UNION Thanksgiving service will be held at the Assembly of God Church in Roaring Springs, Sunday evening, Nov. 18 and will begin at 7 o'clock, according to Rev. Mrs. Ben Dillard, pastor.

Mrs. Agnes Aaron of Matador will bring the message for the occasion. She is a Methodist minister and the mother of Mrs. Reece Timmons.

The Thanksgiving service is held each year, alternating at the different churches in the community. Everyone in the community and area is extended a cordial invitation to attend.

COMMUNITY Thanksgiving worship service in Matador will be held at the United Methodist Church

Sunday evening, Nov. 18, beginning at 6:00 p.m. All pastors of the churches here have been invited to participate in planning the service, and Rev. Leonard Sims, pastor of First Baptist Church, will present the Thanksgiving message, which is rotated among the ministers from year to year. Other ministers attending will have a part in the service.

Thanksgiving hymns and music will be led by the host Choir Director, Mrs. Glenn Woodruff.

"I think one of the things we should be grateful for is that we do have a community of citizens who are friendly and understanding toward their neighbors," said the host pastor. "We are not alone. We have faith that God is in our midst. Therefore, it is fitting that we have a true 'Community' Thanksgiving service."

Conference And Harvest Day Set

The United Methodist Churches of Matador and Roaring Springs will meet Sunday afternoon, Nov. 18 for Annual Charge Conference, which will follow the Annual Harvest Thanksgiving worship service, at the morning hour, 10:45 in the Matador church.

The Rev. Dr. Weldon Butler will preside at the Conference, scheduled for 2:00 p.m. here. Reports on the achievements of the plan will be given by the officers of the church, and new officers for 1974 will be elected.

Dr. Butler will also present the Thanksgiving message in the Harvest Day service, preceding a Fellowship dinner in the basement. One of the purposes of this service is to contribute money for the budgeted benevolent program, includ-

ing Ministerial support, World Service and Conference benevolences. It includes also institutional ministry, such as colleges and homes for the aged, needy children and youth, and the Conference Camping program.

The United Methodist Church of Matador reports a total membership of 286, with a per capita giving last year of over \$79.00, and a total of more than \$22,000 for all purposes.

The Roaring Springs United Methodist Church is an "extended Ministry" with the Matador Church. It reports 36 members, with seven associate members from other denominations. It reported a total of \$3078.00 for all purposes, last year ending Dec. 31, 1972.

The Rev. Douglas W. Gossett is pastor of both churches.

Chest Will Launch Drive For \$2,000

The first Matador Community Chest fund drive in two years will be launched soon with a goal of \$2,000. The announcement was made this week by President R. M. (Bob) Stanley. As in the past several years the drive will be conducted by mail.

Residents will receive a letter with an enclosed self-addressed and stamped envelope. Contributors to the Community Chest may remit by check or a signed pledge at the bottom of the letter. Pledges may be paid at the convenience of the contributor.

A 10 member board which serves without pay, passes on all disbursements from the funds. In past years the disbursements to transients have been from \$35 to \$69 per year.

The Chest supports Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts and Teen

Canteen. The Chest also has a fund for local charity cases. Agencies receiving a percentage of funds include the Red Cross, USO and Salvation Army.

Outside solicitation is kept to a minimum, and most groups know that Matador has a Community Chest and has never asked its contributors for more money in the same year.

The reason the campaign is conducted by mail is to save time. The Chest is sponsored by the Matador Lions Club and for many years members took of their time to make personal solicitations. They in turn took up the time of the people being solicited. Since the purpose and operation is generally known, it was found that the mail campaign was as efficient as a personal drive. Records are kept of each contribution.

Youth Center Plan Seeking Approval

The plan to organize a youth center for the young people of the county, which was announced some time ago, has met with some opposition. The sponsors of the plan do not wish to cause any dissention in this community or in the county. They want a mandate of the people, and are asking for a vote of adults.

The sponsors want to explain further, the plan which has worked in other towns. It is that the center will be youth governed, but subject to unscheduled inspection. They want a place where young people can meet at least five nights each week; can play juke box music; can operate their own Coke machine and play marble machines; also perhaps play at pool or billiard table. The recreation center would also probably be operated in the afternoons.

