## TRAIL DUST

My latest concern is the terrapin. I haven't seen one in over two years, despite the above average rainfall. The terrapin was working on ecology long before the government started its programs and the little friend of mankind was destroying worms and bugs before the day of insecticides. It is probable that insecticides have destroyed the terrapin.

One of the most interesting places I have ever visited is the Aztec National Monument at Aztec, New Mexico. Here are the ruins of an ancient civilization that once flourished on the Animas River. The pre-Columbian community was erroneously called "Aztec" by early pioneer settlers. Pueblo Indians of Arizona and New Mexico built the structure. One pueblo of the Aztec complex covers two acres, stands three stories high and contained 500 rooms, averaging 10 by 12 feet. The centuries old structures were constructed of available rock and laid with skill. The people were agricultural and produced corn and squash as the result of canals that irrigated the rich soil of the river valley. Great Kivas came into use, dominating the plaza and perhaps much of the ceremonial life. The Great Kiva was completely restored in 1934. Some of the best money the government has ever spent is in restoration of the Aztec ruins where man first built his community about 500 A.D. There is evidence that two occupations of the ruins existed and it is believed that changing climate and water supply effected the changes and final abandonment. The people were artistic in pottery, basketry and other crafts. It is fascinating to stand amid the ruins and visualize the centuries beneath the stones, of a period when thousands labored to build the community. Here are rocks where bare feet have trod; a part of the past projected into a modern world.

I am at a station in life where I am recycling old dreams and hopes but with a tragic absence of enthusiasm.

Wisdom may be in knowing what to do and possessing the restraint to refrain from doing it. Experience leaves its shattered images over paths we may travel again.

## Man Is Arraigned On Assault Charge

A 28-year-old man is in custody here in connection with the rape of a 20-year-old Matador woman early Monday.

Michael King, 28, of Matador formerly of Dallas was arraigned on a rape charge about 5 p.m. Monday before Justice of the Peace F. C. Bourland.

King, identified as a farm laborer, was being held in Motley County jail in lieu of a \$25,000 bond.

Sheriff Jinks Wilson said the charges stem from an alleged sexual assault of a single Matador woman who called officers about 3 a.m. She said a

man had entered her residence in north Matador, forced her to leave the premises and assaulted her at knife-point.

King was arrested by Sheriff Wilson and Deputy Freddie "Snow" Crenshaw about 4:30 a.m. Monday. Sheriff Wilson said the arrest was made when King was in a parked pickup in the east part of town. Officers said he offered no resistance when arrested.

Charges against King will be presented in a specially called session of the Motley County Grand Jury, Monday.

## Program Complete For Old Settlers

The program is complete for the 50th Reunion of Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association.

Parking will be no problem, as there will be six parking attendants on hand to direct traffic, and make it possible for cars to leave at any time. Secretary-Manager Corky Marshall has announced.

A T & T Amusements Carnival will provide rides and shows for the younger set. This is a section of the old Dudley carnival which came to Old Settlers for many years.

Food will be available, both at the Pioneer Pavilion, where Mrs. James Simpson of Matador will be in charge of the concession stand, and at the old Roaring Springs depot, where the Predicta Study Club will sell barbecue, catered by the Post Catering Service.

Motley County and Patton Springs schools will observe Thursday, Aug. 23, opening day of Old Settlers, as a holiday, and the Patton Springs Band will present a concert preceding the parade, which will start at 10 a.m. in downtown Roaring Springs, and in which they will march.

Interest in the Old Settlers Queen Contest (women 50 years old or older) has increased daily, as clubs and civic organizations have announced their candidates, many of whom will be on floats in the parade.

REGISTRATION will get underway following the parade, at 10:30 at the pavilion. Predicta Study Club members will be in charge and will have saddle tickets for sale, for an Alvin Durham saddle to be given away Saturday night.

Voting for the queen will also be done at the registration desk, where ballots will be available.

President Sam Ross will call the 50th Annual Old Settlers Reunion meeting to order at 11 a.m. when the Memorial Service will be conducted by Rev. Con Davis of Lubbock, Methodist minister formerly of Spur.

Memorial address will be by Col. Haynes Baumgardner, retired, of Lubbock.

At 2:30 p.m. Old Settlers will again convene for business meeting, with President Ross in charge. At 3:00 p.m. a program of music will be presented by the Afton Youth Choir.

During the afternoon, a cutting horse contest will be staged at the Rodeo Arena, and the evening rodeo will start at 8:30 p.m.

