Mr. Degan said the cotton was from a field which had been struck by a hail storm. removing most of the leaves. It had caused the cotton to ripen a little earlier, but had also damaged the quality of


COLLECTING IRIS ARTIFACTS IS HOBBY OF LOCAL COUPLE
