the Rev. John Murdock of Lubbock officiating, assisted by Rev. Ernie Brown.

Burial was in Roaring Springs Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home of Matador.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Larry of Dallas and Monte of Roaring Springs; a daughter, Jeannie Williams of Matador; two brothers, Frazier of Roaring Springs and C.E. Jr. of Kilgore; two sisters, Velma Morris of Mesquite and Murle Cantrell of Vacaville, Calif.; five grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were Billy Green, Gary Bridge, Don Baxter, Harold Roller, DeWitt Crosby and Larry Trimble.

Roaring Springs VFD Gets Trucks, Cost Sharing

The Roaring Springs VFD recently bolstered its firefighting arsenal with the acquisition of two trucks, thanks in part to assistance from the Texas Forest Service and the Rural Community Fire Protection (RCFP) program.

VFD officials stretched available funds further by obtaining aid through the RCFP program, which is administered by the Texas Forest Service, the state forestry and firefighting agency. The VFD obtained the trucks free of charge. The TFS had obtained the trucks as federal excess property.

Fifty percent cost-sharing aid -- up to \$5,000 for trucks and \$4,000 for Compressed Air Foam System (CAFS) units and water units -- is available to qualified VFDs.

RCFP funds have assisted with the placement of over 1,800 trucks, CAFS and water units, and other fire apparatus since 1973. Several firefighter associations have obtained \$5,000 in financial

aid, plus design, licensing and purchasing assistance, with basic high-band radio communications systems. Rural firefighters also have purchased over \$625,000 worth of bunker gear, fire rakes and flaps, Nomex clothing and backfire torches at discount prices through the RCFP FIRESAFE Fund.

For additional information about assistance available to rural firefighters, contact the Texas Forest Service, Fire-Control Department, P.O. Box 310, Lufkin, Texas 75901, phone 409-639-8100. Thanks to their contacts, Roaring Springs firefighters gained assistance toward the acquisition of two trucks.

Vince Taylor, Fire Chief, urges caution while burning trash, leaves, etc., as it is very dry. He also stated that donations are being accepted to complete the equipment for the trucks, and are very much appreciated. The Roaring Springs VFD is in cooperation with other area Volunteer Fire Departments.

Home Economically Speaking

CONSIDER PRODUCE PACKAGING

One of the best ways to reduce municipal solid waste is to limit packaging, which comprises about 40 percent of the solid waste stream according to a 1988 Franking Associates study for the EPA. Packaging accounts for 50 percent of all paper produced in the United States, 90 percent of all glass and 12 percent of all the aluminum. One dollar out of every \$11 spent for groceries in the U.S. pays for packaging.

When buying products, consider these types of packaging:

- * Over-packages Items -- An item surrounded by polystyrene beads in a box that is inside another box that is wrapped in plastic maybe very secure. However, all that extra packaging material (the cost of which is added to the price you pay for the product) ends up in the landfill. Buy items such as fruit, vegetables and dry goods that often use little or no packaging at all.

* Refillable and Resealable Containers -- Use refillable containers. Many food cooperatives allow customers to bring their own containers to refill. Peanut butter, cooking oil, honey, shampoo, flour, nuts and many other products can be purchased in this manner. Invest in resealable containers for storing left overs and avoid using disposable plastic wraps, storage bags, etc.

* Bulk Packaging -- Buy food and dry goods in bulk sizes. Items with a long shelf-life such as laundry detergent, flour and dry pet food can be purchased in large size containers. Avoid individually wrapped portions of items such as cheese, fruit, and juice servings which are expensive and add to the waste stream.

* Concentrates and Less Processed Foods -- Purchase concentrates and add the liquid yourself. Transfer to a small container that you use over and over. Eat lower on the food chain by using less highly processed foods. Foods in their natural or raw form have less packaging.

RECYCLING

Americans generate more trash than any other nation in the world. Americans throw away ten times their weight in trash every year or about one-half ton for every person. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimates that 80 percent of our trash goes to landfills, 10 percent is incinerated and 10 percent is recycled.

