From professional wrestler to the pulpit is the story behind Rev. Tommy Phelps of Amarillo, who will do the preaching in a coming revival at the First Baptist church in Roaring Springs.

The revival will begin Monday, December 3 and continue through Sunday, December 9, according to the pastor, Rev. Jim Ritter.

Singing will be led by Terry Keltz of Plainview, ministerial student at Wayland Baptist College.

Services will be at 7:00 p. m. and Sunday morning service will be at 10:45.

Rev. Phelps was a professional wrestler for 17 1/2 years before being converted to Christ. He wrestled as "Nature Boy" with hair bleached blond and wore fancy robes and capes. He wrestled in almost every major city in the United States, plus several foreign countries.

He surrendered to the ministry in November of 1962 and attended Southwestern Baptist Seminary from 1963 until 1966, graduating in January, 1966 with a diploma in Theology. His first pastorate was of the Inspirational Point Baptist Church in Fort Worth, for two years, while attending Seminary.

The 1973 Matador Matadors achieved the first perfect season since 1919 when the Matador Bullfighters did it 54 years ago. The Matadors accomplished this feat with their tenth straight win of the season with a victory over the Wilson Mustangs 22-9 last Friday at Wilson.

The Matadors needed the win to clinch an outright championship of District 2-B. The Matadors were paced by Castulo Gonzales who rushed for 109 yards and returned an interception for a touchdown.

Wilson struck first, in the first quarter. Following a fumbled punt attempt by the Matadors, Wilson had the ball on the Matador 24. The Matadors prevented the touchdown, but Wilson kicked a field goal and led 3-0.

Wilson attempted an on-side kick but the Matadors recovered. The Matadors marched the ball down to the 6 and Clede Campbell scored. Steve Stevens added the extras and Matador led 8-3.

Wilson got the ball following a Matador punt and drove it down to the 2 where the Mustangs' quarterback scored. The extras were no good and Wilson led 9-8.

The third quarter opened and neither team could score.

Late in the third quarter Castulo Gonzales broke 48 yards which set up a fourth quarter 2 yard touchdown by Steve Stevens. Stevens added the extras and Matador led 16-9.

In the fourth quarter Wilson had the ball and tried passing and Gonzales picked the pass off and ran 41 yards for the score. The extras were no good and Matador won it 22-9.

The Number 3 ranked Matadors have amassed 278 total points for the season for an average of 27.8 per game. They allowed only 84 points allowing an average of 8.4 per game.

The Matador Matadors will now advance to Bi-District. They will play the District 1-B champions Groom Tigers at Memphis Friday Night at 7:30.
