School Bond Is Approved

MOTLEY County voters went to the polls Saturday and approved the construction of modern school facilities in Matador, but it was no landslide, despite the fact that State Incentive Aid will pick up the tab.

Less than half of the qualified voters went to the polls as Matador voted over 3 1/2 to one for the issuance of the bonds. Roaring Springs, on the other hand, voted about nine to one against the issue. Flomot voted almost evenly for and against.

Proposition No. 3 (to build a new gymnasium) was defeated with 239 for and 274 against (unofficial figures).

The total vote (unofficial) was Proposition No. 1 for 294 and against 226. On proposition 2 (to build the new school facilities) was 290 for and 236 against.

At Matador 237 voted for proposition 1 and 66 voted against. On No. 2, 234 voted for and 69 against. On No. 3, 194 voted for and 99 against.

At Roaring Springs 12 voted for Proposition 1 and 128 voted against. On No. 2, 13 voted for and 126 against. On proposition No. 3, only 7 voted for and 130 against.

Flomot (figures not official) was about 50% for and about 50% against.

The State Incentive Aid funds is the money the state will save through the consolidation of the three schools into the Motley County Independent School District within the next ten years, and will pay off the bonds voted in last Saturday's election.

Cold Wave

It hit with the tact of an express train Tuesday afternoon and plummeted the mercury from a comfortable 68 to below freezing.

The dry northern finally drove thermometers down to 10 (or possibly 8 degrees) before daylight yesterday, for the coldest weather of the winter.

Amarillo dropped 29 degrees in 19 minutes Tuesday when the frigid air hit. Lubbock registered a low of 6 degrees, Floydada hit 5 degrees. Amarillo mercury dropped to an official 1 below zero and Pampa registered 7 below zero.

Only bright spot in the severe winter storm was the lack of moisture in this area and farmers are looking forward to continuing the harvest of cotton and grain crops.

Matador Wins Consolation In Kress Cage Tournament

Matador High School boys' basketball team won the consolation trophy in Kress' three-day tournament last week with David Martin winning a position on the Boys All-Tournament Team.

Thursday afternoon, the Lubbock Christian High School eagles got hot in the fourth quarter and pulled away to defeat Matador 62-49. L.C.H.S. continued to move forward taking the tournament championship. Matador led 22-9 the first quarter, 33-22 at halftime and the clubs were deadlocked 40-40 the third quarter. Cledell Campbell netted 12 points for the Matadors, David Martin and David Cole sank 10 points each.

The Matadors challenged the Valley team Friday and peppered them 46-38. David Cole hit the basket for 12 points and David Martin added 10 points.

The cheering fans felt the close competition Saturday during the game against Hale Center when Matadors' David Cole poured in 18 points and David Martin accounted for 11 points as Matador outscored Hale Center 67-66 for the consolation award.

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Mental Health Plan Explained at Meet

SERVICES of the Central Plains Community Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center at Plainview, were explained Thursday evening at a supper held at El Matador Restaurant. Approximately 30 attended, including County Commissioners and their wives, city officials, County Judge Forrest Campbell and others associated with county welfare.

Among the guests was Mrs. Josephine Hamilton, who is Motley County trustee for the center.

Principal address was made by Bill Dillard, Executive Director of the center. He was introduced by native son, Joe B. Meador who is associated with the personnel. His wife Norma Meador, volunteer coordinator, also attended.

Roy Nickell of Plainview, assigned to the drug abuse program spoke. He said some people are being affected by certain types of diet pills and sleeping pills and that drugs were found to be used by 20% of the students in the 13 schools surveyed. He said, however, that alcohol is the No. 1 problem.

Director Dillard said there are no locked doors at the clinic and that help may be received at any time day or night. The center was started in August 1971 and approximately 900 patients were treated the first year.

He said mental illness is difficult to classify and define. "There is no way to repair the brain," Mr. Dillard said, "we accept patients who are no longer able to control their behavior."

The center is adjacent to the new Plainview Hospital (2601 Dimmitt Road) and facilities of the hospital are available to patients requiring them. Cost for treatment at the center is \$25 per hour, but is based on ability to pay and may be as low as \$1 per hour. No one is ever turned away.

Slides were shown of the center's facilities, of retarded children receiving training and "in" patients on the road to recovery.

An alcoholic department is being organized and will be ready for service to this area in the near future.

Kook's Korner

TAMALIE PIE

One-fourth cup salad oil, 1/2 cup chopped onion; 1 clove garlic crushed; 2 pounds ground beef; 1 can tomatoes; 1 can corn with peppers (drained) 1 can tomato sauce; 1/2 table spoon chili powder; 4 teaspoons dried oregano leaves (less if ground oregano is used); 1/2 cup corn meal; 1 egg, well beaten 1 1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese.