Recycling involves three basic steps: Separating, processing and return to commerce. Many products can be recycled including paper, aluminum, iron and steel, glass, some plastics, wood waste, yard waste, kitchen waste, automobile tires and motor.

Recycling means to reuse. Recycling reduces the amount of waste buried in landfills, cuts down on litter and helps conserve natural resources and helps reduce the demand for energy and raw materials. Recycling programs vary. The type of recycling program a community chooses should be designed to meet community needs and be easy to use.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are for people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

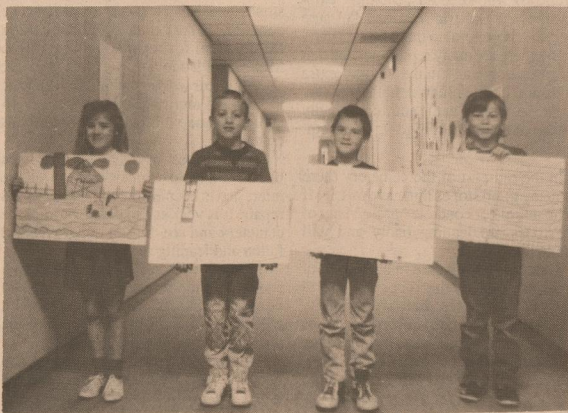

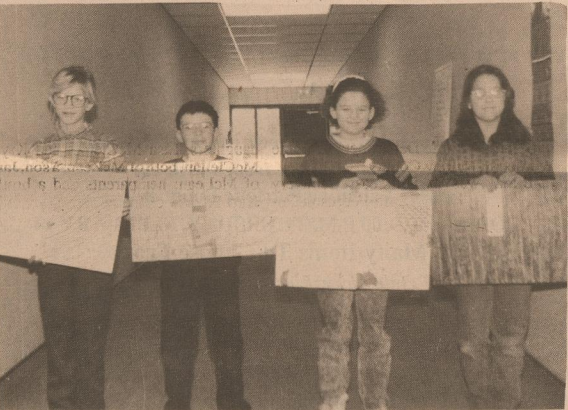

After discussion, Brown Hinson made a motion to accept the offer and Beth Hinson seconded the motion. Motion carried.

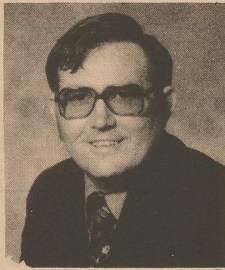

One purpose of the "hard saying" was to make His hearers think. That was difficult and often uncomfortable especially when it involves the critical reappraisal of firmly held convictions. Often times Jesus challenging the current consensus of opinion of His day.

Another purpose of these "hard sayings" was to make them understandable. The better we understand them, the harder they are to take. The famous author, Mark Twain, said that the things in the Bible which bothered him the most were not the things which he didn't understand, but those he did.

It is only when the human will collide with Jesus that His teachings become "hard sayings" and therefore unacceptable to some. Jesus knew this, and still knows it. His purpose can be seen in the "hard sayings". That purpose? To cause humanity to realize its lost condition and repent.

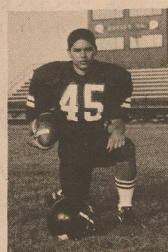

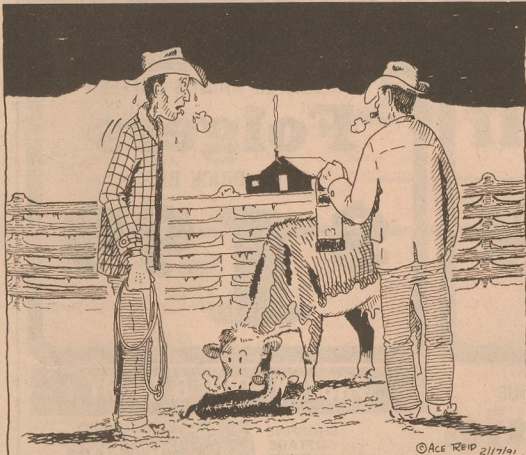
