

Sandhill Crane **Hunting To Start**

season getting underway Tuesday, and the hunting season will be conducted until January 30, 1980 for the elusive bird, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is asking for hunter aid in one segment of the

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department cooperating with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and other sandhill crane hunting states in obtaining biological information from sandhill cranes.

Three subspecies of sandhill cranes are involved in the hunter harvest and there are wild variations in their respective population levels. The statistics to be obtained will help determine what the effects of hunting are on each subspecies.

Al Jones, manager of the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge, said the refuge located 20 miles south and two and a fourth miles west of Muleshoe, will be cooperating with the request for infor-

Jones said they have been asked to help determine the age, sex, length. and weight of sandhill cranes harvested during the 1979 hunt.

Jones commented, "If you should be contacted. your cooperation in permitting the taking of this ing.

With the sandhill crane information will be appreciated. If you are not contacted in the field by a representative of the state and federal biologists, but are successfully hunting in the Buffalo Lake and Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge areas, would appreciate your taking the time to go by one of the offices where a conservation officer will take the necessary ments, the entire process Con't page 10. Commissioners Hear Request For Funding

Bailey County Commissioners Court met in special session last week to hear several representatives from the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water conservation District.

Representing the SCS were Douglas Bales, Jimmy Wedel, Jesse Ray Carter and Jim Luce, conservation programs. Luce explained that funding from both federal and state agencies had been cut. The SCS requested \$2,400 from county funds which would be matched with \$2,400 in federal funds.

After discussing problem, county commissioners took the request under advisement for a later decision.

Five Area Telephone was granted permission during the meeting to install underground lines, but it was specified that the lines be buried under roadbeds 36 inches deep, the area be well packed and kept in good repair.

Four Key Issues

affecting agriculture in the 1980's said an economist in marketing and policy with the Texas Agricultural Entension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Those firms that best anticipate the effect these factors will have on their operations will be in the most competitive position throughout the coming decade," declared Dr. Ronald D. Knutson.

He offered specific suggestions on how farmers, ranchers and business firms might cope with curagricultural conditions during the Houston Agri-Business Conference, Oct. 12.

"The most important effects of inflation upon agriculture include increased cash flow problems and risk confronting farmers," Knutson said. "A major difference between agriculture and the rest of the economy is that no assurance exists that farm rate as inflationary cost increases."

In regard to energy, Knutson emphasized that Texas farmers producing on irrigated land find themselves at a serious disadvantage.

While energy averages 7.9 percent of U.S. farm production costs, energy for irrigated farming in Texas runs as high as 15 percent of production expenditures, Knutson said. Thus, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Extension Service developments in new crop protant varieties, rates of irrigation, fertilizer and chemicals-as well as reduced pressure irrigation-are likely to be increasingly important in allowing Texas irrigated areas to compete, Knutson predicted.

He cautioned farmers to use care in making decisions on gasohol production in Texas. Independent studies by universities and U.S. Department of Agriculture economists show gasohol production from grain sources to be of questionable feasibility without large subsidies, he explained.

"Texas lacks a comparative advantage in producing gasohol from grain because of the attractiveness of export markets and costs of shipping grain into the state. The greatest economic feasibility is in agricultural and product residue, sugar cane and sweet sorghum," Knutson said.

The economist warned that gasohol will have to showdown between energy and food, grain for food quez, Scott Williams and will take precedence over Glenda Willoughby. grain for alcohol."

Stressing that exports are the single most critical factor affecting U.S. grain, oilseed and cotton prices, Knutson said that our natration has allowed port facilities to be tied up by strikes and Congressional debates to license exports. Knutson defined structure issue as being one of "family farm survival."

"There are concerns that control of agricultural land and production resources are increasingly becoming concentrated in the hands of large farms, corporate agri-business and nonfarm domestic and foreign interests.

"States most affected by structure modification proposals are Texas, California, and Florida. Various structure proposals include stringent limits on farm program benefits, tax changes to discourage nonfarm investment in agriculture, antitrust policy changes restricting vertical integration, and limiting the benefits of government services such as credit, research and extension activities to small and midprices will rise at the same dle size farmers," Knutson explained.

He said agribusiness firms concerned with future growth in agricultural production areas cannot afford to ignore the structure issue.

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




