It was then time to milk usually six to eight cows in the cow barn with its odors that bordered on familiar perfume. At my home we had a large strainer bucket, and about three extra milk buckets. My mother in hertrim little apron over her warm clothes, met us at the door to help us inside with the milk. We ate around a table vered with a checked oil cloth. After wash-out on the back porch we were ready for supper. There was little variation in winter or summer. A kettle of blackeye peas or red beans, a great pan of cornbread, four blue bowls and plenty of milk. Many times it was only cornbread and sweet milk, but we never suffered any diet deficiency and none of us ever had a nervous break-

HIGHEST deposits in the history of the 68-year-old First State Bank here was reached during the past week. The call was for December 31, and the deposits on that date were \$5,998,855.80.

On the first day of business in 1974 Wednesday, January 2, the deposits for the single day were \$1,304,069.43, probably the largest deposits for a single day in the history of the bank. On January 4, the deposits total had reached \$7,091,853.63.

John Barnhill, executive vice-president of the pioneer financial institution, says that conditions are the best he has ever known and that many farmers and ranchers will pay completely out of debt with money left. He says it is the first time that some have been completely out of debt in ten to fifteen years.

The conditions here are not unusual in West Texas where farmers have received some of the highest prices in history for cotton and milo, while on the other hand cattle growers have received record high prices for livestock.

Crop and livestock conditions through the past year have been some of the most favorable in the history of the country

On the other side of the spectrum replacement cattle are high as is labor. The farmers face the same problem with generally higher equipment, seed, fertilizer and labor

It is true that the farmer is in excellent financial condition, but that he must fight inflationary prices in the things he needs, until he makes another crop.

What is the basis for New Testament authority? Heb. 1:1-2. God, after He spoke long ago to the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in His Son,

The "last days" began during Paul's lifetime. We are still in those "last days." But God does not contact man in "many ways" now as in times past. Today He speaks to mankind in only one way -- by His Son.
