

The "unbelievable" exhibit being displayed was the tanned skin of a giant rattler killed near Roaring Springs. The skin measures seven feet, four and one-half inches and has 17 rattlers. If you want another fact about rattlers, they frequently break their fangs when striking a hard object, but they are replaced in three or four weeks.

STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

In relation to movements and continuation of activities in and among the bodies in space, scientists are divided into two main groups - uniformitarians and cataclysmists. The former believe that in the distant past bodies of the universe developed laws to regulate their movements in space. They believe that these laws are so fixed that they will allow little or no variations

Cataclysmists believe that there have been, on occasions, great variations from the "fixed laws." The flood is a case in point. Another example is that of the frozen mammoths in

In the mid 1800's scientists found in northern Siberia mammoths that had frozen to death so suddenly that they were still standing, and with subtropical grass (not arctic moss) in their mouths. This scientific find proves that the earth's pole position in relation to the sun changed so suddenly that a tropical climate became an arctic climate and the mammoths froze so quickly that they did not have time to finish their meal.