It was stressed that the center is not planned to take the place of the Teen Canteen, or to interfere with the function of that group, in any way, and a proposal has been made that the center would not be open during the time the Canteen is open.

The sponsors have but one idea in mind, and that is to provide a place for young people to meet, many of whom are in the 21-or-above age group, and to take them off the streets.

The sponsors want a vote of the people, and a voting place has been arranged at

the City Hall, for the convenience of the public. Votes do not need to be signed. The sponsors merely want a (yes) or (no).

They are also open for suggestions. If a resident does not vote, but has a suggestion, the sponsors will appreciate receiving it. If anyone has a better plan, it will be sincerely appreciated.

Ballots may be cast today, Friday and Monday. They will be placed in a regulation ballot box. They may also be mailed to the City Hall. The sponsors will check ballots, and from the returns decide if they are to continue with the plan, or leave the youth to their own destiny.

NAME BAND WILL PLAY FOR TEENS

A well known band, the Maines Bros., of Lubbock, will play for the Teen Canteen dance Saturday night, Nov. 17, at the American Legion Building, it was announced again this week.

Young people from the 8th grade, through high school and including persons through 21 years of age, (if unmarried) are eligible to attend. Admittance will be \$1.50 per person.

The dance will be under supervision of adult sponsors of the Teen Canteen.

THE MATADORS won their ninth straight game of the season, and earned a state playoff berth with their 56-6 win over the Lazbuddie Longhorns, Friday night here on Burleson Field.

Preceding the game, Naomi Simpson was crowned Football Sweetheart by the captains, Doug Meador, Billy Osborn, Thomas Tilson and Kelly Keltz, and a Veterans Salute to the Flag was presented by members of the VFW and American Legion.

It was Homecoming for the Matadors and they put on a good show for the fans, students and exes. The Matadors were paced by the running and catching of Clede Campbell, who scored 24 points. Castulo Gonzales added 14 and Frank Welling added 12 more.

The Matadors scored first in the first quarter. Lazbuddie tried an inside kick and the Matadors got the ball on the Lazbuddie 42, then drove the ball down to the three and Gonzales scored. Steve Stevens ran over the extra points.

FOLLOWING a Longhorn punt, the Matadors got the ball on the 45. Quarterback Stevens passed to Clede Campbell for the score. Gonzales added the extra points.

Lazbuddie was again forced to punt and C. Campbell took it, picked up some blockers and ran it all the way for the score. The extras were no good.

In the second quarter the Matadors stopped a Longhorn drive and got the ball, driving it down to their own 41 and C. Campbell broke 59 yards for the score. The extras were no good and the Matadors led 28-0 at halftime.

In the third quarter following a Lazbuddie punt, the Matadors again scored when Stevens passed to Welling for the score. Gonzales added the extras and Matador led 36-0.

THE LONGHORNS were forced to punt again. Two plays later, Stevens again hit Welling for the score. J. D. Hurt added the extras.

Following the Matador kickoff, Lazbuddie fumbled and Joe Campbell recovered. The next play, Clede Campbell ripped thirty yards for the score. The extras were no good.

The final Matador score came in the fourth quarter. Gonzales picked off a Lazbuddie pass and ran it all the way in for the touchdown. The Matadors led 56-0.

Late in the fourth quarter Lazbuddie managed to score. The Longhorns' Bountella made the TD and the Matadors won 56-6.

Although the Matadors are to advance to the playoffs, they have not yet won their district. They are guaranteed at least a co-championship of the district. They must win over the Wilson Mustangs to be sure of an outright championship. Coach Stan Irvine urges the fans to support the Matadors as they try to achieve a 10-0 record with a win over the Mustangs, Friday night at 7:30, in Wilson.

What the available data indicated was a remarkable absence of the many intermediate forms required by the theory; the absence of the primitive types that should have existed in the strata regarded as the most ancient; and the sudden appearance of the principal taxonomic groups." These "principal taxonomic groups" are the large groups of animals which have never been crossed, either in nature or the laboratory.

We know such groups as cattle, horses, dogs, cats, apes, etc. For thousands and thousands of years man has observed variations within the groups; but never variations which slowly caused a member to develop out of one group into another. This idea of animals developing from one group to another has never been demonstrated in the laboratory, by excavated skeletons, or fossils. The Book of God plainly says that each "kind" brought forth after its kind. Genesis one.
