Amarillo Man Dies in Lake

Providential Rain Checks Grass Fire

IT SEEMED that the world was on fire Wednesday night last week as tongues of flames licked the abundant prairie grass. It was a prairie fire being driven by a sandstorm. It had burned an area of an estimated 3000

acres, extending from the QA&P Railway tracks, northward to US Highway 70, about 10 miles east of Matador.

Fire departments from Paducah and Matador were present with all the equipment they could muster. Ranchers and landowners from much of the county were present and fighting the fire with all the facilities at hand.

Bull dozers were struggling to scrape away the turf to keep the wind-driven fire from spreading. In most instances the wind would sweep the fire across the fire guards. At times the wind would change and drive the fire in a different direction.

It was burning in areas of fences at times and fence lines had the appearance of long rows of candles. Hundreds of dollars worth of fence were lost.

A fishing trip Tuesday ended in tragedy for an Amarillo couple when Willie F. Turner, 71, drowned while fishing from an inner tube on Jack Spray's farm lake eight miles north of here.

Justice of the Peace Fred Bourland pronounced Turner dead about 11:30 a.m. and ruled death due to accidental drowning.

Mrs. Turner told Motley County Sheriff Jinks Wilson that her husband put on wading boots and began fishing from an inner tube in the three-foot deep water.

The woman also told Wilson she went inside a camper-trailer for about 10 minutes, then returned to see her husband a short distance from the bank, slumped over with his head and shoulders under water.

Wading into the water, Mrs. Turner pulled her husband to the bank, then called an ambulance.

An unidentified man fishing across the lake tried to revive him, but attempts failed.

Turner was a retired mechanic for the City of Amarillo. The couple had arrived at the lake about 10 a.m. and intended to spend the night in their camper, according to Mrs. Turner.

Local arrangements were handled by a Motley County Ambulance with arrangements in Amarillo handled by Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Home.

Born in Eric, Okla., Turner moved to Amarillo 60 years ago. He was a former Amarillo city employee and since 1947 had been involved in real estate rentals. He was a member and past trustee of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows No. 110 in Amarillo. He was also a member of the San Jacinto Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife, Thelma; two brothers, George A. and Jack, both of Amarillo; a sister, Mrs. Vallie Stanford of Amarillo; and a half-sister, Mrs. Ola Worley of Pampa.

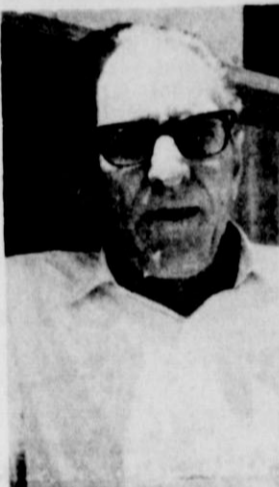
IN HOSPITAL AT PADUCAH

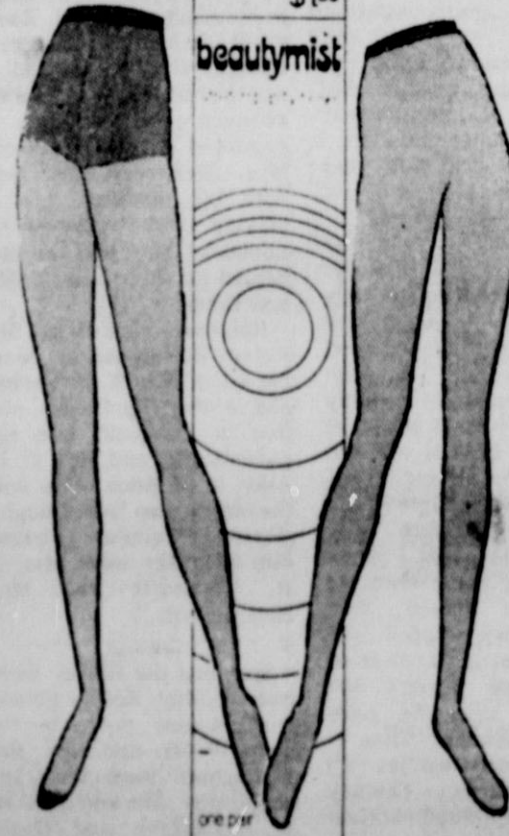
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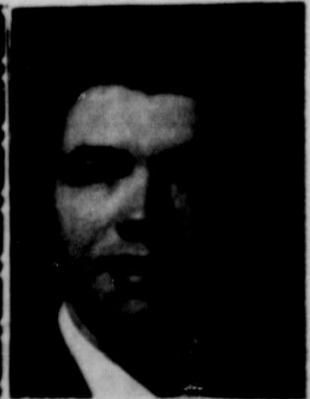
