Nursing services are being offered through the West Texas Home Health Agency. an independent agency based in Lubbock, for Motley, Cottle, King and Dickens Counties.

Some of the services available are surgical dressings, catheterizations, catheter irrigations, insertion of stomach tubes, injections, intravenouses, vena puncture for blood analysis, monitoring blood pressure and other vital signs. been a game warden in exercises, training in ambulation, physical therapy, speech therapy, enemas, sitz baths, and teaching of family was announced by Boss Lion members to care for the patient