In large skillet saute' onions and garlic until tender in the oil. Add beef and cook until it changes color and begins to brown. Remove from heat, pour off excess fat. Add tomatoes, corn, tomato sauce, chili powder, 1 tea spoon salt and oregano. Cook over low heat for a few minutes and stir together. Set aside.

Preheat oven 350 degrees. In medium pan, combine corn meal, remaining salt with 2 1/2 cups water and the egg. Cook over low heat and stir until thick. Stir in 1 cup grated cheese. Layer 1/2 corn meal mixture over bottom of large pyrex casserole. Cover with meat mixture. Spoon rest of corn meal mixture around edge of casserole, leaving small opening in center. Sprinkle grated cheese over corn meal edge.

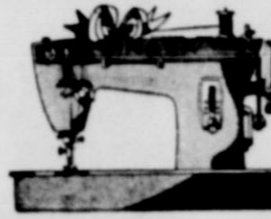
Bake 30 minutes in oven or until golden brown on top. Makes eight servings or more.

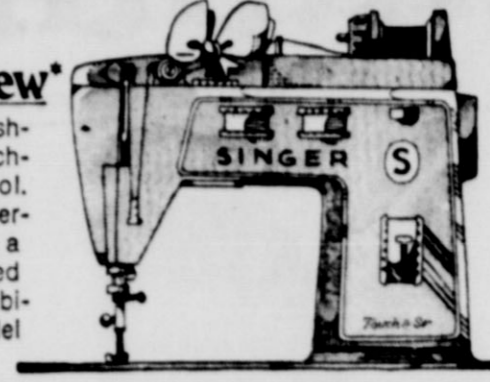

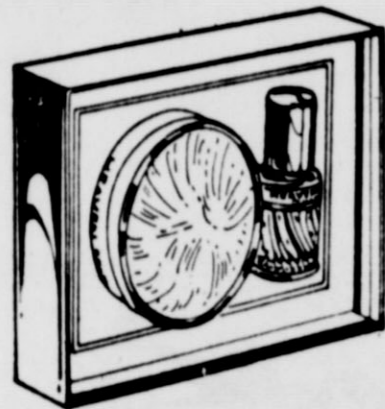

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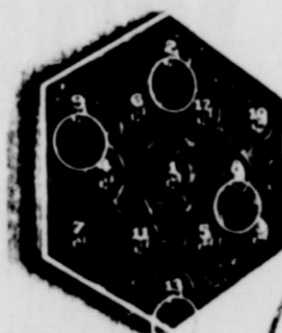

Economic Development Is Discussed

A representative of the Economic Development Administration, L. W. "Bear" Curfman, of Lubbock, met with interested businessmen and a group of area city and county officials Wednesday afternoon in the County Courtroom to discuss ways in which the Economic Development Administration's program can be of benefit to Motley and surrounding counties.

Mr. Curfman was introduced by a long-time friend, Judge Forrest Campbell of Matador. Officials from Motley, Floyd, Dickens and Hale Counties attended.

Motley and Floyd Counties were recently designated as Economically Depressed Counties and are now eligible for assistance in developing new industry in this area.

Mr. Curfman outlined the basic features of this program and discussed the essential steps to follow in applying for any type of assistance under this program. He emphasized that the program is designed to assist in developing industry that will create long-term employment, and is not a "give away" program.

Help Is Offered Farmers

Texas farmers and ranchers who have suffered crop, livestock, or property losses from a natural disaster since June 30, 1971, may be eligible for benefits from Public Law 92-385, J. Lynn Futch, State Director of Farmers Home Administration - Texas announced.

Provisions of this law, signed by President Nixon on August 16, 1972, are now fully operative, Futch said.

Benefits are divided into two time frames:

1. Farmers and ranchers who received loans from Farmers Home Administration as the result of losses due to a natural disaster that occurred between June 30 and December 31, 1971, may be eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000 of the principal of the loan. Interest on the remaining loan would be three percent.

2. Those who received loans as the result of losses from natural disaster that occurred after December 31, 1971, are also eligible for a cancellation of up to \$5,000. Interest on the outstanding balance would be charged at one percent.

Futch emphasized that it is not necessary for those who are entitled to benefits to contact the local FHA office. These are blanket provisions applicable to all who have received loans, and each will be contacted and

told of the action he should take.

Futch also advises that any farmer or rancher who receives an Emergency loan from Farmers Home Administration between now and June 30, 1973, may have up to the first \$5,000 of the loan cancelled, with the balance at a one percent interest rate. The amount of cancellation is limited to the loss or damage not compensated by insurance or otherwise.

