After the game the score was 6-6 but the Matadors won on the basis of penetrations. The Matadors gained 3 penetrations to Groom's 1. The Matadors also gained 207 total yards and 9 first downs to Groom's 211 yards and 4 first downs.

The first half was mostly a defensive battle with neither team scoring. The Matadors threatened to score, but fumbles and a stingy Groom defense prevented it.

Income Tax Clinic Set In Matador

(Special to Matador Tribune) VERNON — Four Income Tax clinics for tax practitioners in the Rolling Plains have been scheduled for early and mid-December, according to Norman Brints, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Vernon.

The Extension Service and Internal Revenue Service are co-sponsoring the event.

These clinics, to be held in Vernon, Graham, Haskell and Matador, will emphasize the filing of farm tax returns as well as reviewing new forms and other problem areas of tax reporting, the economist noted.

The Internal Revenue Service will furnish instructors for the tax clinic at Vernon, and teaching materials and handouts will be in charge of the one-day meetings at Graham, Haskell and Matador.

The following schedule has been set: Vernon, December 3-4, Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center, Highway 70, Southwest of Vernon; Graham, December 12, First National Bank, 630 Elm Street, Haskell, December 14, Haskell National Bank, 601 North First; and Matador, December 17, El Matador Travel Center.

"These clinics offer an excellent opportunity for persons filing tax returns in rural areas to receive tax training close to home," said Brints. "We hope that interested persons will take advantage of these clinics."

