LIGHT VOTE

ONE of the lightest votes in Motley County was recorded Tuesday in the balloting of proposed Constitutional Amendments. In the six voting precincts the total was only 199 votes. The county has a potential voting strength of approximately 1200.

In the two boxes in Matador only 96 voters went to the polls. The amendment No. 1 to provide annual regular sessions of the legislature and to raise the legislators salary to \$15,000 took the worst defeat in this county. 62 for and 135 against.

Amendment 2 had 142 for and 51 against. No. 3 had 136 for and 57 against.

Amendment No. 4 had 81 for and 92 against. No. 5 had 101 for and 78 against. No. 6 had 57 for and 128 against. No. 7 had 129 for and 63 against. No. 8 had 63 for and 120 against and No. 9 had 93 for and 91 against.

Aid Is Asked For Camp At Kerrville

BEFORE 1948 the Lions Club at Kerrville was just another Lions Club. Then a member had an idea and the Kerrville Camp for Crippled Children was started. A piece of land, 540 acres was purchased from the government for \$15,000. Since that time more than 14,000 handicapped children have found new dimensions in freedom and happiness at the camp.

The start of the famous camp was explained Tuesday by Ed Flood of Amarillo who is a director of the camp. He was featured speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club. He was introduced by program sponsor Lion Frank Price.

The camp had rough going for a time when \$100,000 was required to get it accepted by Lions International. In a massive fund drive \$79,000 was raised and a Lion made a loan of \$21,000.

Lion Flood explained the many scenes at the camp as handicapped children are taught to do things for themselves. Children without legs are taught to swim. They find a new freedom in being among children who are also handicapped. Since 1957 in cooperation with the Texas Commission for the Blind, the Lions League has operated the Texas Center for the Blind using the

Soil Dist. Names Slover President

BILLIE RAY SLOVER of Matador, Monday night was named new president of Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District. He succeeds Duke Lipscomb, who had held the place for four or five years.

The election was held in the Soil Conservation office in the basement of the courthouse. Other officers elected were Tom Ross of Flomot as vice-president, and Carlie Long of Roaring Springs as secretary and treasurer.

The board reviewed activities of the district and

stressed the need to exercise stewardship of the soil. They discussed the needs, effectiveness and cost of brush control.

Tony Dean of the local office explained different types of fencing and estimated costs.

Ervin Willard, head of the county office, stressed getting people interested and involved in the objects of the soil conservation district program and said posters and school essays had proven effective.

Dean presented a slide projection in which many projects of soil conservation were effectively shown. One of the slides showed grass seeded in a field which had had proper fertilizer.

Near the conclusion of the program Willard discussed the effect which the new farm program might have on soil conservation. He said much retired land would probably be put back into cultivation.

"We would like to sound a word of warning," Mr. Willard said. "Some of the land was retired because it should not have been plowed up in the first place. Some of the land is very good, but we hope farmers putting land back into cultivation, will first consult with us. We believe we can aid in preventing costly mistakes."

Matadors Win Over Happy

It was cold at Happy, Texas Friday night, but it was a lot colder for the Happy Cowboys as the Matadors trounced them 28-7, in a District 2-B football tilt.

A caravan of Matador fans again went to watch the Matadors play and again watched the Matadors win. The Matadors got 16 first downs to Happy's 14. The Matadors rushed for 338 yards and gained 345 total yards to the Cowboys' 172 yards rushing and 172 total yards.

The Matadors scored first in the fourth quarter. Following an exchange of punts the Matadors got the ball. Two plays later after the punt halfback Clede Campbell ripped 61 yards for the Matador score. The extra points were no good.

The Matadors kicked to the Cowboys and a few plays later Happy fumbled and Joe Campbell recovered. Three plays later Troy Taylor scored on a 37 yard run. Taylor then ran the extra points over.

The Matadors got the ball again when they stopped a Happy drive. The next play Troy Taylor again scored, this time from 40 yards out. The extras were no good and the Matadors went in with a 20-0 halftime lead.

The third quarter opened and neither team could score.

In the fourth quarter the Matadors got the ball. In 15 plays they marched the ball 81 yards and Castulo Gonzales capped it off with a 3 yard touchdown. Steve Stevens passed to J. D. Hurt for the extras making it 28-0.

Late in the fourth quarter the Matadors fumbled on their 21 and Happy recovered. The Cowboys drove the ball down to the 5 and Greg Looney scored for the Cowboys. The point after was good and the final score was 28-7.

Coach Stan Irvine had great praise for the Matador line. "Our boys controlled the line of scrimmage. They opened up holes for our backs to run through. They also controlled Happy's explosive offense," he said. The Matadors had to overcome two obstacles. The Happy line out-weighted the Matador almost 40 pounds per man. They had to stop the districts leading scorer in Greg Looney.

The Matadors are number 5 team in the state of Texas in class B football. If the Matadors win one of their next two games they will advance to the playoffs.

The Matadors host the Lazbuddie Longhorns here Friday night on Burleson field, which will be the Matadors homecoming.

STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

The quotes in this study are from Thompson's INTRODUCTION to Darwin's ORIGIN.

On Page nine Thompson states "Darwin's first argument (For evolution, LEO.). This 'first argument' has to do with 'Variations.' On page viii Thompson gives Darwin's position on 'variations' in these words.