We feel that the clinic was highly successful and will be the means of saving lives in the future by early detection and treatment for diabetes."

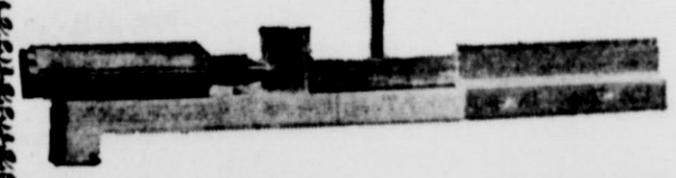

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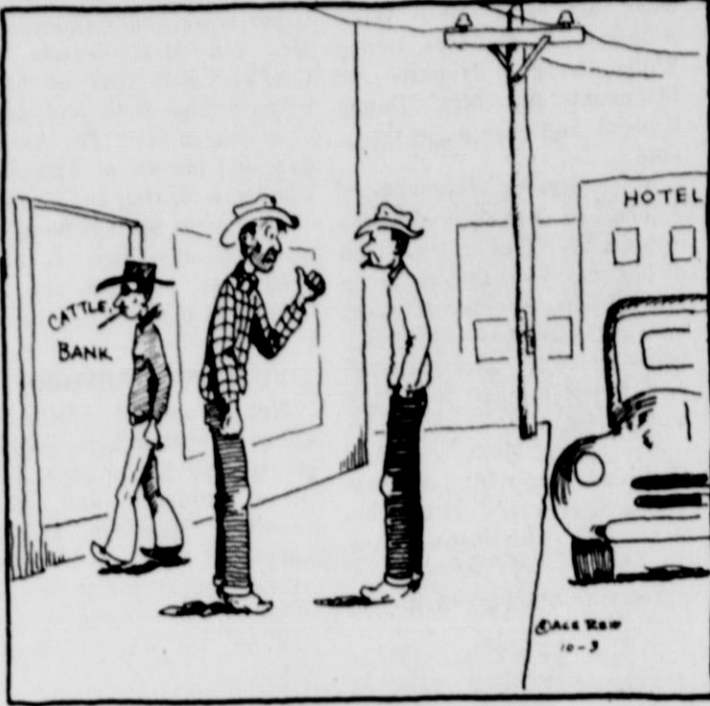

Friends here recently learned of the death of John Eubanks, 85, formerly of Matador, who had been making his home with a brother near Henderson, in Rusk County.

Funeral services were held Oct. 22 at 2:00 p.m. in West Hollis Spring Baptist Church, Rev. E. G. Porter officiating. Burial was in Garretts Cemetery, Southern Funeral Home of Henderson was in charge of arrangements.

John Eubanks did not believe that man walked on the moon. At the time of the lunar landing in July, 1969, he told Tribune publisher Douglas Meador, "I have never found any place in the Bible about man going to the moon. . . I believe if the Lord had intended for man to be on the moon, he would have put him there."

Born Dec. 22, 1887 on the Galloway plantation at Henderson, he was the son of the late Fannie and Smith Eubanks. His father was a slave, and he was a member of a family of 12 sisters and three brothers. He came to this area as a youth and worked as a shine boy in Levelland. He came to Matador in 1927 and worked as a porter for Traweck Hospital 16 years, and later as porter at Stanley Hospital.

He had been in failing health the past year, and this summer returned to Rusk County and resided with his brother, Clemit Eubanks. Besides his brother, he is survived by nieces and nephews.

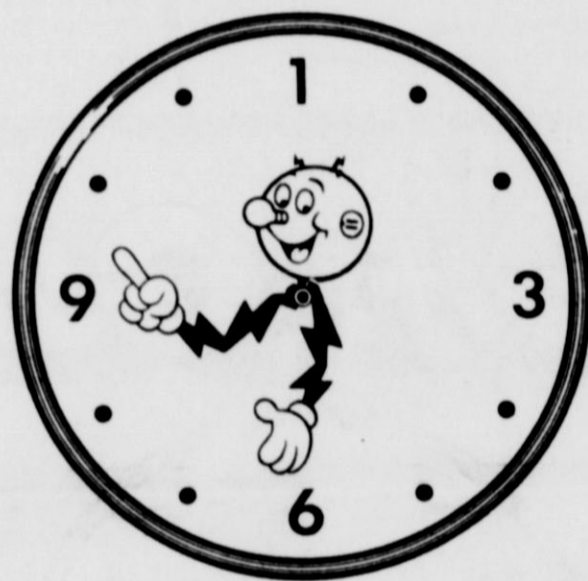
