The stranger took it immediately to the car and the baby quit crying in a few moments. The man came back for the cheap bacon, a loaf of bread, potatoes, a package of cookies and perhaps a piece of cheese. Tears were in the man's eyes as he shook my hand, entered the old car and drove away into the cold darkness. It was the greatest gift I have ever given.

Two Gin Fires At Same Time

At the height of the sandstorm yesterday the Matador Volunteer Fire Department received a call from the West Texas Gin north of Matador on State Highway 70.

The Matador department went to Afton to join the Dickens and Spur departments. The loss there was severe with approximately 150 bales reported lost. O. T. Casey, 72, former Motley County resident died about 1 p.m. Friday in Roosevelt General Hospital in Portales, N.M., as the result of a farm tractor accident. Mr. Casey was reportedly working on the front of a tractor coupled with a cotton stripper when the hand-operated clutch engaged.

Both tractor and cotton stripper ran over Casey, reports indicated. Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Causey (New Mexico) Baptist Church, with the Rev. Mike Thompson, pastor, officiating. Rev. Don Smith and Rev. Jess Terry assisted. Burial was in Causey Cemetery, under the direction of Wheeler Mortuary of Portales.

Mr. Casey was a farmer and a resident of the Causey community since 1953. He came to Motley County in 1917 from Mitchell County, with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Casey. The United Methodist Church of Roaring Springs voted to come to the Matador church for this occasion, and no service will be held in Roaring Springs this Sunday.

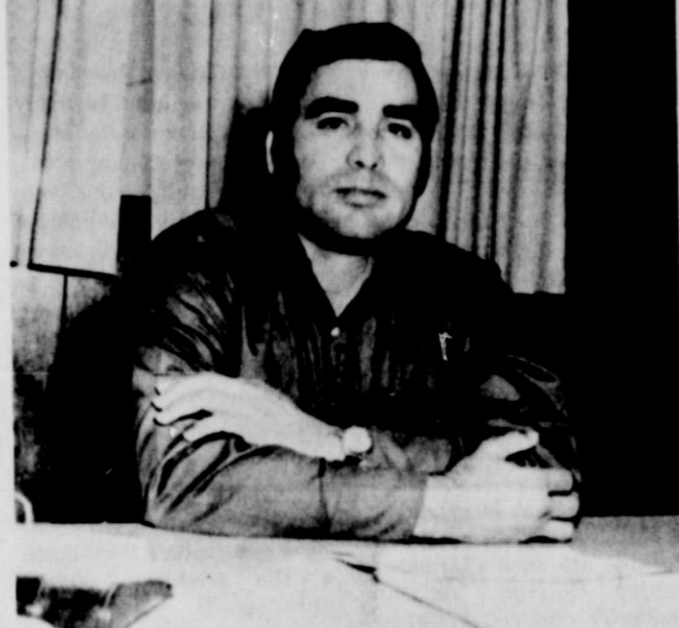

Final Rites Held For Early Pioneer

THE PATH HAS ENDED for one of the most beloved pioneers of this area of West Texas. Services were held Tuesday in the First Baptist Church Roaring Springs for Mrs. Myra V. Green, 93, who died at 10:45 a.m. Sunday, in West Texas Hospital, Lubbock following an illness of several months. She had made her home in Lubbock for the past year.

Rev. Jim Ritter, pastor of the church, and Rev. Murry L. Brewer, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Abilene officiated. Mrs. Garland Murphy of Lubbock, long-time friend of the family and formerly of Roaring Springs, paid tribute to Mrs. Green in a brief eulogy. She quoted, "Death is not extinguishing the light; it is putting out the

lamp because dawn has come."

Mrs. Green had been a member of the Roaring Springs Baptist Church for many years. As testimony of her friends, the church was filled, and the procession followed the body to Afton Cemetery, where interment was made beside her husband, Duff Green. Seigler funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Myra Virginia Kelly was born May 12, 1880, at Fort Belknap, and passed away December 9, 1973 having attained the age of 93 years, 6 months and 27 days.

She came to this area in 1900 and began a 20-year teaching career in a one-room school at what then was Cottonwood on Cottonwood Creek. She would never forget the date she reached Dickens City, because it was her birthday. She was 19, and had reached the end of a difficult journey from Throckmorton, where she had graduated with the class of 1900. She made the trip by mail hack part of the way, and in a two-wheel cart from Seymour.

Paid In Gold

"When I first started teaching" (she recounted later) "we were paid in gold. . . of course it did not take a great amount of gold. My salary was \$40 per month."

