# Showers Help Crop Outlook

SCATTERED showers last week and again Tuesday have greatly relieved the crop and range outlook in the county area. The rains last week were heavier in the Roaring Springs area.

There the rains measured 1.67 inches in town and as much as 1.90 inches west of town.

Here in Matador Bob Stanley registered one-half inch last week and .41 inch Tuesday. Reports from Flomot and Northfield indicate that the rainfall was not general over the county.

Crops in most sections have been relieved of the prolonged dry and hot weather and range conditions have been greatly improved. The danger of grass fires has been temporarily lessened.

### Firemen Get Wet

Tuesday afternoon when a storm cloud was approaching from the southwest, the fire alarm sounded and many thought a tornado might have been sighted.

It was a grass fire, however, at the Matador Ranch headquarters a mile southwest of town. Grass was burning near a barn at the ranch. Two members of the Matador Volunteer Fire Department responded in the department's "GT" grass fire truck.

They were close enough to see the smoke when the rains came. They extinguished the fire but thoroughly doused the firemen. The old truck does not have a cab or any protection for the drivers, who got soaking wet for their trouble.

The rainfall at Roaring Springs Tuesday was described as a good shower. Weather forecasters declared that no rains were in the forecast. Yesterday, however, more showers were in the forecast.

### Man Severely Burned In Ranch Explosion

AN EXPLOSION and flash fire at the Burleson Ranch line camp on Cottonwood Mott creek Saturday morning severely burned William Ratze. He was painting the interior of the historic old ranch house, preparing to move to the location.

He lit a cigarette and the explosion followed with a flash fire, in which Ratze was severely burned. He was working alone at the time but managed to drive to US Highway 70 where a passing motorist drove him to Floydada. He suffered first and second degree burns about the face, arms and hands. He is in the Floydada Caprock Hospital.

Mr. Ratze had previously been working for the Matador Ranch but was preparing to move his wife and young son, Clinton, 2, to the Burleson Ranch where he was to start employment.

Mr. Burleson told the Tribune that an insurance adjuster had examined the scene of the explosion and determined it had resulted from paint or thinner fumes collected in the building.

Both gables of the house were dislocated, windows and doors were blown out and parts of the ceiling were dislocated and left hanging. A chest of drawers in

the room where Mr. Ratze was working, had the varnish blistered by the fire.

A unit of the Matador Fire Department was dispatched to the scene but the building did not burn.

### Historic Location

The scene of the explosion is a historic location. It is believed that the lumber in the old house may have been freighted from Childress, or possibly Ft. Worth. It was the Matador Land & Cattle Co. line camp over three score years.

From the book, "The Early History of Motley County," by the late Harry H. Campbell, is the following information, quoting pioneer Frank Collison: "Jim Harkey was working for the Spur Cattle Company and Jim Barbee was working for the Jingle Bob Cattle Company."

The night of January 1, 1880, these two boys killed each other in the old log cabin at Cottonwood Mott. At the time there were two freighters hauling corn from San Saba to Hall's headquarters on Hall Creek and they stayed all night at this camp. The boys were getting supper at the time when Jim Barbee started singing a song, some little cowpuncher's song.

"Jim Harkey said: 'That's a fool song you are singing!' Barbee probably said it was all right Harkey then said: 'No one but a damn fool would sing it.'"

"Both had six shooters on and they pulled together. Barbee was killed by the first shot. Harkey was shot squarely through the hip, right through both kidneys, and was also killed.

One of the freighters went to the corral and got the first horse he could catch. He rode to Spur headquarters on what we now call Hall creek on Pease River. Dick Hudson was ranch foreman at the time.

"They went down with two or three hands and sent a man to my camp (Grapevine Springs) on Tongue River to notify me (Collison) of the killing. When I got there the next morning about one, they had two graves dug on the east side of Mott Creek. The freighters had a new wagon sheet cut in half and buried Harkey in one half and Barbee in the other."

It is probable that the old house in the photograph was built shortly after the shooting incident.