"This is, that all the organisms that exist or have existed have developed from a few extremely simple forms or from one alone, by a process of descent with modification. The mechanism of these transformations though infinitely complex in its detailed working, is very simple in principle. For reasons not fully understood organisms tend to vary slightly in their various characteristics."

The term "variations" as used by Darwin may be illustrated as follows. A certain insect, animal, or plant may be observed for several of its generations. Occasionally a member of that particular "kind" will show a decided difference from others of its group (This much is fact.). From there Darwin reasons that because rare differences appear occasionally, over millions of years there came to be a new "kind" of insect because of continued variations (This is not fact.). No scientist has ever discovered a specimen which proves that variations have caused a member of one "kind" to cross over from one large classification to another.

Here are Thompson's conclusions about the "variations" theory, after many years of comparing Darwin's theory with scientific discovery.

"But the facts and interpretations on which Darwin relied have now ceased to convince. The long-continued investigations on heredity and variation have undermined the Darwinian position." Page XII

That is strong language from a noted scientist. "... have now ceased to convince." Today Darwin's reasoning is not convincing. "... have undermined the Darwinian position." Present studies in heredity and variations have disproved Darwin's theory.

For many years she assisted in fund drives for the Red Cross and other community projects. She was substitute teacher in the Matador School system between 1945 and 1967, starting during the late B. F. Tunnell's tenure as superintendent here.

During the years her daughter, Rose Carolyn (now Mrs. Carl Pierce of Lubbock) was growing up, her interests centered on youth activities. She is a past-president of the Matador Parent-Teacher Association, and worked with the Girl Scouts organization. Her keen interest in things modern, especially music and movies creates a rapport with young people that bridges the "generation gap."

HAZEL WALTON was born in Matador of pioneer parentage. Her mother was the former Caroline Cribbs, and her father, Walter A. Walton was Motley County's first County Clerk. She has lived here all her

life except for a few months one summer when her mother tried to move to Corpus Christi. Hazel was in about the seventh grade, and "cried every day until mama gave up and moved back to Matador." She was just four years old when her father died.

She graduated from Matador High School in 1924, as valedictorian of the class. During her school years she was involved in various activities, and had the lead part in the senior class play.

Following graduation, she attended the College of Industrial Arts in Denton, (later to become Texas Women's University.)

Her first day there was traumatic. "I had accompanied Julia and Hugh Luckett in their touring car, as they were en route to Dallas, where they were enrolled in S.M.U. We started early Sunday morning and it rained on us all day. There were no paved highways, and the roads were flooded. We finally had to stop in Bowie to spend the night. It was still raining when we reached Denton the next morning, and when they left me and my suitcases at the door of the administration building and drove away, I felt very much alone, and not very happy."

She soon adjusted to dormitory life and met many friends with whom she still is in touch. Her first roommate was a Matador friend, Beryle Williams, (Mrs. Ed Bishop of Dalhart.) Among her schoolmates were Altha Evers, who later taught music here, and is now Mrs. W. O. Jones Jr., of Paducah; Miriam Matlock, who also came here to teach and is now Mrs. W. A. Saunders of Corpus Christi; and Viola Knight, another who came here to teach, and later became Mrs. Chas. Keith, and still makes Matador her home.

Also a schoolmate was Miss Gussie Nell Davis, who started the Killgore Rangerettes on the road to fame as their manager, a position she still holds.

GRADUATING from CIA in 1928, with a BA degree, Hazel returned home, and on June 19, 1929 she was married to R. E. "Don" Donovan, who had come here in 1926 with his foster parents, the late Dr. and Mrs. George B. Parkhill. Mr. Donovan passed away in April, 1953.

In the early 1950's, Mrs. Donovan became a volunteer helper at the Tribune, coming down at all hours to address the bundles and assist in getting the paper in the mail on press night.

To be involved is to be a friend, which is to say that Hazel Donovan is a friend to, as well as a part of the community.

Growers Protest Control On Export Of U S Cotton

LUBBOCK, Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz October 23 strongly reiterated his stand against export controls on cotton or other agricultural commodities and expressed the belief that his position is gaining support among the sometimes control-happy powers of Washington.

The Secretary's statements were made in a Washington conference with 10 executive officers of cotton producer organizations from across the cotton belt and a representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture. Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, who was chairman of the producer group, said "We came away feeling somewhat better about prospects for continuing unrestricted sales to our foreign customers, which is extremely important to the cotton industry and to our area in particular."

Is Major Threat
The possibility of exports being curtailed, as proposed by the domestic textile industry and some consumer advocates, has been and continues to be a major threat to the current boom in cotton prices and to further development of foreign markets. The session with Secretary Butz was requested by producer organizations to express their collective gratitude and continued support for his effective opposition to controls.

"In this instance as in others the Secretary has been one of the cotton producer's very best friends," Johnson said, "and he is deserving of the highest praise for having withstood the pressures that have been exerted on him and his office from a number of directions."

According to Johnson the Secretary agreed with the producer contention that controls on cotton exports are in no way justified and would be more harmful than helpful to the industry and to the nation.

"In the judgement of those at the meeting," Johnson said, "with the Secretary's valuable support and with help from our other friends in Washington, export controls do not appear to be on the near horizon."

In addition to Johnson from the High Plains, representatives attended the meeting from the Texas Rolling Plains, the Lower Rio Grande Valley, South Texas, Louisiana, Arizona, California, Arkansas, the Southeast and the Producer Steering Committee of the National Cotton Council.