While she was teaching at Cottonwood, the people wanted to change the name to a shorter one, and asked her to select one. She suggested "Acton" but the post office department informed them there was a post office by that name in Texas. Mrs. Green chose "Afton" which is still the name of the post office and community. Mrs. Green

The Matadors finished the season with a 12-1 overall record, winning 12 consecutive games. The Matadors were undefeated in district and regular season play.

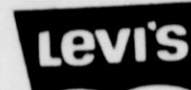

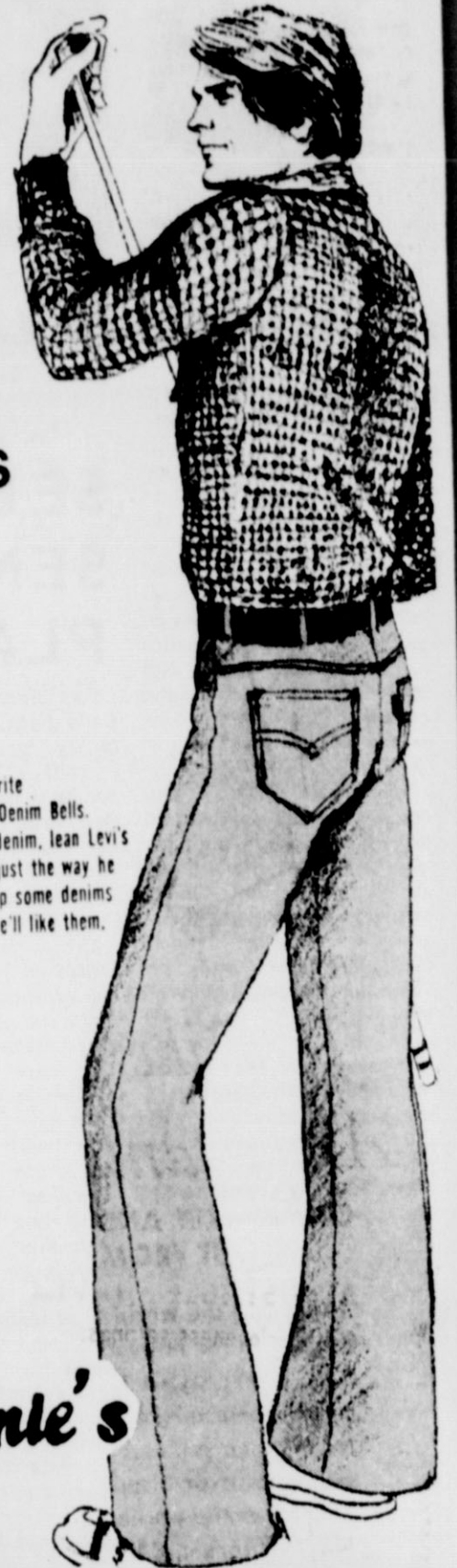

STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

Is the Bible the word of God? There are many sceptics and doubters in our present society. We have pointed out various scientific findings which support unusual happenings in the Bible. Now, let's note some claims Bible writers make for it. First, claims for the Old Testament.

In Romans, Chapter Three, Paul writes about the Old Testament and its relation to Christ. In referring to the Jews (v. 2), Paul says that, ". . . they were instructed with the oracles of God." One meaning of "Oracle" is: authoritative or wise answer. Thus, "oracle of God" would be wise or authoritative answer from God. This was Paul's belief about the Old Testament.

Also, Paul wrote to Timothy, "All scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work." 2 Tim. 3:16-17. It is evident that Paul believed that God inspired the scriptures. As the New Testament was in the informative period, it is certain that Paul believed the Old Testament was inspired, as well as the New Testament.

"Therefore the Law has become our tutor to lead us to Christ . . ." Gal. 3:24.

Note the claim of these quotes. Ezra ". . . was a scribe skilled in the law of Moses, which the Lord God of Israel had given; . . ." Ezra 7:6. "The word of the Lord came to Moses" (1:1). ". . . to Ezekiel." 1:3 ". . . to Micah." 1:1, etc. There are many such expressions in the Old Testament which claim those scriptures to be from God.

We have those among us who claim that the first eleven chapters of Genesis is an allegory; others claim the Old Testament to be ". . . just a bunch of Jewish fables. The writers of the Old Testament claim that the words which they wrote came from God. The Old Testament scriptures came to all generations since Moses from God's inspiration.

Hightower Seeks Post