### Replies Needed In Boys Ranch Survey

Last week a committee mailed questionnaires regarding interest in the proposed Boys Ranch project to be located in Motley County. One proposition was for financial support. Another asked for financial support in the future and another opposed the idea.

L. B. (Bundy) Campbell is chairman of the committee. In a report at the Matador Lions Club Tuesday he had received only 31 replies. A total of \$1,715 was pledged in 16 replies, and 15 said they would aid the project when able.

Mr. Campbell is asking that everyone who received a questionnaire, mail it back at once so a fair estimate of the interest in the project can be obtained.

### Lions Get Lesson On Rattler Milking

YOU NEVER know when knowledge will come in handy, and now the members of the Matador Lions Club have had their first lesson in milking rattler snakes from the fangs of a Black Diamond rattlesnake.

The teacher was Cecil Fox of Spur who perhaps knows more about rattlesnakes than anyone in the country. He was guest speaker at the club's regular luncheon meeting held in the

First United Methodist Church basement at 12:30 Tuesday.

Mr. Fox, who retired as a state game warden in 1966, has been studying rattlers and their habits since 1928. He has appeared on seven television shows, and has given his talks and demonstrations to thousands.

Mr. Fox is well-known in Matador, having appeared here several times. He was introduced at the meeting by program sponsor, Lion Pat Seigler. At one point in the program he milked poison from the fangs of a large rattler.

At another point he almost lost his audience when he tossed three stuffed, spring propelled dummy snakes among the Lions. "I do that to keep my audience awake," Mr. Fox said.

If you are interested, the average life of a rattlesnake is 14 years. Rattlesnakes have been known to give birth to as many as 39 little snakes that are usually about 11 inches in length. Many snakes hatch their young from eggs. Among the many items in Mr. Fox's exhibit, is a jar of preserved coachwhip eggs almost as large as hen eggs. People from foreign countries have come to Mr. Fox's place to see his reptile exhibit. He has now done away with the snakes because of the danger involved.

The "unbelievable" exhibit being displayed was the tanned skin of a giant rattler killed near Roaring Springs. The skin measures seven feet, four and one-half inches and has 17 rattlers. If you want another fact about rattlers, they frequently break their fangs when striking a hard object, but they are replaced in three or four weeks.

Mr. Fox says there are more snakes than before because the people who used to kill them, have deserted farms and left the rattlers to multiply.

An excellent fried chicken dinner was served by the Methodist Ladies, who received an applause when cited by Lion President Ervin Willard.

### KOOKS CORNER

#### LEMON CREAM SHERBERT

By Mrs. Robert Darsey

Juice and grated rind of 4 lemons, 2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup white corn syrup, 1 1/2 qts. whole milk, 2 cups cream, dash salt.

Grate rind of lemon, cover with 1 cup water, bring to boil and boil for 3 or 4 minutes, strain. To liquid, add lemon juice, sugar, syrup, salt. Let stand. Beat eggs, add milk and cream, pour into freezer, add lemon mixture - freeze.

Serve with apricot sauce: 2 cans apricots, drained, put in blender few at a time, until blended. Add 1/2 cup apricot juice, 3/4 cup honey, 1/4 cup lemon juice, salt. Blend, chill and serve over sherbet.

#### STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

In relation to movements and continuation of activities in and among the bodies in space, scientists are divided into two main groups - uniformitarians and cataclysmists. The former believe that in the distant past bodies of the universe developed laws to regulate their movements in space. In this instance the established law of nature changed very quickly - not over a period of thousands of years. One may read a somewhat detailed account of this discovery in **WORLDS IN COLLISION** by Immanuel Velikovsky, page 24ff.

There are several happenings in the Bible which conflict with the existing earth laws. These do not present a problem to the wholehearted Christian. The God who made the elements and life would have no trouble with changing a law of nature.

Scientific findings about the flood and the frozen mammoths support the truth of the Bible. The Bible is the word of God.