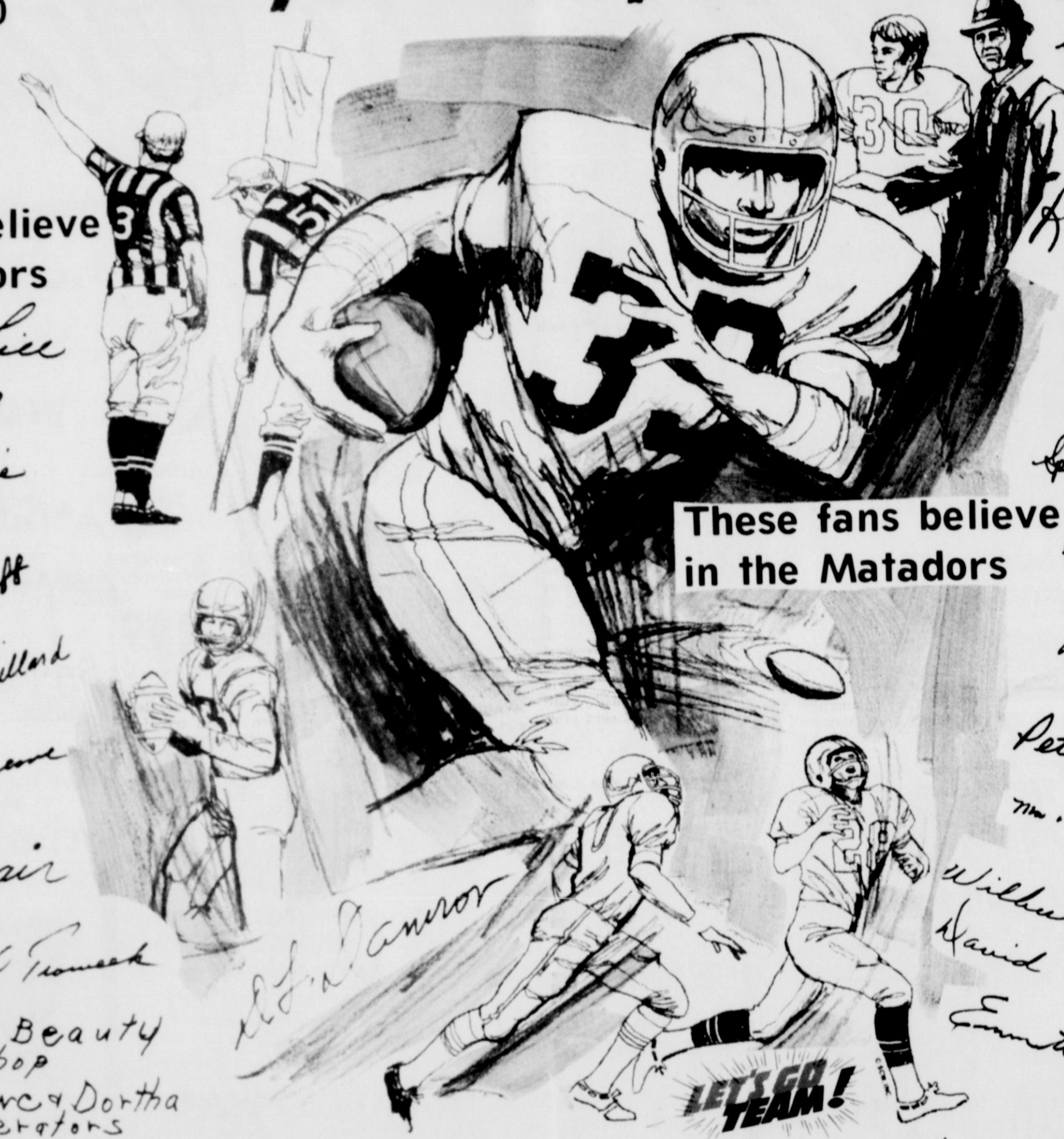

AUSTIN — The Texas State Health Department has awarded its official certificate of competency for the oldest ecology oriented profession in Texas to Gerald Jackson of Matador.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Jackson, Gerald is employed by the City of Matador. To practice water ecology in Texas, he has been taught effective ways for producing safe drinking water and treatments to make wastewater into clean streams for public use.

Because of this training, through the Texas Water Utilities Association, the largest water and wastewater training school in the U.S., there are cleaner streams and better operated facilities here than any other section of the country.

He received the certificate only after completing a formal and specialized education, accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience, and passed the examination given by the State Health Department's Sanitary Engineering Section.

The country's growing concern over clean water makes the water ecologist one of the most important workers in the community.

RAILROAD

QA&P has resulted from the collapse of a tunnel on the company's line from Childress to Plainview. He said that the company is weighing the cost of purchasing the QA&P against the cost of rebuilding the tunnel and making costly repairs to the line.

At the present time, the Fort Worth and Denver has permission for a lease arrangement with the Frisco for the use of the QA&P lines from Acme to Floydada for a train a day. A temporary arrangement was made through October 31 and then extended to April 1 by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Cruikshank declared that the railway will continue to fulfill its commitments to shippers in the Quitaque area even if the tunnel is not repaired by running special trains to handle cotton and grain and other agricultural products from that area.

In the meantime, the Frisco continues to operate three local trains a day with a crew stationed in Quanah. In addition the QA&P also has depot and communication personnel and a maintenance crew.

The Frisco's plans for the QA&P are still unannounced although speculation is that the only two long-range options open are either selling the line or abandoning it.

At the present time periodic agricultural shipments, especially cotton, will make the QA&P economically feasible. At any rate, shippers claim that this area's cotton crop could not be shipped by means other than via the 110 miles of track between Quanah and Floydada.

The Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railway was begun in 1902 and initially ran from the end of the Frisco Lines at the Red River to the gypsum plant at Acme.

In 1909 the line was extended to Paducah and finally to Floydada in 1928. A request made to continue the line to Lubbock was denied by the ICC.

The QA&P was operated as a separate system until 1964 when the late Quin Baker, the last president of the railway, retired. The traffic department was moved to St. Louis and the president of the St. Louis-San Francisco (Frisco) became the president of the QA&P.

This year with the re-routing of two transcontinental trains to the beefed up Frisco lines through Erick, Oklahoma, some 15 more employees were either moved or retired. In its heyday, the QA&P had a payroll here of some 60 or more employees.