The afternoon dance for old timers will follow the program, and evening dances will be at 9:00 p.m. "Old Folks Dance," with music by Mrs. Nathan Stephens and Joe Stephens, and 9:30, "Young People's Open Air Dance" with music by Leon Rausch (formerly with Bob Wills) and The Cowtowners.

FRIDAY, Aug. 24, an Old Fiddlers Contest is scheduled for 2:00 p.m., directed by Mrs. Delaney Davis of Ralls. Cash prizes will be given 1st, 2nd and 3rd place contestants. The afternoon free dance will start at 4:30 p.m. The evening rodeo, and two dances will be at the same time as on Thursday.

Old Men's Roping is scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday, at the Rodeo Arena, with the winner receiving a handmade Alvin Durham Saddle. 2nd and 3rd prizes will be handmade silver-mounted spurs and bits.

At 2:30 p.m. a square dance will provide entertainment at the pavilion. Evening activities will be the same as on the previous nights.

Silver mounted handmade spurs and bits will be given as 1st and 2nd prizes in rodeo events of calf roping and team roping, and bits will be 1st prize in junior flag race.

MEMORIAL SPEAKER

A native of Wellington, Texas, and retired Air Force Colonel, Haynes M. Baumgardner of Lubbock will deliver the Memorial Address for the 50th Anniversary Reunion of Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association.

Although he was reared in the neighboring county of Collingsworth, Col. Baumgardner loves Motley County, and regards Matador as "home" since his wife, the former Myrnavae Barkley was reared here.

He holds a B.S. degree from Texas Tech University and M.A. degree from The George Washington University. He also attended The University of Alabama and the University of Maryland, Japan. In addition, he received professional Air Force education in War College at Montgomery, Alabama, and in several Tactical and Armed Forces Staff Colleges.

He retired Sept. 30, 1972 at Maxwell A.F. Base, Alabama, after having served in the military since Feb. 1943, when he enlisted in the US Air Force. From 1948 until 1952 he was Assistant Professor of Aerospace Studies at Texas Tech, and became Professor of Aerospace Studies in 1968, serving until June, 1971, when he became Director of Operations at Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala.

During his years in the Air Force, his tours of duty took him to Canada, England, France, Hawaii, Hong Kong, Italy, Japan, Korea, Labrador, Malta, Mexico, Okinawa, Philippines, Scotland, Spain, Taiwan and Wake Island.

He was Education Staff Officer, Air Force ROTC, Curriculum Planning with headquarters in Washington, D.C. and Senior Training Advisor to Japan Air Self Defense Force in Japan. He also held several Personnel Staff Officer positions.

Baumgardner is interested in just about everything, but especially in Boy Scout work, and has been actively engaged in various Scout activities while living in Lubbock. Mrs. Baumgardner is a teacher in the Lubbock public schools system.

They have two sons, both of whom are in the US Air Force. Capt. Haynes Baumgardner Jr., has just graduated from War College at Montgomery, Ala. and will leave soon on a tour of duty in Korea. His wife and children, Natalie and Haynes III, will remain in San Antonio. The other son, Jan Baumgardner is a Second Lieutenant and receiving pilot training at Reese A.F. Base, Lubbock. He also is married.

Col. Baumgardner hopes one day to make his home in Matador.

THE RARE combination of good crops and high prices is being envisioned by farmers and business men in this area. Also the old dream of cattlemen with record high prices and ideal range conditions seems close to reality.

There is a word of caution, however, in the old West Texas saying that it is a land that can promise the most and give the least, or promise the least and give the most.

Some veteran farmers and ranchers say prospects have never been more ideal.

Rainfall has been ample and general in most areas of Motley County, with one or two exceptions and growing conditions have been perfect. Crops are growing rapidly.

On the other side of the picture, the market promises to be the highest in many years. All phases of farm crops point to record highs.

The rains in the past few weeks have greatly improved range conditions. Ranchers say cattle are in good condition and the prices of beef are higher than in years.

For years farmers and ranchers have had uncertain prices to cope with, and in many instances actually lost money in producing a crop and raising cattle.

At present the hog raiser is faced with extremely high feed prices, as in the case of milk. Fine grazing conditions have relieved the beef producer in most cases.

All in all the outlook is brighter than in many years, for Motley County and the entire West Texas area. The test, of course, is after the harvest and after the beef "freeze" has been removed.

## BEEF CRISIS HERE

HERE in the Big Ranch Country it is hard or next to impossible to buy a steak. You can look in almost any direction from Matador and see prime beef grazing on the ranges and in the fields, but it is not for sale. It is frozen by the federal government. The arrangement has been made by thinkers in air-conditioned offices who know a better way of doing things and regulating the country's economy.

It was designed to control the price of beef and it has, but on the other hand, the price of poultry, eggs and fish products is now out of control.

Fryers (when available) here in Matador are from 99c to \$1.15 per pound and the price of choice eggs is 99c per dozen. Frozen fish and products are skyrocketing.

Restaurant men are having a difficult time staying in business, and grocery men are having an equally difficult time. There is apparently ample supply of pork and pork products.

During the drought and depression days of 1934 the government hired the cattle shot on the ranges because there was no feed and no market. Cows brought about \$12 each.

The beef price freeze will be relaxed in September and there is much speculation as to what will happen to the market, and how much the government will have helped the housewife at the meat market and in the food store.

A BEAUTIFUL handmade lace cloth over pale yellow covered the table. Made by Mrs. Ware Fogerson, the former Sylvia Day, the cloth was made of bits of cotton lace used on garments for members of both the Day and Fogerson families for many years. Some of the lace was from wedding gowns of Mrs. L. V. Criswell (mother of Mrs. Birchfield and Mrs. R. A. Day) and of Mrs. Florence

Fogerson. Much of the lace had been used on baby dresses during the years, and other portions of lace are over 100 years old.

Centerpiece for the table was an all-white arrangement of spider mums, pompons and carnations in a silver and crystal epergne.

MR. AND MRS. Birchfield have lived here during their entire married life, and for a number of years previous to their marriage in Floydada. She was born Oda Leah Criswell, in King County and came to Motley County in 1900 with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. L. V. Criswell.

Mr. Birchfield was born in Glen Rose, Tex., and was a young man of 23 when he came here in 1907. When the couple decided to get married, the bride was 16 years of age (almost 17 and had attended Baylor-Belton College two years) and the county clerk would not issue them a license, because he feared her father's anger. They went to Floydada, where they obtained the license, and Rev. G. I. Britain, a former Baptist pastor at Matador, performed their ceremony. Mrs. Criswell accompanied the couple.

Mr. Birchfield was employed by Hugh White in a grocery store for a time and later was associated with the late Rans Moore and Charlie Parks in the Commercial Grocery. He also

served as Tax Assessor and County Commissioner during the years. For 17 years, Mrs. Birchfield clerked in Harry Willett's Dry Goods store here.

Mrs. Birchfield is very active in her yard and garden, and pieces and quilts and does other handwork in her "spare" time. She has quilted 40 quilts the past two years. Mr. and Mrs. Birchfield are members of the Church of Christ.

The couple had one child - a son, Neman - who was drowned in May, 1929, in Lake Kemp. He had accompanied a group of Ag boys on a camping trip when the tragedy occurred. The void in their lives was partially filled through the years, in an attachment for their nieces and nephews.

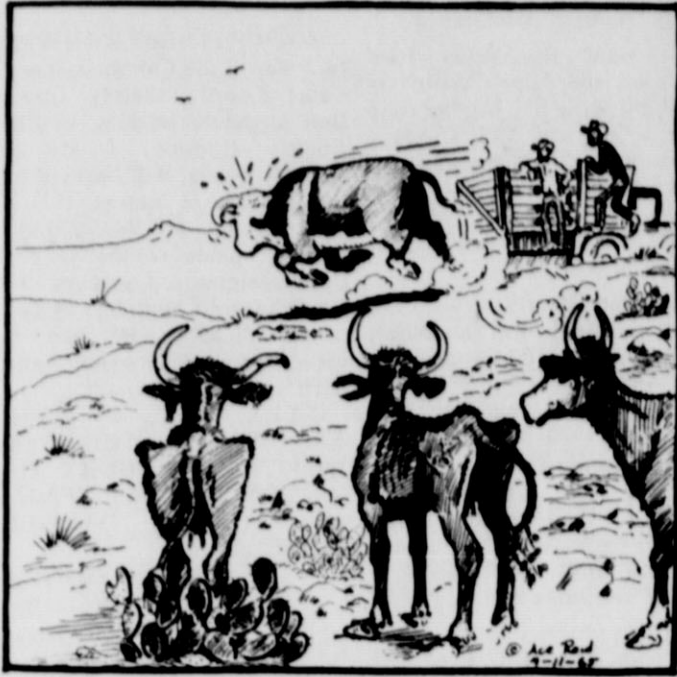
